Directions for Decting Alterrations of the
Treasury Bills.

As publicity has been given to the telegraphic statement respecting counterfeit ifftics and hundreds, raised from ones and
twos, United States Treasury Notes, having made their appearance, etc, come details are furnished showing the most prominent points of difference between the lesser
and greater notes so tampered with. The
ones and hundreds are so totally dissimilar
in the main features, that, whatever skill or
ingenuity may be brought to bear by this
process of changing or raising the larger
figures that indicate the value of the note,
no change is likely in the most skilful arlistic portions. The portrait of Secretary
Chase, in an oval frame in the extreme left
hand upper corner of the dollar note, is its
distinct, exclusive characteristic. In the
one hundred dollar note, occupying a like
position on the upper left corner, the prominent device is the figure of a single eagle
with out-apread wings. These distinctions
can easily be remembered. Between the
twos and fifties there are points of resemblance, especially as the first Secretary of
the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton, is conmon to both denominations, and is the ondy prominent pictorial device upon either.
A glance at the position of this portrait upon-the extreme lower edge of the note, the
main title, The United States, being above
the picture; whereas in the fifty the portrait is placed in the upper part of the note,
nearly at the top, while the words of the
main-title are separated by it. The word
'United' is upon the left, and 'States' upon
the right of the portrait. The difference in
the backs of the two's and fifties is so marked that observation of that of the two, with
its two concentric rirgs and its two broad
bands of geometric engraving, would be
readily remembered as an exclusive feature,
as totally unlike that of the

FRENCH LEGAL DECISION IN A DUEL CASE.—Paris correspondence of the Londro Star, alluding to a notorious duel that recently took place in France, and where the widow of the party killed brought a civil suit for damages against the survivor,

the widow of the party killed brought a civil suit for damages against the survivor, says:

The decision concerning the damages claimed by Mrs. Dillon from the Duc de Grammont-Caderousse was given to-day.—The judge was harder on the defendant than the jury, as he decided that dueling is contrary to religion, morality, public peace and order, an illegal mode of defending one's reputation, an outrage against the sovereign power, from which all justice emanates, and a violation of the principle upon which every civilized society is based, which forbids any man to take the law into his own hands. He said that since the 338th and 359th articles of the criminal code have become the law of the land, it is felony to have recourse to arms for the purpose of avenging a real or pretended injury, no matter how great the provocation may have been. President Flandrin furthermore was of opinion that the Duc de Grammont-Caderousse was all through the aggressor, and that his chivalrous conduct in offering Dillon the sheltered side of the ground on which the duel was funght, did not exonerate him from the penalties laid down by the Code Napoleon in such a case as this. He therefore condemned him to pay Mrs. Dillon the sum of 3,000f, along with a life annuity of 3,000f, payable quarterly in advance, two thirds of which are to terest to her sons Horace and Fraderick during their lives.
