ED. SOME OF THE REPUBLICANS WHOM "FRESH" MEANS TALKED OF FOR THE OFFICE. Writing from Washington to the Boston Journal, Major Ben Perley Poore says: I do not remember—and I remember, alas, the Washington politics of half a century—so entire a lull in public feeling, and such an absence of presidential plotting. The tariff has been disposed of, for the present at least; civil service is about to receive a fair trial; the internal revenue taxes have been reduced; and there is no genuine interest in any other question of political importance.
