



Once you have your PowerPoint the way you like it if you go to File #1 Export #2Create a Video you're almost there. #3 shows where you can set how long you want each slide to appear and then you click on #4 and it will export your slide show as an mp4.



You could call it good here but if you want to have some fun why not move it into MovieMaker.





MovieMaker actually has a lot of great features but you really don't need more than the basics. Click on "Add videos and photos" and go find that mp4 you just created. It may take a few minutes to upload.

If you want to add music to your production go to the “Add music” button. From there you can add any music you have on your computer. But don’t forget copyright. Moviemaker links from the “Add music” button to the Free Music Archive which is a good place to find music to add to your video

The Free Music Archive has a variety of ways to search, by mood, genre and artist or song title. You can listen to a track by clicking on the black arrow #2. Once you've found something you like, click on the down arrow and it will save the mp3 to your downloads folder. Going back to MovieMaker click the Add Music button find and upload the file.



There are lots of things that MovieMaker can do but really just the basics are very powerful. Near the top of the screen you will see two tabs "Video Tools" and "Music Tools". When you are editing video be sure you're on that tab, same for music. Here you can #1 split a track (two splits and delete a piece) #2 speed up or slow down a track and #3 adjust volume or make it fade in and out.



Once you have everything the way you like it, click on the blue drop down in the upper left. You can choose “Publish movie” and upload to the web right away or you can choose to save the movie to your computer. I normally choose “For High Definition Display. And that’s Pretty much it. Have fun with this. It’s much easier than you ever dreamed possible.
