William Smith O'Brien has returned from his Southern tour to Washington city.

The ladies of South Carolina have raised \$30,000 towards erecting a monument in memory of John C. Calhoun.

Senator Seward is making preparations for a voyage to Europe. He will be absent until late in the fall.

Rev. T. Grace, of Memphis, Tenn., has declined the appointment of Catholic bishop of St. Paul, Minnesota.

No less than fifteen persons were to be executed in the United States for murder between the 17th and 20th of May.

Gov. Randall, of Wisconsin, has appointed Luther S. Dixon as Chief Justice, in the place of Judge Whiton, deceased.

The "opposition" convention of York county, Pa., has unanimously recommended Gen. Simon Cameron for the next Presidency.

A five-story stone hotel is about to be built at St. Paul, Minn., which will cost about \$150,000. It will be completed by June, 1860.

Two boys were recently arrested at Liverpool for putting chromate of potash, a corrosive poison, into the holy water font of a Catholic church.

A large number of colored people in Chicago are making preparations to migrate to Hayti, having accepted an invitation from President Geffard to locate in that island.

Four hundred Mormon converts from Denmark, recently left that country for the United States via Hull, England. Their ultimate destination is, of course, Salt Lake.

Mrs. Martha Woodward, of Ohio, made last year three hundred and fifty gallons of wine from an acre of ground. That speaks well for the productiveness of "Marta's Vineyard."

The N. Y. Herald is of the opinion that the war in Europe will put a stop to all American pleasure traveling, and that American residents abroad will be obliged to fly to London.

Mr. Brown, of the New York Journal of Commerce, has accepted the editorship of the President's paper, the Constitution. He is promised a salary of \$3,000 annually and pickings.

Dr. A. Gerald Hall, one of the earliest practitioners of homoeopathy in New York, died recently. He was the author of several works on homoeopathic medicine.

The six New England States send twelve Senators and twenty-nine members of the House of Representatives to Congress, every one of whom at the next session will be republican in politics.

A letter from Texas states that Gen. Sam Houston is the candidate for Governor in that State of the independent or anti-convention democrats, in opposition to Gov. Runnels, the candidate of the convention democrats.

The negro Armstrong, one of the three fellows arrested for the murder of the mail carrier near Bradford, Canada, has made a full confession of the dreadful deed. His share of the robbery was but ten dollars.

Frederick Sheldon, a venerable New York merchant, died at a residence in Westchester, on Thursday, aged 70 years. Mr. Sheldon occupied, during forty years, a leading position in the financial, educational, philanthropic and religious movements of his time.

The first fruits of the new treaty with Japan may be found in the arrival at London of an American ship from Nagasaki, loaded with a cargo of white wax, the product of the Japanese wax tree. A sample of the wax is at the Washington Patent Office.

The Telegraph in India has many special disturbing influences which the lines in the United States are not subjected to. The elephants there use the poles for scratching their sides, and the monkeys curl their tails upon the wires. The lines are down more half the time.

A very severe hail storm occurred at Augusta, Ga., lately, breaking considerable window glass and killing pigeons. At Richmond, Va., also a severe storm prevailed on the 14th of May. There were rain, hail, thunder and lightning. All the mountains in Virginia were covered with snow.

Mrs. Anderson, an accomplished lady of London, C. W., insured her life for \$5,000, for the benefit of her son, who last week administered strychnine to the mother, from the effects of which she died.

A "powerful" English writer says, in the course of an editorial, "It would be no more strange than probable if St. Helena received an other Napoleon, the pest of Europe, to its rocky boom, before the world is much older."

Major Kearny, who took a prominent part in the war with Mexico, has, it is rumored, entered the staff of the French Generals of Division as a volunteer.

Mr. Joseph Glent, known in Philadelphia as the Napoleon of omnibus proprietors, died in the vicinity of that city, at the age of sixty-five.

A son of George D. Prentice, editor of the Louisville Journal, is in the neighborhood of San Antonio, looking out for a location for sheep raising.

Hon. H. S. Foote has declined being a candidate for Congress in the Vicksburg (Miss.) District.
