Edison Made Useless. A Chicago man is about to astonish the world. More than that, he claims to have revolutionized philosophy, discovering truths which completely overthrow many of the commonly accepted theories upon which are based alleged laws of nature.

The gentleman's name is Mr. A. D. Woodman, and he resides in the West Division. He appears to be a thoroughly educated man; is a chemist and machinist, and has been for years an experimenter in matters looking to new sources of light and heat.

Mr. Woodman knocks philosophy all to pieces, denying many of its most important laws. As a result of this discovery he declares that the electric light is not needed either for brilliancy of illumination or for economy, because his burning water will supersede it.

The Household. To clean zinc—Rub on fresh lard with a cloth, and wipe dry. Paint splashed upon window glass can be easily removed by a strong solution of soda.

To give stove a good polish—Rub them with a piece of Brussels carpet after blackening them. The water used in mixing bread must be tepid. If it is too hot the loaves will be full of holes.

A mixture of oil and ink is good to clean kid boots with; the first softens and the latter blackens them. Two ounces of permanganate of potassa thrown into a cistern will render the fondest water sweet and pure.

To clean raisins—Wipe them with a dry towel. Never wash them for it will make cakes or puddings heavy. To remove grease from wall paper—Lay several folds of blotting paper on the spot, and hold a hot iron near it until the grease is absorbed.

A flannel cloth dipped in warm soap suds, then into whiting, and applied to paint, will instantly remove all grease. New linen may be embroidered more easily by rubbing it over with fine white soap; it prevents the threads from cracking.

To make a clothes line pliable—Boil it an hour or two before using it. Let it dry in a warm room and do not allow it to "kick." In making a crust of any kind do not melt the shortening. Let it be as cold as possible and knead it through the flour. Melting it injures the crust.

To boil potatoes so that they will be dry and mealy—When the skins break, pour off the water and let them finish cooking in their own steam. To take ink spots out of linen—Dip the ink spot in pure methylated oil, then wash out the tallow and the ink will come out with it. This is said to be infallible.

To remove rust from a stovepipe—Rub with lard oil (a little goes a good way); build a slow fire at first till it dries. Oil in the spring, to prevent it from rusting. To crystallize grass—One pound best alum, powdered; half a gallon of soft water; boil until dissolved; dip the grass in the solution, and allow it to remain six or seven hours; remove and dry in the sun. This is a reliable recipe.

To remove iron taste from new kettles—Boil a handful of hay in them and repeat the process if necessary. Hay water is a great sweetener of tin, wooden and iron ware. In Irish dairies everything used for milk is scalded with hay water.

To remove starch or rust from flat-irons—Have a piece of yellow beeswax tied in a coarse cloth; when the iron is almost hot enough to use, but not quite, rub it quickly with the beeswax and then with a clean coarse cloth.

AMMONIA IN THE KIDNEYS.—The pantry shelves are getting grimy, or finger-marks around the door-latches are looking dark and unsightly. For lack of time they are left day after day, for it is hard work to scour all the time, and it wears off the paint, too. The husband keeps the bottle of oil, or perhaps a large can holds it, for he never stints in that. Now suppose his wife has her bottle of ammonia to use. She takes her basin of water and clean cloth; just puts on a few drops of the fluid and wipes off all the dirt; it is worth half a day's labor and does not hurt the paint either. She could put a few drops in her dish-water and see how easily the dishes could be cleaned. A few drops on a sponge would clean all the windows in the sitting-room, making them shine like crystal. It would take the stains off the teapots, and a teaspoonful in the mop-pail would do more towards washing up the kitchen floor than ten pounds of elbow-grease applied at the mop-handle. A housewife has just as much right to make her work easy and expeditious as her husband has. If she does not do it, the fault is her own in a great measure.

A WESTERN orator said recently, rather prettily—"As the Gulf Stream is the creator of Ireland, carrying the warm air of the tropics up to the north and pouring it all round the island, making it emerald in summer and winter, so Lord Bacon's brain was a strange stream of thought, which, flowing from himself outward, has covered the civilized world with a rich harvest of flowers and fruits."
