1. Briefly describe your idea for the use of LSTA funding (limit your response to approximately ½ page):

Literacy advocates from the South Sound region* of our state began meeting in 2007 to consider how existing literacy programs might further collaborate and expand literacy support to an even higher degree. We immediately saw a need for a database of literacy related services, providers and programs as well as research, hence the suggestion for a ***Washington State Literacy Clearinghouse***. While many of those most in need of literacy services are the unserved and underserved populations in our state it is often difficult to find information to connect them to local literacy services, be it tutoring for a struggling student, early literacy information and tips, GED preparation and support, and classes for English language learners.

We propose the initial creation of a “regional” clearinghouse in the greater South Sound region to serve as a model that could be scaled to a statewide level over a four (4) year period. A “one-stop shopping” clearinghouse database would easily provide valuable information to citizens, literacy groups, libraries, educators at all levels, philanthropic organizations and policy makers within our state.

The Washington State Literacy Clearinghouse would have the following goals:

- Connect the person with a literacy need to the appropriate service.
- Advance an awareness of the multifaceted nature of “literacy” for all age groups throughout our state.
- Encourage collaborative opportunities for existing and emerging literacy programs.
- Provide access to research on literacy development.
- Expand literacy programs that work and are making a difference.

A literacy clearinghouse would facilitate connecting real people to programs that meet their needs. It would increase accuracy of information as well as

collaboration among and between federal, state, local and philanthropic funding intended to develop a literate population in Washington State. It would provide up-to-date information to the state legislature and other policy makers on funding literacy efforts. A clearinghouse of this magnitude would indeed place a high priority and emphasis on promoting essential literacy skills for all.

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2. Briefly describe why funding of this idea is important to the Washington library community (limit your response to approximately ½ page):

Libraries would be a logical repository for such a database in their role as key information providers in their local communities. This project would require funding for a project manager with appropriate resources and technical support to assure the database is accurate, easy to access and navigate. The proposed project would entail:

Year 1: Exploratory—research with local, state, tribal and national models of similar clearinghouse efforts; map existing literacy efforts; create an advisory group; develop a communication and dissemination plan; create a timeline; and develop an evaluation plan with appropriate measures.

Years 2-3: Implementation—at the regional level; explore and plan for statewide feasibility; explore and secure funding sources for statewide implementation.

Year 4: Launch statewide clearinghouse and secure funding for ongoing support to keep the database relevant, up-to-date and easy to use with emerging technologies for intended audiences.

3. Briefly describe the outcome that is expected should the idea be funded. In other words, how will we know if the project has been successful and has achieved its goals? (limit your response to approximately ½ page):

Should the Washington State Literacy Clearinghouse be funded, evidence of success in achieving its goals would be identified by:

- robust use of the database by multiple users;
- increased networking and collaboration among and between literacy advocates and programs;
- increased access to literacy research and practices that improve literacy of our citizens and students;
- ongoing, sustainable support and funding of this project.

Ideally, funding this proposal could result in increased literacy rates in Washington State enabling all citizens to become literate participants in the diverse quality of life our state has to offer.
