



Services to Libraries: 46th Legislative District

The Washington State Library (WSL) is the only agency in Washington that is specifically designated by law to assist libraries and to ensure that residents of the entire state have access to library and information services. WSL achieves these goals using federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds, offering projects to improve libraries, consulting services, grants, subsidies and training to libraries.

Examples of services include support for digital literacy programming, Microsoft Office training and industry-recognized certification, early literacy programming, professional grants, specialized training for library administration, circulating STEM kits, group cost-sharing for online databases, and 24/7 online reference support for college students and Washington residents.

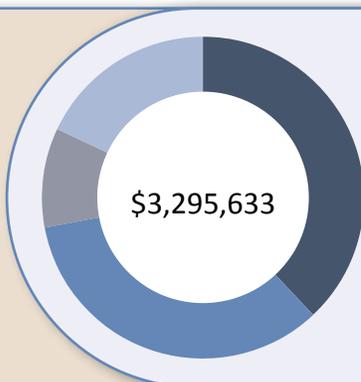

Impact of LSTA Library Funding: 46th District



The Seattle Public Library partnered with the Washington State Library to provide free Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS) certification exams. Through this partnership, 471 exams have been given saving the students a total of \$58,375. The average participant age was 40 and the exams were given to both existing and new library users. Most of the participants were unemployed and actively seeking employment. Participants reported that they used their new skills at work and many have assumed more work responsibilities. Thirty-six percent reported securing employment, and 7 percent were given a promotion.
