### A Message from the Director

We've been busy getting books out to you and processing new and returned books. There is always something keeping us hopping, and this past quarter has been no different!

WTBBL hosted a wonderful Volunteer Appreciation Event on April 18. More than 60 people attended and enjoyed a talk by local mystery writer Kevin O'Brien. On April 26, three WTBBL staff presented on library services to the underserved at a joint conference of the Washington and Oregon library associations. El día de los niños/El día de los libros (Children's Day/Book Day) is an annual celebration of children, families, and reading that culminates on April 30. WTBBL participated for the second year and mailed braille and large-print materials to kids and teens using our service. The celebration emphasizes the importance of literacy for children of all linguistic and cultural backgrounds.

Our ninth Ten-Squared High Tea for WTBBL patrons over 100 years of age was held the Saturday before Mother's Day and was a truly memorable event. Of the 63 centenarians actively borrowing books (including a 110 year old), we had 30 new inductees in the club, and three centenarians attended the event with their families and friends.

This quarter's "Technology at the Library" will focus on the audio and braille books that are available for WTBBL patrons. If you have any questions about the following tips, or want more information, feel free to call the library at (206) 615-0400 or (800) 542-0866, or visit our new downloading page at www.wtbbl.org/downloadbooks.

There are three sites for our downloadable material: BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Downloads), WTBBL Locally Produced Audio Books, and WTBBL Braille Books. You can also find all books on all of the sites using the WTBBL catalog: http://webopac. klas.com/wtbbl, and can download the audio formats directly from the catalog by selecting the link associated with the "Document Link" field. Books on BARD will start with DB for digital books and BR or BRC for braille books; WTBBL downloadable audio books start with DBW and WTBBL downloadable braille books start with BRW. The link in the "Document Link" field will either start the download or take you to the log-in page.

BARD (Braille and Audio Reading Downloads) Tips

To log into BARD (bard.loc.gov) to download one of the thousands of audio book or braille titles available, you will need your email address and a password. To sign up for an account, fill out the application at https://nlsbard.loc.gov/NLS/ ApplicationInstructions.html.

Once you have access to a BARD account, the following tips will help you to find titles you want to download and change settings to your account.

Tip 1: Searching for Books: Throughout this section, I will use James Patterson's *Alex Cross* series as my example.

- When you know part of the book title or the author's name: Use the "Search the Collection" text box to enter your search keywords and use quotation marks around your search topic to limit the results.
- Example: If I am looking for the first book in James Patterson's series, I would enter "Along came a spider," or even "Came a spider" and BARD would pull up the audio book and braille version of that book. I could also enter "Patterson, James" (last name, first name) to see all of Patterson's books.
- Finding books in a series: Now that I have found Patterson's first book, you may want to see what else we have in the *Alex Cross* series. If you select the link for the book title, in this situation, *Along Came a Spider* DB 35894, you will reach the title page (summary listing) for this book. On this page you will find a link called "*Alex Cross* series," which

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will take you to a list of all of the books on BARD in this series. The series field also tells you that this book is volume 1 in the series.

- Finding books by the same author: Also on the title page, you can click on the link for the author's name – "Patterson, James" – and receive a list of all of the other books by Patterson on BARD.
- Add to my wish list: Another great feature found on the Title page is the "Add to my wish list" link, which will add *Along Came a Spider* DB 35894 to a wish list where you can track books you want to download in the future. To see what books are on your wish list, you can go to the BARD main page and look under "settings."

Tip 2: Additional Links on BARD main page: There are several items on the BARD main page that may make your searching faster and help to manage your account. The "Additional Links" section is a heading at the bottom of the main page. Here you will find links to "My Wish List," "My Previous Downloads," "Update account settings," "NLS Catalog," "Braille Book Review," "Talking Book Topics," "Latest DTBM firmware and installation instructions" and "Help." To learn more about what each of these links does, please visit our new downloads page at www.wtbbl.org/downloadbooks. WTBBL Local Audio Book Tips

To log into the WTBBL local book site (www.wtbbl.org/login.aspx), you will need a WTBBL Username and Password (different from your BARD log-in credentials). If you have already signed up for BARD, you should have received information on how to access these books. This is the same username and password used to log into the WTBBL online catalog. Downloading WTBBL's local books uses the same procedure as BARD. On this page you will also find "Recently Added Books" at the top, as well as a search box to find specific titles within all uploaded books.

### Updates

NLS audio magazines now on digital cartridge

In the spring of 2013, NLS launched its transition of the magazine program from analog cassettes to digital cartridges. Going forward, all NLS-produced magazines will be circulated on digital cartridge, and we hope you will enjoy the enhanced sound guality and navigation capabilities. As with books on digital cartridge, the magazines need to be returned. The cartridge loan period for weekly publications is one week after you receive them. The cartridge loan period for monthly, bimonthly and quarterly publications is one month after you receive them. Please treat magazine cartridges the same as book cartridges: read your publications, return the cartridge to the red container, flip the mailing card on the container, and place it with your outgoing mail. The timely reading and returning of magazine cartridges will help NLS continue to provide the high-quality audiomagazine program you have enjoyed.

In some cases you may receive a magazine cartridge that has more than one magazine on it. The NLS digital talking book player is equipped with a bookshelf feature to assist you in navigating your digital cartridge. To activate the bookshelf feature, press and hold the green Play/Stop button on your player until you hear a beep. Complete audio instructions for using the bookshelf feature are included on all cartridges that contain more than one magazine issue. Keep in mind that any magazine cartridge that has a monthly, bimonthly or quarterly publication on it—even if it also has a weekly publication on it—will have a loan period of one month after you receive it. Enjoy your audio magazines and please remember to return them.

The next Brown Bag Book Club will be held at WTBBL on Thursday, September 5, at noon. The book we will be discussing is Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein*. This classic is available as braille book BR 12173, large print book LP 6845, digital book DB 25835, and cassette book RC 25835 and RC 25706 (in Spanish).

Nearly 200 years after its publication, the story of scientist Victor Frankenstein harried by his monstrous creation still stands as one of fiction's most thoughtful and frightening considerations of man's relationship with the natural world and what can go wrong when ambition outstrips understanding.

#### Adult Services Librarian Picks by Herrick Heitman

NLS often records new books that are set in the Pacific Northwest. Here are a few recent titles:

#### Audio: Fiction

DB 75209 Dream Lake [#3, Friday Harbor Romances] by Lisa Kleypas. Friday Harbor contractor Alex Nolan is remodeling Zoë Hoffman's cottage to accommodate her grandmother, who has dementia. But a friendly ghost searching for his past love haunts Alex. Companion to Rainshadow Road (DB 74252). Some strong language and some explicit descriptions of sex. 2012.

#### Audio: Adult Nonfiction

DB 74915 *The Bitter Waters of Medicine Creek: A Tragic Clash between White and Native America* by Richard Kluger. Pulitzer Prize winner chronicles the relationship between indigenous tribes and white settlers in 1850s Washington Territory. Examines the role of the first governor, Isaac Stevens, and the treaties, revolts, and massacres that led to the trial and hanging of Nisqually leader Leschi in 1858. Discusses Leschi's 2004 exoneration. 2011.

#### **Braille Fiction**

BR 19392 *A Turn in the Road* [#8, *Blossom Street Novels*] by Debbie Macomber. Bethanne, from *A Good Yarn* (BR 16187), and her daughter join Bethanne's former mother-in-law Ruth on a cross-country road trip to Florida. Ruth heads for her 50th high school reunion while Bethanne considers her ex-husband's wish to reunite. Along the way, Bethanne falls in love. 2011.

DBW 8470 Yuko-chan and the Daruma Doll: The Adventures of a Blind Japanese Girl Who Saves Her Village by Sunny Seki. Yuko-chan does amazing things like interrupting a late-night theft at the temple to traversing a treacherous mountain pass to deliver food to neighbors. She creates the famous Daruma doll and saves her village from the ravages of a volcanic disaster. Kindergarten to grade 3. 2012.

### DBW 8438 *Silhouetted by the Blue* by Traci L. Jones.

After the death of her mother in an automobile accident, seventh-grader Serena, who has been given the lead role in her middle school play, is left to handle the day-to-day challenges of caring for herself and her younger brother when their father cannot pull himself out of his depression. For grades 6 to 9. 2011.

BR 19614; DBW 8312 *Will Grayson, Will Grayson* by John Green and David Levithan. Two Chicago teen boys, one gay and one straight, meet accidentally and discover that they share the same name. One of them begins to date the other's best friend, Tiny. Then Tiny produces a musical extravaganza about their lives. For senior high and older readers. Stonewall Honor. 2010.

#### You Gave BIG!

On May 15, WTBBL participated for the second year in the Give BIG 24-hour fundraising blitz. The Seattle Foundation independently raised \$800,000 from corporate sponsors to provide a matching fund for more than 1,500 charities.

WTBBL donors really came through for us in Give BIG this year. More than 60 donors, three-fourths of them new, contributed \$4,725. This is a 269 percent increase over our results in 2012, both in funds raised and in number of donors giving. This qualified us for a matching gift from the Seattle Foundation that put us over the \$5,000 mark.
