Newspapers are continually being made victims for the benefit of some eastern scheme. Many fall into the trap willingly, and without a thought of the consequence or the after trouble that may issue.

We have received from W. C. Hill of Hill's Land and Mining Journal, Washington City, a circular which requests us to publish and circulate, asking "Congress to make a legislative declaration of forfeitures where railroads have not been built including the one running through your (our) country."

First, because the suggestion comes from a source that has no interest in common with our people and know nothing of our isolated condition, our necessities or our interests.

The people and schemes living in Washington City enjoying the benefits of railroads, radiating in every direction, may desire a monopoly in their advantage and may desire that this beautiful North Western land should be held for sale to the roving bands of speculators in order that fat places may be made for Indian Commissioners, Agents, etc.

We are opposed to the petition secondly, because the Land Grant Railroad Co. have already graded their road 175 miles through this part of Washington Territory and are laying track at the rate of 25 miles per day, and will have entered the Southern boundary of our territory with the iron horse and passed out near its North Eastern corner before Congress could possibly pass the act suggested.
