Looks Well.

Recently Mr. Squire has received more pieces of rock from the same mine, and the indications of the presence of gold is plainly apparent under the glass. Feeling that the demand of the times would justify a still greater expansion Mr. Mack rented the building adjoining the old restaurant, and a few carpenters soon had both buildings entirely changed, and now that the place is refitted and furnished Mack is ready to enter the new and most extensive eating house in the Northwest, with one single exception in Portland, and we doubt if even there a better meal can be procured. The public eating room, or parlor, is commodious and cool and inviting. They are furnished with small tables with a seating capacity sufficient to accommodate a very large crowd. Just at the doors is the paying counter with every convenience. In the south room are four private apartments for ladies and gentlemen or families. In the rear of this main room is another cozy apartment where parties can be supplied with perfect refreshment. The room is neatly papered, the floors carpeted, the walls decorated with pictures and a general air of neatness and cleanliness prevailing. The waiters are obliging and accommodating, the victuals served in the best style, and the charges very reasonable. "The Diamond" would be a credit to any city, and as its name implies is a perfect gem in all of its appointments. Mr. Mack aims to keep every thing in season, and there is no delicacy in the market that cannot be found at this establishment. The gentleman has been a heavy expense in fitting up this restaurant, and it is to be hoped that he will realize handsomely on the investment. It is a feature of the city that will be the encomium of travelers and one that should be supported by the public. We congratulate Mr. Mack upon his success in settling in good style and hope to see the time when "The Diamond" will have grown twice or thrice its present dimensions.

Everyday Confidence.

Sunday last Lane C. Gilliam and August Goldsmith returned to the city from Eagle City, where they spent several days personally inspecting the mines. They had ample opportunity to see what was being done and came home thoroughly convinced that the diggings are equal in richness to anything ever reported of them. Mr. Gilliam informs us that Eagle City itself is exceedingly dull just now, a report that every person from the mines confirms. This is partially owing to the stamped out of the place that occurred a few weeks ago, and mainly to the fact that almost every man capable of handling a pick is out in the hills prospecting. While money is coming in daily from the hills, it is evidently being yielded when better appliances for working the ground are introduced that the producing capacity of the claims will increase many fold. Mr. Gilliam had ocular proof of the gold bearing condition of the earth by seeing miners wash the stuff from pans of dirt. It will require time and labor to fully demonstrate the extent of the mines, but the country will be thoroughly prospected this summer. All of the old miners in camp, those whose judgment is worth pinning faith to, are emphatic in their expressed belief that the Ceur d'Alene mines will prove the richest ever worked on this coast.

Changed Hands.

One of the market features in business circles among new towns is the frequent changes of proprietorship in the various branches of trade. A firm or single individual who conducts business a year without some kind of transfer is considered to be one of the old timers, and a permanent fixture, although a single year is no indication that the house is to continue under one management another twelve months. Hardly a week passes that we are not called upon to note a change in some firm, or the entire transfer of a business from the old to new hands. One of the largest sales that have occurred of late is that of the Black Hawk Stables, on Main street, the property of Alex. Warner and Jas. E. Roe to E. W. Pound and Ed. McDonnell. That is not to say the sale of the real estate nor the improvements thereon, but the good will of the stable, and the entire transfer of a business from the old to new hands. Messrs. Prevent It.

At the first meeting of the new City Council some time ago an enthusiastic disposition was apparent among all of the members to make a stringent law prohibiting the running of sewerage or the dumping of garbage into the river above the falls. It is not possible that the Council has lost all interest in this matter, yet no steps have been taken to enforce the prohibition of this great evil. Let any of our sons stroll along the banks of the river on the south side, east of the first bridge and their feelings will be shocked at the appearance of things, and very probably, if they are numbered among the unfortunate ones compelled to use river water, their stomachs will also undergo an upheaval. In that part of town are several Chinese wash houses and the villainous slops from those nasty places are permitted to run into and mingle with the river polluting the water and making it totally unfit even to wash in, much less to use as a beverage. A stop should be put to this at once. Its continuance is certain to breed sickness, besides, even were the waters not used for domestic purposes, it turns a beautiful stream of water into a cess pool, and a corrupt, odoriferous, unsightly sewer.

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A Choice Addition.

Monday of this week we were taken in charge by our young friend Fred D. Chamberlin, Esq. of the extensive commission firm of Chamberlin Bros., and driven across the river and given an opportunity to inspect the piece of territory known as "Chamberlin's Addition" to the City of Spokane Falls, which has recently been put on the market. The property is delightfully located on the high plateau a few rods north-west of the Methodist College, overlooking the city. The land is level, free of all obstructions and will rapidly come in favor among those who are desirous of building up homes. As a special inducement Mr. Chamberlin offers every purchaser of lots who will build a reduction of ten per cent. of the cost of the improvements. Already this season the march of improvement has spread to the north side of the river and a number of handsome residences are under way. Mr. Chamberlin himself is having a very pretty two story cottage built on the land and the indications are that that part of town will be rapidly filled up with houses. As the center of the city crowds up with business and the noise and hum pertaining to the same, the residences are gradually yet surely crowded out to the suburbs, and the land is being filled up. The natural advantages of the northwestern portion of the city such as purity of air, moderate temperature, drainage, etc., are superior, and the view from the spot is one of the most charming in the city. Mr. Chamberlin has the addition tastefully laid out in lots and blocks, and a neat hip-roofed building of the best material, which is a credit to the plot with those already established in adjoining additions. It is the aim to put the lots on the market at such a price as will encourage people to buy and improve. In the course of a year or two there will be a large population occupying the land on the north side of the river, and if the same rule is followed out already laid down by those who have commenced building this season the houses will be of a superior order. That it will be a desirable place of residence no one will deny, and as the city must spread out over all the most available land in the vicinity it is but following out a natural result that the property to the north, so well adapted for homes, should be utilized for that purpose. The disposition of the property, which is about two-thirds of a mile, and as the property owners propose to lay down side-walks from the Post-street bridge out to this and the other additions the distance will not be considered by those investing.

A Momentary Shadow.

The wealthy and extensive corporation known as the "Montana Improvement Company" had the misfortune to be precipitated in a little trouble this week, out of which it has extracted itself without loss or injury. Any corporation, company or firm is liable to meet with annoyances in business, and this little transaction that at first had every appearance of a calamity to those from that quarter, the solvency of the company, turns out to be a mere trifle. The Montana Improvement Company is a corporation engaged in the lumber business in Idaho and Montana, and have a capital equal to \$2,000,000. It has lumber yards at various points in the northwest, among which are Sprague, Cheney and Spokane Falls. This company has had numerous transactions with D. W. Small, an old mill man and a gentleman extensively known in the upper country. Mr. Small had a claim on the Montana company, and for reasons best known to himself, attached the yards at Sprague, Cheney and Spokane Falls late Saturday afternoon. Mr. Stone, the resident manager, was at a loss to know what to do, being unable to secure the necessary bonds. Tuesday Mr. Hammond, of Deer Lodge, and Mr. Eddy, of Missoula, both connected with the company, arrived in this city with \$40,000 cash to indemnify any parties who might go on the bonds. Security was at last found and the yards released. The amount of indebtedness is only \$8,200, an amount that the company stand ready to meet when the bill is satisfactorily explained. The attachment in this city did not effect the business of the yard, as new ground was leased on the north side of the track and some ten cars of lumber immediately unloaded.

"Westward the Star of Empire Takes Its Way."

The extreme Northwest is brought into especial prominence just at this time by the rush of fortune seekers to the gold fields of the Coeur d'Alene region. But it is not to the mines of Coeur d'Alene, however rich they prove to be, that the far Northwest will owe her prosperity, and the growth which is inevitably coming.

To the people of New England "the West" is Michigan, Wisconsin or Illinois; while the denizens of the Green Mountains, who is adventuring enough to cross the Father of Waters, thinks himself in Iowa or Minnesota, very near to the setting sun. The inhabitant of the central states looks upon Minnesota, Nebraska, and Kansas as "the West," and the Missouri river is to him as the boundary line which separates the land of civilization from the howling wilderness.

We, in the upper Mississippi Valley, at the threshold of the great West, are accustomed to limit our view to the region lying on this side of the great mountains. But recent developments have opened up to the west of what had hitherto been the objective point of those who sought their fortunes in the western country.

There are millions of acres of as fertile land as the sun ever shone upon awaiting the coming of the settler in Montana, Idaho and Washington territories. The completion of the Northern Pacific railroad has brought this vast domain into direct relations with the world at large, and when we consider the advantages which the region possesses it is not strange that immigrants are pouring into the favored territories by thousands.

Washington Territory in 1880 had a population of 75,000, which has more than doubled in the intervening time. So rapid has been the development of this portion of the west, and so fair does her future seem, that she has now a good prospect of securing admission as a State before some of her older neighbors farther to the East.

The bill to establish the new State of Tacoma has already been favorably reported to the Senate, and though it will probably not pass at this session of Congress, a considerable advantage has been gained by securing the favorable report. The new State will include the present Territory of Washington, and that portion of Idaho lying north of the 47th parallel.

The area to be taken from Idaho is a long, narrow strip bounded by the rugged timber foot mountains on the west, and bounded by the broad waters of the Columbia river. Geographically it belongs to the Columbia Valley, and the proposed change may be called a natural one and will make a State nearly as large as Oregon. The slice to be taken from Idaho is sparsely populated. It has some good grazing country and forests, and contains the new Coeur d'Alene mining district. The completion of the Northern Pacific Railroad, together with the possession of several good harbors with coal mines close at hand, will, of course, tend to develop Washington Territory rapidly in the near future, and before another decade has passed we may expect to see the fertile valley of the Columbia as thickly dotted with thriving towns and villages as is the most thickly settled portion of Dakota to-day.
