Indications are that very few if any subordinates will be retained in office very long, and that applicants from this territory will, with very few exceptions if any, be compelled to take back seats.

THE Dan and Josie Morris couple company will be home on the 23rd inst. Gov. Newell paid this office a friendly call on his recent trip to Port Townsend. For all kinds of fruits, choice cigars and Tobaccos, go to O. H. Holcombe's. "Got it cheap old you?" "Well, go to Mr. Clinger's every time; he always sells cheap." THE ARGUS office building and adjoining ones are receiving liberal applications of whitewash. Mr. Marlow Knapp, of San Francisco, has been visiting his mother, brother and sister at Duwamish. SOUTH PORT TOWNSEND.—This is the appropriate name of a third townsite just laid out near the Iron works at the head of our beautiful bay. UNFORTUNATE Customs employees, whose official heads are dropping into the basket, are supposed to feel somewhat abashed about this time. MR. Wm. G. Morris, the newly appointed collector of customs at Alaska, is expected to arrive here in a day or two, enroute to his post of duty. THE Dispatch arrived from Neah Bay and way ports on Wednesday. Among the passengers we noticed Capt. and Mrs. McAlmond and Mrs. C. F. King. PAYMASTER, J. A. Ring, U. S. N., arrived this week from Alaska, where he has been for about two years. He left here on Wednesday for San Francisco, via Portland. CAPT. W. H. Stevens, one of the P. S. Pilots, arrived here on Wednesday, having piloted the British ship Fleetwing into Royal Roads, 30 days from Yokohama, Japan. This, we believe, one of the quickest passages ever made over the route by sailing vessel. PUGET SOUND TELEGRAPH CO.—The following is the board of directors of this company, elected at Port Townsend, on Tuesday of last week: Cyrus Walker, William Renton, T. T. Minor, C. C. Bartlett and N. D. Hill. At the meeting of trustees T. T. Minor was elected president, N. D. Hill secretary and C. C. Bartlett treasurer. ONE change to be made in the Customs business at this place will meet with the approval of moral people everywhere, viz: the discontinuance of the course heretofore employed in allowing vessels to enter and clear on Sunday. In fact the Customs House will not be open for business on Sundays under any circumstances. There is no reason why the Sabbath may not be respected in a decent manner, and employees be granted at least one day's rest in seven. DEFEATED CREDIT.—Mr. Harry Tibbals desires us to announce that the loss on his house recently burned in this place was promptly paid by the Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, upon filing the proper proofs on his part. Only about thirty days elapsed between the burning and the settlement of the loss. It will be remembered that the house was occupied by the Cronson family when destroyed. Mr. Thomas Phillips was agent for the company.

NEWS ITEMS.

Mr. Villard will visit Oregon in September. OLYMPIA people are suffering from epizootic. MINNESOTA's wheat crop will be 45,000,000 bushels this year. Mrs. Abraham Lincoln is pronounced beyond recovery by her physicians. Messrs. Lang & Birmingham are turning out 750 pounds of cheese a day at their White river dairy. Mr. C. B. Fummer, the elocutionist, was at last accounts, in the State of Kansas, giving entertainments as he traveled. It is now said that the long-talked-of consolidation of the Central Pacific and Union Pacific roads is about to be consummated. REV. C. A. Huntington, of Olympia, intends to locate permanently in California, and the Congregational Church there is without a pastor. BANNER Lodge, L. O. G. T. was organized at New Tacoma with twenty-one charter members, last week, by N. S. Porter, installing officer. ESTOS is going ahead with her project for a world's fair in 1885. R. M. Publisher, of the "Herald," is to be the chairman of the executive committee. AN American girl, who is now attending the physiological lectures of Professor Virchow, is the first female student ever admitted into the University of Berlin. REV. J. R. Thompson, of Olympia, has returned from attendance at the Presbyterian General assembly in the East. He expressed himself much pleased with the trip. REV. James Agnew, at one time pastor of the Presbyterian Church at this place, is keeping a store at Centerville on the N. P. R. R. line, between Tenino and Kalama. THE Victoria "Colonist" reports new Cariboo diggings, near the forks of the Quesselle river, where from two to five ounces of gold have been taken to the bucket of dirt. Mr. A. T. Hawley, traveling agent of the "Rural Splend," of Portland, is on a visit to the Sound. He proposes to write letters, from the principal points, descriptive of the country. THE grain product of the United States has doubled within the past ten years according to the figuring of the Agricultural Department. Corn increased 133 per cent; wheat 73 per cent. HARRY C. Lord, the young and popular steamboat engineer, was recently married in marriage to Miss Abbie S. Houghton, recently of Goldendale but formerly of Port Gamble. Two prisoners, Charles Lord and Wesley Stevens, escaped from the penitentiary at Seattle, and a reward of \$50 each was offered for their recapture. They were recaptured last Saturday near Tacoma. THE fact that for every official vacancy there are from three to forty applicants, indicates that there are plenty of patriotic citizens in the country who are willing to serve the "dear people" in most any capacity. Mr. Hallenbeck, the revivalist, held his farewell meeting at Seattle on Tuesday. We learn that he goes to San Francisco, via Portland. He was invited to Port Townsend, also to Olympia. His success has been remarkable. PROF. A. T. Burnell, recently of the Aldon Academy on Filadelfia Island, has accepted the position of teacher on the Indian reservation at Skokholm. Prof. Burnell is an instructor of marked ability, and will carry very high recommendations to his new field of labor. SECRETARY Hunt proposes to present to the next Congress a report on the pressing need of the navy for proper vessels, and for that purpose he appointed an advisory board of officers to consult, receive opinions, and to make recommendations such as Congress would likely approve. A statement of failures on the Pacific Coast, prepared by Dunn & Co., shows that in Oregon there were, the past year, 33 failures, the liabilities of which were \$182,812 and the assets \$81,307. In our territory there were 11 failures, with a liability of \$53,400, and assets to meet the same \$24,575. THE monetary conference has adjourned till next spring, and the feeling is general that the bimetallic theory, supported by the United States and France—which means nothing more than that silver shall be received at the mints and coined on the same terms as gold—will be successfully established. THE demand for laborers in Eastern Washington appears to have a bad influence upon Uncle Sam's Soldiers at Walla Walla. Desertions are frequent, and the reason assigned is that the ruling high wages are so much greater than a soldier's pay, that they are escaping whenever opportunity offers—"Courier." IN the recent city election at Seattle, Hon. L. P. Smith was re-elected mayor, without opposition. J. H. McGraw was elected marshal, and John Keenan and Thomas Clancy councillors from the 1st ward, W. A. Jennings, J. Collins and Charles McDonaugh 2d ward, and Moses Keener and M. Densmore 3d ward.
