



# Services to Libraries: 37<sup>th</sup> Legislative District

The Washington State Library (WSL) is the only agency in Washington that is specifically designated by law to assist libraries and to ensure that residents of the entire state have access to library and information services. WSL achieves these goals using federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds, offering projects to improve libraries, consulting services, grants, subsidies and training to libraries.

Examples of services include support for digital literacy programming, Microsoft Office training and industry-recognized certification, early literacy programming, professional grants, specialized training for library administration, circulating STEM kits, group cost-sharing for online databases, and 24/7 online reference support for college students and Washington residents.



Approximately \$1.37 of federal LSTA funding is received to support libraries for each dollar of state funding.



# Impact of LSTA Library Funding: 37<sup>th</sup> District



Garfield High School used a Digital Literacy grant to train its librarian and five staff members on using a 3-D printer. They combined their new skills with a grant from the Experience Music Project to develop lesson plans with a guest artist. The students created stamps to use in ceramic sculptures. This project is an example of how collaboration among different community groups helps to enrich the overall experience for the students. This was a successful and enjoyable project that gave students STEM skills and a window into what work in the field could be like.



Seven schools in this district received Refreshing School Library grants, each receiving \$1,000 to purchase nonfiction books for their school libraries. Here are a few comments from the happy librarians:
