CHANGE.

FENIAN COMBUSTIBLES—Recently a number of magistrates and town councilors assembled at Liverpool police station to witness experiments with the Fenian combustible fluid recently seized. A portion of the fluid was poured on a quantity of loose cotton and sticks, and in about four minutes it spontaneously ignited. A bottle containing fluid was then dashed against a wall, which immediately became a mass of flames. The spectators were deeply impressed with the destructive quality of the fluid. Many persons have doubted the existence of a Fenian organization in Liverpool, but the cases which are coming to light will undo them. As an instance of the marvelous unextinguishable qualities of the fluid, we may state that a short time ago Superintendent Hewitt poured some of it on cotton-wool and chips, and placed the whole completely in water, where it remained for a week; it was then taken out and placed on the floor, and in five minutes had burst into flames.

THE STORM AT SAN FRANCISCO.

The following extract from a San Francisco paper, is a graphic description of the late severe storm in that vicinity:

The gale of Tuesday night continued on night Wednesday and yesterday morning. It was not quite as severe as the first, and the vessels along the water front were better prepared for it, having cables and chains made fast and fenders hung between their sides and the piers. The Columbia, which was sunk the night before, lurched forward and has almost wholly disappeared from sight. A large portion of the sand embankment on Fourth street, below Brannan, was washed away, and the planking upon it settled down so that people were not allowed to pass over it. The waves on Mission Bay were black with mud, and rose almost even with the surface of Long Bridge. The breakwater of the Mill Company's dock, and the dock itself, suffered again considerably. Several old scows were sunk inside of Long Bridge, and the waves have cut into the embankment along Brannan street, clear up to the railroad track in places. A great number of bales of straw and hay were placed along the water's edge, which served to break the violence of the waves. Shortly after noon the copious rains fell and it abated considerably. Business along the city front, particularly on the lumber, grain and produce wharves, was nearly suspended. The Alameda ferry boats at great risk managed to cross the Bay early in the morning, but dared not attempt to return. All along the city front the basement of the stores were converted into cisterns by the torrents of rain that fell without intermission for hours at a time. So heavy was the rain between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening, that the streets were as deserted as if it had been midnight. The extraordinary fall of rain caused perfect cataracts to be formed on some of the steep grades in the upper parts of the city, and the water, as it came coursing along tore up the loose soil, with which many of the streets had been graded, in a most extraordinary manner, cutting gullies in many places in a few minutes, as large as a hundred men would excavate in a week. Near the crossing of Pacific and Hyde streets, such a gully was cut, nearly entirely across the street, twenty feet wide and from ten to twenty feet deep. Another was formed at the corner of Hyde and Jackson streets. The quantity of mud and water that was carried down to Sutter street was so deep as to stop the cars. On Polk street the water washed away a much of the grading under the rails, that it was unsafe for the cars to run in the afternoon. The cars were also stopped from running at the corner of Sutter and Polk streets by the mud and water. On Howard street, beyond Ninth, the cars broke down the rails, in consequence of the mud having been washed from under the sleepers and four cars, of the track, were piled within a short distance of each other, cutting off all travel by rail. The Kearny street cars did not run south after 3 o'clock, in consequence of the damage done to the line.
