Deserters to the Front.

Somebody has sent us an "open letter" of H. G. Struve, deserter, to Beriah Brown. Birds of a feather. Well this is appropriate! A confessed deserter, unburdens himself to one whose disloyalty during the war rendered him infamous.

In this "open letter," with a brazen affront which is lurid, he now tells the people of this territory, that notwithstanding all this, he has "filled the offices of prolate judge and prosecuting attorney for seven years; besides being a member for several terms of both houses of the legislative assembly, and president of the council, and secretary of the territory," etc.

The plea of infancy, ("fifteen years") won't do here. Struve is a lawyer of "thirty years," as he says. He knew that our organic act provided in the 5th section, "That no person belonging to the army or navy of the United States, shall ever be elected to hold any civil office or appointment in this territory."

DEMOCRACY AND WOBBLING.—The principles of the democratic party, when applied to the administration of public affairs, inure to the benefit of the laboring classes. They are based on the idea that the laborer is worthy of his hire; that he should be permitted to enjoy the fruits of his own industry; and, therefore, these principles are opposed to special or class legislation, to monopolies, to government subsidies, to granting of public lands to railroads or steamboat corporations, to so-called protective tariffs, and to absurd navigation laws, which will not permit an American citizen to purchase a foreign built vessel and sail it under American colors.

JOHN SHERMAN AND THAT LETTER.—First, John Sherman didn't believe he wrote the Webster-Anderson letter, yet he might have written it. Next, when convinced that the Potter committee didn't have the letter, and after Mrs. Jenks came to his relief by swearing that she dictated the letter and that Sherman had no part in it, he positively affirmed that he had never written anything of the kind.

AMERICAN EXPORTS.—Our exports for the year ending June last greatly exceeded our imports, the exact amount of the excess being \$25,896,653. The exports were \$722,479,498; imports, \$496,582,846.

THE RESULT IN MAINE.—It is now certain that the next governor of Maine will be either a democrat or a greenbacker. He certainly will not be radical, as things look. The election devolves upon the legislature, by reason of the failure of the radical candidate to get a majority over his democratic and greenback competitors.


