Mr. W. W. Johnson, who has just returned from the country east of the Bitter Root mountains, furnishes us with the following items concerning the mines, &c., of that section:

Shaft; Sup't of Schools, A. P. Hillman; Treasurer, David Pattee; Surveyor, S. M. Minsinger; Assessor, Robert Kelley; Coroner, Geo. P. White.

At Hell Gate the crops are as good as usual, and the prices for produce are high. Oats, 10c per pound, wheat 8c per pound, potatoes, 6c per bushel, 20c per bushel.

McClellan's Gulch, on this side, and Alder Gulch, on the eastern slope, are as yet the richest placer diggings which have been discovered, but many other gulches, nearly if not quite as good, are known to exist on both sides.

WALLA WALLA, November 16th, 1865. Mr. Editor: Having recently arrived from the heart of the far-famed Blackfoot country, and having derived a good deal of experience from a sojourn of over a year and a half there, it has occurred to me that a few lines might not be uninteresting to your readers.

Much has already been said in its favor, and no doubt more will continue to be said, but as yet I have seen no report that has placed it beyond what it really is—the richest and most extensive gold-diggings ever discovered on this coast since the early days of California.
