THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE XIII.

CORPORATION.

SECTION 1. All existing charters, or grants of exclusive privileges, under which the corporation or grantees shall not have organized and commenced business in good faith, at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall thereafter have no validity.

Sec. 2. Corporations may be created under general laws, but shall not be created by special act, except for municipal purposes. All general and special laws, creating corporations, may be altered, amended or repealed, in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done.

Sec. 3. All railroads in this State shall be deemed public highways, and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and laws shall be passed, from time to time, establishing reasonable mar-

imum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight thereon, and to prevent unjust discrimination.

No railroad corporation, or the lessee or manager thereof, shall consolidate its stock, property or franchises with any other railroad corporation, owning or having under its control a competing line. Every railroad shall have the right, with its road, to intersect, connect with, or cross any other railroad; the manner of the exercise of which right, however, to be regulated by law. Laws shall also be passed, regulating the liability of common carriers of passengers in cases of personal injuries occasioned by negligence on the part of the carrier.

Sec. 4. No right of way shall be appropriated to the use of any private corporation until full compensation shall be first made to the owner, irrespective of any benefit arising therefrom; which compensation shall be ascertained in such manner as may be provided by law.

Sec. 5. No street railroad shall be constructed within any incorporated city or town, without the consent of the local authorities thereof.

Sec. 6. No corporation shall issue stock or bonds except for labor done, services performed, or money or property actually received. The stock of corporation shall not be increased except in pursuance of general law. The stockholders of all corporation and joint stock companies shall be individually liable for all labor performed for such corporation or company.

Sec. 7. Laws shall be passed regulating the right of foreign corporations to do business in this state, and the mode in which they may sue and be sued.

Sec. 8. The legislature shall not have power to establish or incorporate any bank or banking company, or monied institution whatever in this state, with the privilege of making, issuing or putting in circulation any bill, check, certificate, promisory note or other paper intended to circulate as money.

ARTICLE XIV.

STATE INSTITUTIONS.

Section 1. Educational, reformatory and penal institutions, and those for the benefit of the insane, blind, deaf and dumb, and such other institutions as the public good may require, shall be established and supported by the State in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The Legislature shall not have power to change or locate the seat of government of the State; but shall, at the first session subsequent to the admission of the State, submit the question of its permanent location to the qualified electors of the State, at the general election then next ensuing. A majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to such location; and in case no one place shall have such majority the question shall be resubmitted at each general election, until such majority vote shall effect a location. *Provided*: That, until the seat of government shall have been permanently located, as herein provided, the temporary location thereof shall remain at the capitol of the Territory at the time of the admission of the State.

Sec. 3. The legislature shall make no appropriations or expenditures for capitol buildings or grounds (except to keep the Territorial buildings in repair), until the seat of government shall have been located.

Sec. 4. The University, at Seattle, and the Hospital for the Insane at Steilacoom, shall, upon the adoption of this Constitution, become institutions of the State, and the management thereof subject to the control of the State, under such laws and regulations as the Legislature shall provide; and all gifts, grants and appropriations of money or property, real or personal, heretofore made

to said institutions, or to the Territory of Washington therefor, are hereby confirmed to the use and benefit of said institutions respectively.

ARTICLE XV.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Section 1. The political year for the State of Washington shall commence on the first Monday in January in each year.

Sec. 2. The term felony, wherever it occurs in this Constitution, or the laws of the State, shall be held to mean any criminal offense punishable by death or imprisonment in the penitentiary, and none other.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session, to provide a seal for the State, to be called the "Great Seal of the State of Washington," which shall be kept by the Secretary of State, and all official acts of the Governor—his approval of the laws excepted—shall be thereby authenticated. The seal of the Territory of Washington shall be the seal of the State until otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 4. No county with an area of 900 square miles or less, shall be divided, or have any part stricken therefrom without submitting the same to a vote of the qualified electors of the county, nor unless a majority of those voting on the question shall vote for the same.

Sec. 5. No county seat shall be removed until a majority of the qualified electors of the county, voting on the question shall have voted in favor of its removal.

Sec. 6. All county officers, whose election or appointment is not provided for in this Constitution, shall be elected by the electors of the respective counties, or appointed by the Governor, or by the board of County Commissioners, or by other county authorities, as the Legislature shall direct. All city, town and precinct officers, whose election is not provided for in this Constitution, shall be elected by the qualified electors of such cities, towns and precincts, or by some division thereof, or appointed by such cities, towns and precincts, or by such authorities thereof, as the Legislature may designate for that purpose.

All other officers, whose election or appointment is not provided for by this Constitution and all officers whose offices may hereafter be created by law, shall be elected by the people, or appointed, as the Legislature may provide.

Sec. 7. All navigable waters within the State shall be and remain public highways, free to all citizens of the State and the United States.

Sec. 8. No navigable stream in the State shall be bridged, dammed or obstructed by any person or corporation, without authority by law.

Sec. 9. None but citizens of the United States, or aliens who have declared their intention to become such, in accordance with the laws of Congress, shall be employed in or about any public office in the State, or in any State institution, or on any public work prosecuted by the State.

Sec. 10. All patents and grants of land, made by the United States to settlers and purchasers of the tide lands shall be ratified and confirmed by the State.

Sec. 11. In the event of the rejection of the separate article relative to Woman Suffrage, the Legislature may submit the question, at any general election, to the qualified electors of the State; and a majority of all the votes cast at such election on the question, shall be in favor of woman Suffrage, then all women who are citizens of this State, and who possess the other qualifications of voters shall be qualified electors of the State.

Sec. 12. The Legislature may declare the cases in which any office shall be

deemed vacant and also the manner of filling vacancies, where no provision is made for that purpose in this Constitution.

Sec. 13. The County Commissioners, Superintendent of Schools and the County Treasurer of each county shall constitute a board of appraisers who shall appraise all lands within their respective counties belonging to the State (except tide-lands) under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, before they can be sold.

Sec. 14. The common law of England—applicable to our condition and circumstances, and not repugnant to or inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States or laws of this State—shall be in full force, and the rule of decision in all courts in this State; but in the event of laws being passed, conferring rights or imposing obligations growing out of or founded upon principles of the Civil and not the Common Law, then the rules of the Civil Law may be resorted to for the purpose of interpretation and decision.

Sec. 15. The Legislature shall have power to fix the time for the election of all officers where no provision is made for such election in this Constitution.

Sec. 16. All patents and grants of lands made by the United States to settlers and purchasers of tide-lands, shall be ratified and confirmed by the State.

SCHEDULE.

Section 1. That no inconvenience may arise by reason of a change from a Territorial to a State government it is declared that actions, rights, prosecutions, judgments, decrees, claims and contracts as well of individuals as of bodies corporate—including counties, towns, school and road districts—shall continue as if no such change had taken place; and all process which may have been issued under the authority of the Territory of Washington, previous to its admission into the Union, shall be as valid as if issued in the name of the State.

Sec. 2. All laws now in force in the Territory of Washington, which are not repugnant to this Constitution, shall remain in force until they expire by their own limitation, or are altered or repealed by the Legislature.

Sec. 3. All debts, fines, penalties and forfeitures, which have accrued, or may hereafter accrue, to the Territory of Washington, shall enure to the State.

Sec. 4. All recognizance heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from a Territorial to a State government shall remain valid, and shall pass to, and may be prosecuted in the name of the State; and all bonds executed to the Governor or to the Territory of Washington, or to any county or municipal corporation, or to any officer or court in his or its official capacity, shall pass to the State authorities and their successors in office, for the use therein expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly; and all the estate, real, personal and mixed, and all judgments, decrees, bonds, specialties, choses in action, and claims or debts, of whatever description, belonging to the Territory of Washington, shall enure to and vest in the State of Washington, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner, and to the same extent, by the State of Washington, as the same could have been by the Territory of Washington.

All criminal prosecutions and penal actions, which may have arisen or which may arise, before the change from a Territorial to a State government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment, and execution in the name of the State. All offences committed against the laws of the Territory of Washington, before the change from a Territorial to a State gov-

ernment, and which shall not be prosecuted before such change, may be prosecuted in the name and by the authority of the State of Washington, with like effect as though such change had not taken place; and all penalties incurred shall remain the same as if this Constitution had not been adopted.

All actions at law and suits in equity, which may be pending in any of the Courts of the Territory of Washington, at the time of the change from a Territorial to a State government, shall be continued, and transferred to such Court of the State, having jurisdiction of the subject matter of thereof.

Local Items.

Owing to mining excitement, and to change of help etc., the STAR is only a half sheet for two or three issues.

Population very fluctuating the past week. For several days this town was nearly deserted. All gone to the mines.

In a few weeks we will try to give a descriptive sketch of all the candidates in the field.

The smoke is so dense, that it is unsafe to navigate the Sound in a small boat without a compass, if a person does not wish to be lost.

Harvesting is in a forward condition on the tide marshes; but few fields were seriously damaged by the overflow last winter. The crop will be a full average one.

This season has been very favorable for hauling logs at slight expense. The quantity hauled is large, considering the comparatively small number at work in logging camps.

Runnels' old camp on the shore of Port Susan Bay is dismantled, and the camp cook-house is burned. For a long time it has been a prominent landmark of that section. Runnels and son are now at work at their camp back of the lake, not far from town.

This afternoon an unusually large number of ladies passed beneath this office window. The sight of so many ladies together so excited our new devil, that he was unable to work for sometime and frantically demanded that the fact of his being here should be advertised; because if they had only known what an attractive devil we had, they undoubtedly would have taken pity on him, and all have been up to see him.

Money has been very scarce this year. On account of the hard times, only twice this season has there been enough excitement to bring the boys out for a general spree. The first was at the time of the Democratic mass convention, when even the Siwash were all drunk. The other was over the gold excitement last week.

By request, the name of W. B. Moore is announced as an independent candidate for the office of Representative in the Legislature. Mr. Moore is a very enterprising, active, go-ahead man, who is well known as one of the heaviest loggers and farmers in the county. He will divide the vote with the regular candidates.

Munson & Paulson's camp on Port Susan Bay was established there some 7 years ago. They have enough timber to keep them hauling for five years more. When logs are brisk, they run a large crew; when slow a small one. Now they keep only one hired man, Mr. Albee.

The unusually prolonged spell of warm, dry weather has been the cause of quite a number of severe cases of summer complaint among the little folks this season. Among those who have been very sick is little Eddie Morse; but thanks to the skill of Dr. Polson and the constant care and attention of Mrs. A. Bishman, he is now well again. None of these cases terminated fatally.

The supplement furnished with this number, and that has been mailed to the readers of the STAR for some time past, will probably be discontinued in September. In place of it, will be furnished a genuine ATOM from Portland, which will contain as much Oregon and telegraphic news as a Portland weekly and be mailed direct from that place to subscribers of the STAR.

Skagit River News.

Some weeks ago a lengthy article appeared in the STAR; the letters and reply to inquiries of people in Cal., about the Sound. A few days ago at Mr. Gage's store in Skagit City, R. L. Vernon, one of these inquirers, whose questions were answered in that number of this paper, was introduced to us. He had already secured land, and had also gone into the manufacture of gent's gloves. As he makes a superior article, does fine work and very properly introduces himself to the people of this section by advertising in the STAR, he will no doubt secure the trade of our merchants and build up a good business. He left an agent country, and is well satisfied with the change.

The oldest house now standing on the Skagit was put up by Sartwell some 14 years ago. Orrin Kincaid helped to build it. Mr. K. is one of the oldest settlers there. He left the river a number of years ago, visiting the Sandwich Islands and all parts of California; but now comes back to stay. He has located and settled upon a claim four miles above mouth of Baker river, or 60 miles above the jam.

Kayton's crew of nine men and ten oxen is the only one now running below the jam. Above the jam are the camps of J. B. Ball, with 13 men and 8 oxen; Cochrane & McDonald, 10 men and 8 oxen; Wm. Gage, 6 men and 10 oxen.

A. Deasmore may move his crew up, as they are now out of work; having logged out their old claim. His crew will consist of about 9 men and 10 oxen.

Some two weeks ago a tree fell on and killed four of Cochrane & McDonald's team of oxen.

Some three weeks since, Mrs. Hobson, during the absence of her husband, undertook to cut down some small trees on the bank of the river, that hid the otherwise fine view across the river to the house of a neighbor. She cut down in a successful manner all but one, and in cutting that one, which leaned towards the river, she cut only on the upper side, when nearly off, the butt of the tree split up from the stump, and in falling jumped backwards some ten feet, striking her head and shoulders and breaking her collar bone, besides injuring her head and face. She is now rapidly recovering from these injuries.

Mr. Cyrus Thompson this year raises a half acre of extra fine tobacco. He says that this is a tobacco country, where the very finest tobacco can be grown, suitable for the highest priced cigars, and the best grades of manufactured tobacco.

Now there is as much sent out of the country for tobacco almost as for flour. Both should be stopped; the large farmers can raise the wheat; the ones with small clearings, the tobacco.

Another scandal from near the jam. This time, a married woman, over 30 years old runs off with a boy of 20.

Like nearly all such cases, her husband had treated her with exceptional kindness. With a gipsy class of women it seems that the surest way to earn their contempt and make them untrue, is to

treat them with uniform liberality, kindness and affection. It seems that they require occasional exhibitions of brutality, or at least of severity towards them to cause them to respect the characters of their conjugal partners.

Uncle Joe Lisk is quite unwell; his friends fear that he will not live long.

The Gold Excitement.

Last Monday evening it was hinted abroad that prospectors on the Sultan had at last discovered rich placer diggings, as a reward for the thorough prospecting in that part of this county that has been going on for the past two or three years. The secrecy of the movements of several well known prospectors led many to think there was something in these rumors. Therefore on the following day numbers began the tramp for the mines, among them being E. C. Ferguson, Dr. McCoy, W. H. Ward, J. B. Roberts, — Emerson, John Burns, and others.

On Wednesday, they held a meeting at the discovery claim of J. T. Cotton, and M. and R. Barrett, some 8 miles from the mouth of the Sultan river, or thirty miles from this place. Dr. McCoy was Pres. and E. C. Ferguson Secretary. They drew up a code of mining laws for that district, the boundaries of which embrace the whole of the Sultan river valley, from its source in the mountains to its mouth. About 15 miners were named as being present at that meeting. The main rush was on last Thursday; when there were about fifty men on the ground. Some 75 or 100 in all have visited the mines. Probably as many more will go in next week.

It has been known that there was gold on the Sultan, ever since the first settlement of this county.

The summer of 1870 probable 250 men visited that river, and at one time there was as many as 50 men regularly at work mining. When work began at that time, an old rocker and rocker iron was found so rusted, that it fell to pieces when touched. It probably had been used by a party in 1861, or thereabouts, who mined there. Jas. McFarlane lived on that river, and supported himself by placer mining for some three years; leaving there some three or four years ago.

It is impossible to arrive at any exact account of the gold mined there, it is somewhere between \$10,000 and \$20,000 in all. There is undoubtedly good, paying quartz mines of gold, silver and lead in the valley of the Skykomish, of which the Sultan is a tributary stream, and gold in small quantities has been found on every tributary of the Snohomish; the only thing new about this excitement is, that Messrs Cotton, and the two Barretts suppose that they have discovered a former bed of the Sultan, and that they are now on the rim of what will be paying diggings. This old bed, is about 120 feet above the present bed of the river.

It is not yet demonstrated whether there is anything there of value or not. It will require a month's work to demonstrate it satisfactorily. The prospects are now sufficient to justify the thorough prospecting required in cutting through this rim to the level bed rock. We will try to go up there ourselves next week, so as to furnish a full description of that section.
