



In addition to the various state and county offices which appear on the primary election ballot, voters will be able to vote for the office of Precinct Committe Officer.

Who is Eligible

Anyone who is a registered voter and a member of a major political party may become a candidate. A candidate must file a declaration of candidacy form. Since voters do not register by political party in Washington State, a candidate declares himself/herself to be a member of a political party at the time of filing.

How to File

Precinct Committee Officers will be able to file for office online. Candidates can only file for the precinct in which they are registered to vote. Candidates will have the conveniece of filing from home. *There is no filing fee for Precinct Committe Officer.*

In-Person Filing Dates: Monday through Friday, June 7 through June 11, 2010 from 8:30 a.m. till 4:00 p.m.

Becoming a Precinct Committee Officer (PCO)

The Office of Precinct Committee Officer

In addition to the various state and county offices which will appear upon the primary election ballot, most voters will have the opportunity to vote for the office of "precinct committee officer."

Who is Eligible

State law (RCW 29A.80.041) provides that any person who is a registered voter and a member of a major political party may become a candidate for the office of precinct committee officer by filing a declaration of candidacy and paying a \$1 filing fee to the county auditor or elections department. Since voters do not register by political party in Washington, a candidate declares himself/herself to be a member of a major political party at the time of the filing.

Election of Precinct Committee Officer

Candidates appear on the primary ballot for each even-numbered year. The candidate receiving the most votes in his/her precinct for each political party is elected. However, state law does provide that to be declared elected, a candidate must receive at least 10% of the number of votes cast for the candidate of his/her party receiving the greatest number of votes in that precinct.

Terms of Office and Vacancies

The terms of office for anyone elected to the office of precinct committee officer is two years, and commences the first day of December following the primary. (RCW 29A.80.051) Should a vacancy occur in the office (by reason of death, disqualification, resignation, or because of failure to elect), the respective county chair of the county central committee shall fill the vacancy by appointment. (RCW 29A.28.071)

Duties as a Member of the County and State Central Committees

1. Each officer is a member of the county central committee. The county central committee has the authority to fill vacancies on the party ticket for partisan county offices and for legislative office in districts entirely within that county. Also, they elect members to the state central committee.
2. The state central committee has the authority to:
 - Call Caucuses and conventions
 - Provide for the election of delegates to the national nominating convention
 - Fill vacancies on the party ticket for any federal, state or legislative office that encompasses more than one county
 - Nominate persons to fill vacancies caused by resignation or death of an incumbent of that party in state offices and legislative offices in districts that encompass more than one county
 - Provide for the nomination of presidential electors

Non-Statutory Duties and Responsibilities

The following duties are commonly assigned by the party organization:

- Attend meetings of county committees and actively participate in fund-raising activities
- Obtain lists of registered voters from the County Auditor's Office or Elections Department





Special legislative races coming up in '09

It's an off-year for legislative-congressional-statewide elections — blessed be our ears! — but a number of counties will be picking state legislators to fill unexpired vacancies. Two beloved members of the House died after being re-elected last fall — Democrat Bill Grant of the 16th District and Republican Steve Hailey in the 9th — and a third state representative, 15th District Republican Dan Newhouse, was appointed agriculture director by the Democratic governor.

Successors were chosen by county commissioners in the 9th and 16th — former Rep. Don Cox (above left) returning to Oly to fill in for Hailey and Grant's daughter, Laura Grant-Herriot (lower left), replacing her dad. (Photos courtesy of House Photography.) The Newhouse replacement has not been tapped yet. Under state law, the three seats will be on the ballot later this year so voters can directly choose a lawmaker for the remaining year in the term.



The state Elections Division says candidates can line up during the regularly scheduled Filing Week, June 1-5. If only one or two people file, there will be no primary for that office and the race will skip to the General Election on November 3. If more than two people file, there will be a Top 2 Primary on August 18 and the two most popular will advance to main event.
