

MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD!

Use your voice in the election of your Democratic Party Candidate.

How will we elect the Democratic Party candidates in 2005?

The U.S. courts have ruled that the right of political parties to choose their nominees is protected by the U.S. Constitution. The Republican, Libertarian and Democratic Parties are challenging the top-two primary system that was passed by initiative in November as unconstitutional. If the courts do not agree that this top-two system is unconstitutional, the political parties have each set up rules to nominate their own candidates for partisan offices. (For complete rules of the 2005 Democratic Party nominating process visit www.kcdems.org or call 206-622-9157).

The County Democratic Party organizations will be holding nominating conventions in May and June to nominate their candidates for partisan offices that will appear on the September primary ballot. The elected and appointed Precinct Committee Officers (PCOs) will meet to elect their nominees for the Districts they live in. The candidate nominated will be placed on the primary ballot with the Democratic symbol beside their name. No other candidate will be able to run as the Democratic Party candidate.

This process will be in place for partisan offices only and will likely change in 2006 depending on action by the legislature or the courts.

How does my voice get heard in the nomination process?

The Democratic Party wants Democrats to get involved. We will actually have a more open process than the Republicans. The Democratic Party will be using our Precinct Committee Officers, which are elected by their neighbors every even-numbered year. The Republicans will be using the caucus style system, which is highly Party-driven on the Republican side and limited in the number of people who are allowed to participate. You can get involved in the Democratic Party nominating process two ways:

- 1) Become a Precinct Committee Officer. May 27, 2005, close of the business day, was the deadline for becoming an appointed PCO. All elected and appointed PCOs will have voice and voting rights at the convention.
- 2) If you did not want to become a PCO you may contact your neighborhood PCO and let them know what Democratic candidate you want to be nominated. This is the most direct form of citizen democracy there is. If your precinct does not have a PCO then contact the one closest to you. The PCOs that are elected and appointed will be seeking your input as well.

As the Democratic Party, we strive year-round to make sure that the rights of citizens to elect their representatives are protected at all levels. We know that this process will not appeal to some; however, we must continue to protect the first amendment rights of the voters we represent. You can have a say and we want you to have a say!

**Operating Rules
for the King County Democratic Nominating Convention

(Adopted by the KCDCC Executive Board - May 24, 2005)

General

Only Democratic Precinct Officers elected on September 21, 2004, and those Precinct Committee Officers appointed by the King County Democratic Chair by May 27, 2005, may participate in any voting or nominating of candidates. Nominations shall not occur prior to 7:15 p.m.

Any challenges to a Precinct Committee Officer's eligibility to participate must be made in writing to the King County Democratic Chair no later than 6:00 p.m. on June 27, 2005. The Credentials Committee shall review and rule on all challenges.

During the counting of ballots by the tally committee, candidates in those races where ballots are being counted may appoint one observer. The candidate must notify the permanent chair of that particular meeting who their official observer is prior to the counting of the ballots by the tally committee.

In a position where only one candidate has been nominated, that position may be voted on by acclamation.

A PCO's vote shall be weighted, based on the 2000 Presidential results.

All ballots are public record and shall be in the possession of the King County Democratic Chair.

Proxy votes are not allowed.

No other business outside of the nominating of candidates shall take place at the nominating convention.

Any motion to modify or suspend these rules shall be out of order.

Executive

The Chair of the King County Democratic Party shall serve as permanent chair during the King County Executive nominating process. The Chair shall appoint a secretary, parliamentarian, sergeant-at-arms, credentials chair and committee, and tally committee chair and committee. The Chair shall take nominations from the floor. Each nomination requires a second. The nomination and seconding of a candidate shall not count against any time limit.

Candidates shall have up to five minutes to present their candidacy. This can include testimonials from other individuals. The order of presentations shall be in the order nominations were taken.

At conclusion of all presentations, up to ten minutes of questions shall be taken from the floor. All questions must be directed to all candidates. Candidates shall have up to one minute to respond to questions.

All eligible precinct committee officers must sign their ballots. Ballots must be cast for one candidate only and cannot be split.

Abstentions are in order, but shall not count towards the vote totals. Non-signed ballots shall be considered a spoiled ballot and not count toward the vote totals.

A simple majority of votes is needed. If a majority is not obtained by a candidate on the first ballot, the candidate with the least amount of votes shall be dropped, and voting shall take place again. This method will continue to take place until a candidate receives a majority of the vote. In the event that only two candidates remain and a tie occurs, the tie shall be broken by lot by the remaining candidates.

Upon the nomination of the Executive, the Chair will direct the Precinct Committee Officers to convene by County Council District in which they were elected or appointed.

County Council

The Chair of the King County Democratic Party shall appoint a permanent Chair for each of the nine County Council nominating meetings. The permanent Chair of the County Council nominating meeting shall appoint a secretary, parliamentarian, and a tally chair and committee.

The permanent Chair shall take nominations from the floor. Each nomination requires a second. The nomination and seconding of a candidate shall not count against any time limit.

Candidates shall have up to five minutes to present their candidacy. This can include testimonials from other individuals. The order of presentations shall be in the order nominations were taken.

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Upon the nomination of the County Council position, the permanent Chair will immediately report to the King County Democratic Chair the results.

By Laws

Bylaws: Libertarian Party of West King County
As amended on January 11, 2001

Article I: Identity and Purpose

- A. The name of this organization is the Libertarian Party of West King County, hereinafter referred to as "the Party" – a regional affiliate of the Libertarian Party of Washington State, hereinafter referred to as "the LPWS."
- B. The LPWS Statement of Principles affirms the philosophy upon which the Libertarian Party is founded: The purpose of the Party is to proclaim and implement the LPWS Statement of Principles, by:
- a. Nominating, endorsing and running candidates for office in the region, and
 - b. Entering into political information and educational activities.
 - c. Promoting local organizations, political and/or social, below the regional level.

The controlling document of the Party is these Party Bylaws. Authority for all matters not specifically addressed by Party Bylaws will be Robert's Rules of Order.

Article II: Definitions

- A. General Business Meetings. All attending Party Members may vote. General Business Meetings are required for interim election of officers, interim amendments to these Bylaws, or other purposes determined by the Chair.
- B. Board Meetings. Open meetings for conducting Central Committee business. All attending Party Officials may vote. May occur in conjunction with Supper Club events or separately, as called by the Chair.
- C. Required Meeting Notices. For General Business Meetings and Conventions: minimum 30 days prior notice via state and/or regional newsletter, email and web site announcements. For all other open meetings, including Board Meetings: 14 days prior

notice via email and web site. Email is the equivalent of postal mail.

Article III: Membership

Voting membership in the regional Party consists of all current dues-paying LPWS members who reside within the geographic boundaries of this regional party.

Article IV: Central Committee

A. All powers of management and administration reside in the Central Committee. The Central Committee will include up to eight (8) voting members elected by the Party membership – four (4) party officers and four (4) Directors. Directors are also Committee Chairs for their defined responsibility.

B. The Central Committee will convene in open board meetings, at least four times per year. A quorum will consist of at least half the current number of elected Party Officials. General Business Meetings are required for (a) interim election of Party Official (s); or (b) proposed amendment(s) to these Bylaws.

Article V: Party Officials

A. There will be four (4) Party officers: Regional Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. If the position of Regional Chair becomes vacant, the line of succession will follow the order listed in this Section.

B. There will be up to four (4) Directors, accountable directly to the membership: Supper Club Director, Membership Director, Communications Director, and Campaigns Director.

C. Officials will be elected by a majority of Party members attending the Party convention. Officials will be elected individually, in the order designated in Section A of this Article. Terms of office will commence immediately upon adjournment, will run until the next annual convention. Only members of the state and regional Parties are eligible to serve as Officials. Officers and Directors may be removed by a 3/5 vote of the Central Committee.

D. The Central Committee may allocate expense budgets for the responsibility of, and the control by, individual Officers and Directors. Officers and Directors may not exceed their budgeted expenses without majority approval by the Central Committee.

E. The duties of each Officer and Director will be as follows:

- The Regional Chair will preside at all Party meetings, and act as CEO of the Party. The Chair may appoint non-officer positions such as Office Manager, Database Manager, Archives Manager, or non-voting Committee Chairs for such

functions as Fundraising, Convention Organizing, etc. If a Directorship is vacant, the Chair may appoint an interim Chair for that committee, however only elected Directors may vote on the Central Committee.

- The Vice Chair will preside at Party meetings in the absence of the Regional Chair. The Vice-Chair will also be responsible for keeping abreast of, and fulfilling, current requirements to maintain certification by the State Party – as defined in the LPWS Constitution and Bylaws.
- The Secretary will record and maintain Minutes of party meetings and conventions, and be a signing officer for Party documents.
- The Treasurer will maintain the Party's bank accounts, deposit all revenues, and pay all bills. A formal Treasurer's Report will be presented at least once per calendar quarter.
- The Communications Director (Chair) is responsible for a Member Newsletter, Advertising, Public Relations and a regional Web Site – as and if the Central Committee authorizes and budgets each activity.
- The Campaigns Director (Chair) will recruit candidates and campaign teams for elected office, coordinate campaigns and volunteers where possible, and encourage members to seek appointed office.
- The Membership Director (Chair) will coordinate membership recruiting and retention with both the state and national parties, and provide local Welcome/Orientation to new members.

Article V. Supper Club Committee

A. The Supper Club Committee will consist of no more than three members, elected directly by members at any Supper Club meeting, responsible for monthly dinner/speaker meetings at the regional level. The Committee will elect its own Chair (Director). This Article may be amended only at a Supper Club meeting.

B. The Supper Club Mission is to conduct political outreach on issues affecting both economic and civil liberties, at primarily the state and local levels, both on-site and through print and broadcast media.

Article VI: Representative, State Central Committee

A. The regional Party will elect Regional Representative(s) to the State Central Committee, of sufficient number as permitted by LPWS Bylaws. All candidates who accept nomination to Regional

Representative will be considered elected as either a Representative or an Alternate, based on the ranked order of votes received.

B. To assure full representation at meetings of the State Central Committee, the Chair may appoint temporary Regional Representatives or Alternates to vacant positions, for later approval by the membership.

Article VII: Annual Conventions

A. The Party will hold its Convention in January of each year, or by no later than June 30, for electing Officers, Directors and Regional Representatives; amending bylaws; and nominating or endorsing candidates. A separate convention may be called, for nominations and/or endorsements.

B. Voting delegates will have been members of the Party for at least 60 days before the Convention date.

Article VIII. Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a simple majority vote at Party conventions, or by a 3/5 majority at any general business meeting. The complete text of all proposed amendments must be provided, and/or made available by request, as part of the required 30-day prior notice.

Establishing parental notification requirements for abortion
(-)

Companion Bill: **HB 1433**

Prohibiting nonphysicians from performing abortions.
(-)

Finds that the medical risks to the health of women as a result of obtaining an abortion makes it necessary to clarify that only qualified health care personnel may perform abortions or assist in performing abortions.

Prevents all use of public funding for abortions except for extremely life-threatening situations.

Requires all hospitals and lawful abortion clinics to report all details of every abortion, every patient's history, every patient's personal information, etc. to the department of health.

Requires that copies are also sent to the biological mother of the patient, and biological father if possible.

Requiring notice of breast cancer risks related to abortion -SB **SB 5820** **Feb 8: First reading, referred to Health & Long-Term Care**

Would make it unlawful to provide an abortion without informing the patient of any and all possible research which may arise linking abortion to breast cancer.

Effectively makes parental consent required for abortions for minors.

Makes it illegal for a person to perform an abortion unless they have enough insurance to cover any potential lawsuit due to "reproductive cancers".

The best approach to protecting youth in

this environment is to support the resources that they trust and to ensure that young people have as much accurate, objective information about sexual health as possible.
