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OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 21, 1879.

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Descent of Real and Personal Property.

The New Northwest is displeased with the Statesman because of its advocacy of the re-enactment of the common law of England on this subject. The common law of England is virtually the Justinian code, which has stood the test since the sixth century, and which extended its influence throughout all portions of the Roman dominions, and shaped and modified the juris-prudence of all succeeding times. In the eleventh century, Edward, the confessor, king of England, again codified these laws, which code was styled the common law of England, and that code is to this day the rule of decision in almost all the courts of the United States and territories, so far as it does not conflict, or is inconsistent with the constitution of the United States and the constitutions of the several states, and whenever a legislature allows itself to improve upon laws which have withstood the revolutions of all civilized nations for thousands of years, influenced by the strong-minded-weakness of women, it will invariably make a mistake. Under the common law the wife was entitled to a life-estate in her husband's real estate, and to one-third of the personal property if more than one child, and one-half of all the personal property if but one child. This is certainly an ample provision, and if, as our laws do, entitle a wife to her own earnings, it is impossible to think that any more can be asked to protect the wife's interest. Under our present community property act, the whole of it goes to the survivor to the exclusion of the children. It is true, when our sister says, that a mother will do what is right by her children, but where it concerns the interest of the step-children, the proverbial step-mother will excuse the Statesman for interposing a doubt. But what is true of the children, is also true of a wife; namely, if a wife has been, what all of them are not, a true wife to her husband, he will do what is right by her and a great deal more. Why not trust the husband as well as her?

But here is another feature in the matter: The widow receives no note of the community property in many cases the prey of adventurers, who upon marriage, under our laws, has the management and control of the separate property of the wife, and she cannot dispose of any of her real property without the signature of her husband; the wife on the other hand to avoid publicity will submit, and in the end often loses her property which her former husband labored hard to acquire. Few women are calculated for business, and a less number desire to mingle in the strife of business life, or compete with business men, generally, notwithstanding the fact that a few masculine females, who made a mistake in not being born men aver the contrary. To prove that the success of the women's right movement is not all appreciated by a large majority of the women themselves, we reproduce the following from the New York Graphic:

"Apparently the women of Massachusetts do not hanker after the right of voting. The books for the registration of women under the new law of Massachusetts have never been closed, and the whole number of women who have come forward to qualify themselves for the discharge of the voting franchise is about 2000. The female population of Massachusetts amounts to about 300,000 souls, of whom probably not more than 200,000 at the least are adults, so that it would seem that only one woman out of each 100 cared to claim that inestimable boon for which Mrs. Susan Anthony and her illustrious co-workers have been so long contending."

With these views we leave the adjustment of this question with the assembled wisdom of the territory now in session at Olympia. STEPHEN PULASKI is dead. Stephen was chief of the Montank Indians at Long Island, and is said to have been the only one of the tribe that had pure blood in his veins. If we had an onion we could weep for Stephen, but still it is better that he is gone. We wish all the pure-blooded ones would follow Stephen for then there might be some hope of a solution of the Indian question. It is such fellows as this copper-colored man with the Egyptian snuffcase that make trouble and keep the Indian lands from passing into the possession of the republican party.

FOR WASHINGTON.—Our delegate, accompanied by Mrs. Brents, will have their home for Washington on Sunday next. We hope ere his return Mr. Brents will be able to give a good account of himself. There is a bill before congress that asks for compensation to the citizens who took part in the last two Indian wars. They did the work and saved the expense of soldiers, and we are sure if the delegates made a persistent effort they could easily accomplish such a trifling thing. Excesses of honor amongst our delegates, anything are too common, and more than enough of them. It is a poor sign.

THE CONTEST IN OHIO.—The Times says: There is a moral for New York to be had from the conduct of the republican campaign in Ohio, so freely criticized by our Columbus correspondent. With the advent of the closing week of the struggle, republican leaders of Ohio find they have been exaggerating their own chances of success as grossly as they have been underrating the strength of their majority. Republican estimates of their majority on the state ticket have suddenly shrunk to one third of the figure lately claimed, and the legislature is regarded as rather worse than doubtful.

MARK LANE REPORT.—A London dispatch dated Oct. 7th says: The Mark Lane Express says that bad weather has continued with but brief intervals of sunshine. In the middle counties, the rainfall has been excessive and harvesting carried on in a very desultory manner. Much of the corn in other parts of the kingdom remains unstacked. The greater part of the wheat and barley recently cut is in such a damp state that sprouting or heating in the stack will inevitably ensue. The cutting and carrying proceeded very slow in the north, and the want of dry weather is much felt.

SURRENDER OF THE HOSTILES.—A short dispatch from the Salmon river country to the STATESMAN states that our friend Lieut. Farrow, with his few men, have captured the hostiles who have kept the country in such a ferment during the summer. They were to go to Warrens, thence to the Umattilla agency. He has had a rough time, and will return covered with glory. He is one of the bravest young officers in the service, and has a glorious career before him.

The Idaho Democrat has been conspicuous lately by its utter absence. It is an exchange we like to get regular on account of its fresh, original matter and almost perfect freedom from scissored items. The mails are no doubt to blame, for we have received many complaints from our subscribers over in Boise. It is passing strange such accidents should occur; our postmaster says it is not his fault, and that the sack is not opened until it gets to Boise.

STATE FAIR.—The Oregon state fair, we are sorry to find, has not so far been a pecuniary success, on account of the rain. It deserves it for live, enterprising men have managed it. Nothing outdoors can be successful when the heavens are weeping.

WHILE an editor may be a political opponent, he can be a good friend at the same time. But when he singles out a relative of that friend for sarcasms when there is not the slightest need of it, we hold him to be a strong.

THE UTE OUTBREAK.—Another unnecessary crime has been committed by the interior department, and the blood of citizens and soldiers again cry to heaven for vengeance against the sentimentalists there who hold that the Indian can do no wrong. No sooner are blunders rectified by military aid in one portion of the United States than they are again called upon to repeat their humane performance in another. Why this apparently blood-thirsty incubus of the interior department should be so long allowed to suck the life blood from the heart of the frontier is one of those problems that is only to be accounted for by radical misrule, consequent on the loss of political influence that party would lose if they rendered their assistance in transferring the control of the Indians from them who now hold it to the military. For years they have fattened upon the appropriations allowed by congress for the Indians' support. Treaties have been made for no other purpose, apparently, than "to get the bulge" on the red man; and that accomplished, they hold him to his bargain and treat his prayers for better treatment with a high-handed contempt and indifference. Weeks previous to the recent terrible outbreak in Colorado, Gen. Sheridan was ordered to place these Indians on or near the Navajo reservation, at the junction of Colorado with the territories of Utah, Arizona and New Mexico. He answered back that if a war was wanted he would comply with the command, and reminded the department that it would entail a war with a nation of 22,000 souls. This, allowing the average of one warrior to seven persons, would place nearly 3000 fighting men on the war path. His advice was of course unheeded, and in consequence the country has been horrified with the usual terrible details of Indian atrocities. As is always the case, Secretary Schurz has been busy telegraphing and laying the blame everywhere except to where it rightly belongs, i. e. on his own shoulders. Already we know of 100 lives being sacrificed, and the probabilities are that hundreds more of our own race will be offered up as a sacrifice before a righteous indignation will compel the transfer of the management of Indians to that arm of the service to which it belongs by all the rights of humanity. But the bloodsuckers have such a hold on the appropriations that we doubt if anything so desirable will happen in our time.

THE BLOODY SHIRT YAW.—"Hatred of the truth, abuse of reason, and falsehoods about the south, says the World, make up the warp and woof of republican speeches, platforms and editorials these days. They could not be more violent if the federal government meditated or had actually declared a war of extermination against the white people in that section of 'our common country.' "Every misdeed or outrage," continues the World, "which occurs in the southern states no matter what the nature may be, every act of murder or robbery or burglary or counterfeiting or mail robbery, every illicit distillation of whisky and every illicit distillation of love, every evasion of the custom laws, every forgery, every case of cruelty to men or animals, every bankruptcy, every display of a shot-gun, is caught up, labelled as a specimen of the true nature of the 'solid south,' and trumpeted throughout the length and breadth of the land as a crime against the nation and against the beginning of a hellish contrivance to transform the Union into a 'league.' "Because the negroes are illiterate and poor and pay no taxes the south is denounced. Because the whites own land and want rent for it the south is denounced. The very men and women in New York who have banished the negro from their own households as being neither so honest nor so pretty to look at as white servants, join in the hue and cry against the south, because in that part of the country the African has not yet succeeded in changing the skin which they themselves impute to him as a scandal when he comes in their way at the north. The legislators of powerful northern states literally vie with one another in enacting arbitrary and repressive laws against 'tramps.' The northern press applauds the northern farmer who arms himself and his family and makes his own laws against the idle vagrants of the north. But the north will tolerate no attempt of self-protection by the southern planter and his white family against the African 'tramp' who infests southern highways and terrifies southern homes. The theories of government and of individual conduct prescribed by northern stalwarts for southern application would practically place everybody who is industrious and well-behaved at the south at the mercy of everybody who is idle and vicious."

PORTRAIT.—The Graphic of September 18th, gives us a portrait of Judge J. R. Sharpstein, the brother of Hon. B. L. Sharpstein of this place, and says: Judge Sharpstein was chosen at the recent election in California as one of the associate judges of that state, and was sworn May 9, 1878 in Ontario county, N. Y. At the age of twelve years his parents removed to Michigan, where he received his education, studied law, and was admitted to the bar in the early part of the year 1847. He then removed to Wisconsin, and while there held various public offices. At one time he was United States district attorney, and prior thereto he was a member of both branches of the legislature. In the spring of 1864 he went to California, where he has since resided and practiced law. For two years he was judge of the circuit district court of San Francisco. Last year he was a candidate for delegate to the constitutional convention, and received a majority of the entire vote cast in the county, although there were four tickets in the field. He is now identified with the Workingmen's party, and was their nominee for associate judge of the supreme court, as also the nominee of the democratic party in California, but he has been elected. He is intellectual and energetic, a liberal minded and generous hearted man, of large benevolence, much ability and personal attraction."

SELFISHNESS.—A writer in the Oregonian wants the \$100,000 that will be appropriated for the improvement of Snake river to be applied to the deepening of the "harbor" of Portland. As Portland is not likely to ever become such an absolute necessity as an adjunct to this upper country, we mildly protest against such a wholesale, downright robbery. The improvement of Snake river will be a benefit to the constantly increasing thousands of this country, and must no longer be delayed. Oregon loves us and wants us annexed; a nice mother she would make. The wholesale selfishness displayed by the writer of the article is on a par with the conduct of the citizens of Portland generally towards us up here. They grasp all they can, and give nothing in return. Their lap has always been open, and our wealth has made them rich with no effort on their part to obtain it. It has come to them because it must. A glance at the columns of any interior paper proves what we assert, for even an advertisement from Portland is not even a laud. Cause why? It would cost money!




