**BLAINE'S TRIBUTE TO GARFIELD.**

Blaine's recent famous and eloquent oration on the life, character and death of the late President Garfield, delivered in the Hall of the House in the presence of Senators and Representatives, the President and Cabinet, Judges of the Supreme Court, Diplomatic Corps, and representatives of the Army and Navy, would fill nearly a page of the MAIL, and therefore its publication in full is quite out of the question; but we do the next best thing by giving an editorial summary from the S. F. Chronicle:

The occasion was one of the best efforts of a great speaker, and Blaine did not disappoint expectation. The oration is so substantial and yet succinct an abridgment of the subject that the future historian of these times may adopt it literally in his description of the life, character and tragic death of the second American President who was murdered in office. Blaine has even saved history the trouble of hunting up the ancestry of Garfield. He explains that, on the paternal side, he came from the English Puritan stock; on the maternal, from that grand race, the French Huguenots. Like his ancestry, he possessed an inflexible love of liberty and hatred of tyrants. He was proud of his blood. Respect for it helped no doubt to inspire him to noble deeds. Blaine dissipates the popular stories of the extreme poverty of his parents and of his own indigence in boyhood. Poor they were; but it was that kind of poverty closely associated with the independence to which the parents of Clay, Andrew Jackson, Webster, Douglas, and so many distinguished Americans reared in the West any time from a century to half a century ago were subjected. They were owners of land and had to cultivate it for a subsistence; but their poverty was far removed from indigence. Like them, Garfield was the architect of his own fortune. He worked for the money that educated him. He was a teacher before he entered the University. He taught school and ran a canal-boat to earn the money on which he was enabled to graduate. He was a teacher at 18; entered the Junior class of Williams College at 22. He graduated at 24. Up to this time there was nothing visible in his life or character but what he claimed by thousands of American youths. Ambitious he was, and most young Americans of superior intelligence are. But immediately after leaving college he entered on an upward course, which from that to the end of his life was rapid without a parallel. He was a student at a college, a State Senator in Ohio, Colonel, Brigadier, Major-General in the Army of the Cumberland, and a member of Congress. He acquitted himself with distinguished honor in every one of these important offices, so diverse in their requirements. As a Colonel, with an inferior force of raw troops, he defeated and routed a West Point Confederate General in Kentucky and received the encomiums of his superior officer and of the President. Early in 1863, after taking part in the second day's battle at Shiloh, he was promoted to the rank of Major-General and assigned to the duty of Chief of Staff for General Rosecrans. In this capacity he served at the battle of Chickamauga. Such were his military merits that when General Thomas had reorganized the army of the Cumberland he offered Garfield command of a division. But he was then a member-elect for the Ashland district to Congress, and with a consciousness that that was his proper place, and by the earnest solicitation of Lincoln and Stanton, he accepted the election, resigned from the army, and three days thereafter took his seat in the Thirty-eighth Congress. Blaine also had his congressional initiation at the same time. It was probably without exception the greatest of all American Congresses, and Blaine, so well situated to give a true judgment, declares that in sixty days Garfield ranked as a leader and was recognized as such by all. He was nine times elected from the same district—an honor, according to Blaine, that but six members of Congress from the formation of the Government to this day have enjoyed. A great leader and controller of parties in the sense that Clay, Douglas and Thaddeus Stevens were great he was not. But if he was less incisive for present success as a leader than these illustrious predecessors, he built on a surer foundation for fame. Blaine thinks that if no other authority were accessible, Garfield's speeches in the House, from December, 1863, to June, 1880, would give a well-connected history and complete defense of the important legislation of the seventeen eventful years that constituted his parliamentary life. With admirable tact the orator compares Garfield to all the most eminent men who have earned renown in our public life. Like Seward, he "had faith in the all-conquering power of principle." Like John Quincy Adams he was a man of indefatigable industry and painstaking. Like Webster, he was distinguished by "ponderous elements." With Sir Robert Peel he shared a spirit of independence. Like Burke, "he loved the sublime and beautiful" in eloquence, and was useful in analysis and faultless in statement. Like Fox, he was majestic in debate.

Though Blaine thinks "it was not mere chance" that made him President, he admits that his nomination at Chicago "was not anticipated" and something of a surprise. The plain inference from the oration is that Garfield did not seek the nomination, as his enemies covertly intimate. The highest prize to which an American can aspire being won, Blaine tells us that Garfield soon wearied of it. His duties were not all these years. "I have been dealing with these years," he once remarked to Blaine, "with ideas, and here I am dealing only with persons; I have been treating of fundamental principles of government, and here I am considering all day whether A or B shall be appointed to this or that office." Had he lived, Blaine assures the country that there would have been a radical reform in the mode of appointment and in the tenure of office. With regard to the New York imbroglio, Blaine declares that the President was from first to last free from all thought of punishing any one and acting with the sole purpose of maintaining the constitutional authority of the Executive. This statement, made on an occasion of such solemnity by a man of such unimpeachable honor as Blaine, who stood so close to the late President from his inauguration to his death, will be accepted by the whole country as true, and ought to satisfy even the most stalwart of the stalwarts.

WELL SAID.—The National Republican of Washington City recently remarked as follows concerning the Chinese question, which the people of the Pacific Coast will duly appreciate: "The question of restriction is now pending in Congress; 'Almost the entire population of the Pacific Slope, including the clergy, the literary, the press, and leading men and women in every walk of life are hostile to the Chinese. This fact is sufficient to outweigh the garrulous gush of sentimentalists who have no practical knowledge of the subject. The Christians and philanthropists of California are quite as likely to be right in this matter, that lies at their doors, as their brethren 3000 or 4000 miles away. The Chinese are the only class of immigrants that compete directly with the working women of the United States in the few occupations by which a poor and unlearned woman may earn bread for herself and children.'"

GENERAL FREMONT'S CLAIM.—Gen. John C. Fremont has filed a petition in Congress in which he claims to be owner in fee simple of Alcatraz Island, and asks that his claim be referred to the Court of Claims for adjudication. Fremont sets forth that while he was Military Governor of California, in 1847, he purchased for the United States the said island, commonly called Bird's Island, lying at the inner end of the straits which make the entrance from the Pacific Ocean into the bay of San Francisco, which he gave the name of Golden Gate; that the United States Government refused to accept, and repudiated the purchase, and made it the subject of a charge for a court-martial in 1848, where in fact the purchase of the island was declared to be an assumption of power on the part of Fremont, and mutiny against the U. S. Government. In 1856 Fremont paid the bond given for the purchase and became owner of the island. The Government afterwards, finding that the island was the key to the harbor of San Francisco, and indispensably necessary as a point for establishing a light-house or fort, did, without his consent or knowledge, take possession, and still holds the said island as property of the Government.

The Chicago clergyman who succeeded to the Rev. Dr. Collier's pulpit and recently stepped down and out because he had lost his faith was certainly honest, but he showed bad taste in his leave-taking. His last sermon was a bombshell which would have delighted Bob Ingersoll. He advised the church to guard well the gates of hell, for when they fall, said he "the chief scourge in the hands of the Church has lost its lash. Nay! the system then already totters to its fall; for the foundations of orthodoxy are laid in the bed of hell." He thought the churches of the next century would preach the doctrine of morality for its own sake. A curious antithesis to this case is that of the Rev. O. B. Frothingham, who, after preaching a kind of ethical culture and religion of morality for twenty years, declared a few months ago that his system was a failure, and abandoned the pulpit for literature.

THE NEWSPAPERS OF THE WORLD.—From the advance sheets of H. P. Hubbard's "Newspaper and Bank Directory of the World," it is learned that there are published 34,274 newspapers and periodicals, with a circulation of (in round numbers) 116,000,000 copies, the annual aggregate circulation reaching 10,582,000,000 copies, about 64 papers per year to each inhabitant of the globe. Europe leads with 19,657, and North America follows with 12,400, the two together making over nine-tenths of all the publications in existence. Asia has 775; South America, 669; Australasia, 661. Of all these, 16,500 are printed in the English language, 7,800 in German, 3,850 in French, and over 1,600 in Spanish. There are 5,020 daily newspapers, 18,274 tri-weeklies, and 8,508 issued less frequently. It appears that while the annual aggregate circulation of publications in the United States is 2,600,000,000, that of Great Britain and Ireland is 2,260,000,000. The work will also contain the names of about 20,000 banks and bankers of all countries.

**CONKLING Declines the Justiceship.**  
CONKLING, though confirmed by the Senate, has declined the Supreme Justiceship tendered him by President Arthur. Senator Edmunds has been offered the position but declines. He would accept had it been tendered him when Conkling was nominated, but will not now take it second-hand.

PHYSICIANS are authority for the statement that there are at present about five thousand cases of measles in San Francisco, confined principally to children. This is what Spookendyke would characterize as a "d. g. mealy" city.

The great Eastern journals publish weekly editions for one dollar a year, and the reason they do it is that their immense circulation gives them a great price for advertising, so that one week's advertising in the New York Weekly Tribune amounts to more than a year's income of an ordinary country newspaper, but the readers of the country newspaper cannot see why the Weekly Tribune sells cheaper than the local paper. Advertising makes all the difference.


THE LATEST METHOD for propelling street cars is by immense springs on the principle of the mainspring of a watch. A company to furnish this motive power for cars has been organized in the east; and they claim that from six to ten coils of springs on each car will be sufficient to run twelve miles without winding up. The cost of propelling a car one year by this invention, the company claims, will about equal the keeping of a team of horses a fortnight.

It is asserted that a grandson of John C. Calhoun lately has said that if his grandfather could have realized the possibility of such improvement and development as the South is now making without slavery, and that the negro would so rapidly show capacity and industry as a freeman, there would years ago have been abolition of slavery by the will of the South, and secession would have been impossible. If the roads should put prices up again they would be at the mercy of Spreckles, and they continue to buy of him in fear and trembling. It is pleasant to read that Congress has in consideration the repeal of the Hawaiian treaty on which the monopoly is founded.

LOCAL NEWS AND COMMENTS.

THE MAIL AND CHRONICLE.

THE MAIL has entered into arrangements with the San Francisco Chronicle whereby subscribers may obtain both papers for one year for \$10.00.

A GOOD WORK, which we should have noted some weeks ago, is a fine draw-bridge across the navigable slough at Mr. R. E. Whitney's place, the expense of which, amounting to \$500, was entirely borne by Mr. W. and his neighbors in about this proportion: Whitney, \$200; neighbors' volunteer work, \$210. The dimensions of this good work may be stated as follows: Width of slough, 303 ft; depth, 14 ft; draw, balanced on car, 65 ft; width of draw in clear, 25 ft. The bridge is substantially planked over, and is altogether a very creditable piece of work. Those having the project of building a similar bridge across Sullivan Slough would do well to examine the Whitney bridge and see how far it is desirable to adopt the plan.

THE LOGGING BUSINESS promises to be very brisk in this (Whatcom) County the coming season, for in addition to a dozen or more camps on the Skagit five or six will operate in the Samish and Padilla district. The timber supply on the Skagit and Samish is practically inexhaustible—at least for the present generation. To be sure, the very choice and most desirable tracts, close to the bay and river, are being rapidly taken up under the Timber Act, but by the time the front claims are worked out a system of railroads to the interior belts will be inaugurated, so that a few miles distance will not be so much an objection as at present; and then, there is the Nooksack and the region of Lake Terrell and Birch Bay yet untouched. Camps are now being established as high up the Skagit River as Minkler's saw-mill, some forty miles up the river, and indeed may go twice farther—clear to the Portage if necessary, for that majestic stream is capable of floating the largest boom to the sea.

We hope the loggers will prosper beyond measure, for their's is the hardest and most laborious work imaginable. Instead of five or six dollars a thousand they deserve ten.

VALUE OF A TIMBER CLAIM.—Upon this point the Post-Intelligencer remarks as follows: Puget Sound is noted for its magnificent timber and its enormous supply, and yet comparatively few people have an accurate idea how much timber is to be found on a single quarter section of land. A friend of ours, who is a practical woodsman and a reliable man, informs us that he with others, perhaps more competent than himself, recently made a critical examination of 160 acres of land in the Samish section, about sixty miles north of this city. They went all over it most carefully, counted trees, computed contents, and reckoned up the vast quantity into 12,000,000 feet of sawed, merchantable lumber, or an average of 75,000 feet per acre. The stumpage on this tract at the low rate of 50 cents per thousand feet, would be no less than \$6000, and at a common rate in the East—\$2—would be \$36,000. Is it to be wondered, when such facts and figures are contemplated, that the timber lands of this country are in such demand? No farming lands anywhere to be obtained are at all comparable with them in value.

NEARLY A VERY SERIOUS ACCIDENT befell Joe Lynch of Fidalgo Island, while out hunting with a young comrade. His companion's gun in some manner was accidentally discharged, the ball passing through the outer portion of the right arm, just below the shoulder, of Mr. Lynch, but not sufficiently close to fracture the bone. It made a very painful flesh wound, however, from which he is rapidly recovering. This should be a warning to young men about the careless handling or carrying of fire-arms.

MARRIED.—Miss Lizzie Tuck was united in matrimony to Mr. C. E. Frank, at the bride's home at Bellingham Bay one day this week. We are unable to state the exact date and by whom the ceremony was performed, slight details which the happy couple, in the exuberance of joy, never thought of when sending us cards and cake. May much joy attend them through life.

MR. AND MRS. F. D. CLEAVES, of this town, celebrated their "wooden wedding" on the 3d inst., with a very pleasant little party of friends. After the usual pleasantries, congratulations and refreshments, the party adjourned to the hall and danced till a late hour in the evening.

FIDALGO HOG LAW.—The recent Legislature has passed an act prohibiting hogs from running at large on Fidalgo Island, the provisions of which provide that the owners thereof shall be liable for the actual damages committed by his or their hogs when running at large in said Island; said damages to be recovered in an action at law by the person or persons suffering from the depredation of said hogs.

COLONEL HALLER'S RETIREMENT.—Colonel Granville O. Haller, Colonel of the 23d Infantry, was retired last month, and ordered to his home on Puget Sound. The following is his military history: Colonel Granville O. Haller, 23d Infantry, who is now retired, is a native of Pennsylvania, and was appointed lieutenant in the Fourth Infantry, Nov. 17, 1839. He was regimental adjutant in 1843-5, 1st Lieut., July 1846. Brevetted Captain Sept. 8, 1847, at the battle of Molino del Rey, Mexico, and Major, Sept. 13, 1847 at Chapultepec. He was promoted to the rank of Captain January 1, 1848, and Major Seventh Infantry, Sept. 25, 1851. He was dismissed from the service July 25, 1856, for alleged disloyal utterances, but justice was done him July 1, 1879, by his restoration to service, as Colonel, to date from Feb. 9, 1873, the date the date he would have been promoted if continuously in the service. He remained at his present home on Puget Sound, W. T., until Dec. 1879, when the sudden death of Gen. Jeff. C. Davis, created a vacancy, and he was assigned to the 23d Infantry.—Vancouver Independent.

THE SEATTLE Post-Intelligencer, in announcing the completion of the survey of the route from Renton to Green River, says the line is 27 miles long, and the grade is less than the maximum grade on the Pacific coast, the division of the N. P. railroad. The topography is such that the entire district, which is very extensive, can be reached without difficulty. The coal deposits are on a level unbroken plateau. The first eleven miles of the road runs through an agricultural valley; the bench and foothills are heavily timbered. Parties will be put into the field at once to locate the line, after which construction will commence immediately. Steel rails for the entire thirty miles of road have been purchased and will be on the ground as soon as the grading is finished and ties laid down.

A RIVER OF RAPIDS.—For two or three miles above the Shoshone Falls, says a correspondent, the Snake River flows through immense chasms, with walls on either side hundreds of feet high. The river is full of rapids for miles. The descent being so great, at the upper Shoshone Falls, known as the Twin or Little Falls, the river is divided by an island, and the two streams rush over a precipice and fall into a pool one hundred and seventy-five feet below. As viewed from the bluff hundreds of feet above, the sight is grand, and from below there is still more to admire and awe the visitor. Some four or five miles down the river we come to the great falls, where the entire river descends in a sheet two hundred and ten feet. Some thirty or forty miles further down the stream is Salmon Falls, extending quite a distance. The greatest of these falls is only twenty feet, but the forms and the great number of the falls and cascades make it very beautiful. But a short distance above the falls is the most remarkable sight we have ever seen. In the high bluffs along the river there is a sue numerous green springs, the waters which fall over the rocks and are lashed to silvery streams and spray in their descent. The first of these pours over a cliff in a semi-circular form and falls over 200 feet. A stream of water equal to that of a small river pours out of the bank and falls over the rocks in silvery streams of almost every conceivable shape and form, while the spaces between are lined with green moss and shrubs, so that it presents the appearance of an immense grotto.
