SWEET POTATOES.—We are indebted to our friend R. HORSE SADDLES.—Mr. J. D. Cook, saddle and harness maker, has now on exhibition at his store two saddles of domestic manufacture, which for beauty of finish will compare favorably with the finest saddles we have ever seen. These are known as the "Mexican saddle," and are silver mounted, and trimmed with silver. GREEN BAKERY.—Mr. O. Brechtel has just introduced into his bakery a machine for the manufacture of crackers, which certainly is a marvel of mechanical skill. It takes the dough from the kneading trough, and first passing it through a pair of iron rollers it is rolled out to the requisite thickness; it is then passed again by means of an endless web under the stamping machine which cuts out the crackers, and passes them to the end of the machine, where all that remains to be done is the process of baking. This machine is arranged to manufacture round and square crackers, pie-cakes, bread, and in fact every description of bread known to the trade. With the aid of the improved machinery, Mr. Brechtel will be able to fill all orders in the cracker and bread line with great promptness and at low prices.

COTTONWOOD PAPER.—The Oregon City Enterprise has information that a company with a cash capital of \$75,000 is about organizing at Portland, for the manufacture of paper from cottonwood. We have no information concerning the movement alluded to, and doubt its practicability. The cottonwood of this State has fibre but it is inferior to the basswood of the Mississippi valley, both as to quantity and quality. There are, however, other fibrous growths in Oregon, of which coarse paper may be made, and those, together with cottonwood may furnish an amount of material sufficient to justify the experiment. A mixture of the Oregon woody fibres with cotton and other paper staples may, and doubtless will, prove both necessary and profitable.—Oregonian.
