This volunteer group of cultural preservation specialists, first responders, and representatives of FEMA and state and local emergency agencies has met monthly since February 2004. CEMT is an outgrowth of the Alliance for Response Forum sponsored by Heritage Preservation and held at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston in November 2003. Its goal is to function as a clearinghouse and portal to local resources for both the cultural heritage and emergency management communities. A new Web site is under development, and subcommittees on planning, logistics, administration, and operations are being organized.

Heritage Emergency Response Alliance

The Heritage Emergency Response Alliance (HERA) is an affiliation of institutions and persons interested in preserving the cultural heritage within the Metro Atlanta area and serving as a resource to cultural institutions in Georgia. HERA's strategy is to enhance disaster preparedness through networking and information sharing, encouraging disaster planning, providing opportunities

for training, interacting with local and state emergency management, preparing to respond collectively to disasters in the region, and identifying existing resources needed after a disaster.

Philadelphia Alliance for Response
