cless Commissioners Kept No Record of Sales. It is Not Known To-day Whether the University Owns Land or Not.

Congress granted Washington territory two townships or 72 sections of land for the purpose of establishing a university. In 1861 the legislature of the territory created a board of university commissioners, gave them the authority to select the lands granted for university purposes and to sell them for not less than \$1.20 per acre. A large number of sales were made at \$1.50 per acre, and out of the proceeds so obtained, the present university was built. The commissioners, looking up the law, found that they had no authority whatever to make such sales. That without the sanction of congress was obtained, the sales were null and void. In order to

Mr. Feighan's name vas first proposed for the speakership by udge Turner and Colonel W. N. Red was mrs proposed for the speakership by Judge Turner and Colonel W. N. Redpath, of Spokans, but of course nothing could be assured until Western Washington could be heard from. So accordingly Mr. Redpath and Mr. Feighan came on to Seattle yesterday to patch up the matter. They were met here last night by Haines and others and held a long consultation. Governor Squire was not present and it is said by those who know the inside nature of the deal that the ex-governor's name was not mentioned at all in the interview. Haines stated his wish for the senate and Mayor Redpath told the King county delegates that Eastern Washington desired the speakership, and that ington desired the speakership, and that they would be pleased to have the sup-port of King county for their candidate. After a little debating it was all patched port of King county for their candidate. After a little debating it was all patched up as follows: Haines and his clique would support the aspirations of Colonel Feighan far the speakership if in return the Spokane delegation would urge Mr. Haines' claim to the senatorship from Western Washington.

Then more scheming was in order. The senatorial contest in Eastern Washington was doctored. Cannon was known to be somewhat out of the race, as business had called him east, and it was improbable he would return before the new year. Allen was a staunch friend of Haines, while Judge Turner's preference was not


