The disturbed state of that country was brought to the attention of Parliament as early as the 6th of January, when the Queen in her address recommended the further development of the principles of the Land act of 1870.

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THE MAIL AND CHRONICLE.

THE MAIL has entered into arrangements with the San Francisco Chronicle whereby subscribers may obtain both papers for one price for \$3.50.

The alleged newspaper "on the beach at Long Branch" is desperately striving to put on an air of "enterprise" by barking at the "postoffice station on the Swinomish Slough." We can assure this alleged publication on the beach that buying at the moon would be just about as profitable an employment to engage in. It seriously advocates leaving this town and the mainland postoffices generally on a side-track as it were, and have them supplied by a local steamer from the lonely "beach at Long Branch." The absurdity of the proposition will be more apparent when it is known that both the O. R. & N. Co. and the mail steamers have more traffic to and from La Conner alone than all the other points from Seattle to Whatcom put together, while Anacortes, the point referred to, has probably the least traffic of any of the ten stations on the whole route. We do not make this statement in any boastful sense, but it is a statistical fact which will be borne out by inquiry on board the steamers.

It is therefore utterly folly to attempt to make the whole county tributary to an insignificant postoffice station that scarcely averages one ton of freight traffic a week. It is not an agreeable task to so characterize any point, however humble, and our readers during past nine years will bear witness to the fact that we have never before done so; but when those interested in a little trading post on the beach of an island start a paper for the special advocacy of its claims to being the alpha and omega of the routes of traffic and commerce for a radius of fifty miles or more, we are impelled to pronounce it the merest illusion of impracticable theorists.

FIDALGO.—It is probably no exaggeration to say that what is known as Fidalgo proper is the most lovely and picturesque locality in Whatcom County, and that is saying a great deal; and when you combine with this all the important elements of prosperity you have a complete and inviting settlement. Of such a character is the settlement bordering on Fidalgo Bay, with Munks' store, postoffice and steamer landing as the chief attraction, in the immediate vicinity of which the land gradually slopes from summit of the back ground to the beach, and the land being mostly well cleared, drained and under a high state of cultivation, the effect is most gratifying. We were impressed with this fact during a visit to the place last week. It is one of the oldest settlements in the county. The bay is in the shape of a horse-shoe, commencing at March's Point on the south, traversing around to Ship Harbor Point on Guemes Channel on the north, the beach line of which is about ten miles. The new water-tank, with a capacity of 12,000 gallons, which Mr. Munks recently constructed, together with an extension that he is making to the wharf, will render the Fidalgo steamer landing one of the most complete and attractive in the county; upon all of which we congratulate Fidalgo.

We were agreeably impressed with the stir and bustle about the good old county-seat during a few hours' visit last Friday; but we fear it is too near Anacortes, the seat of publication of the news paper, to ever attain the importance of a great city. Still the prospect is rather promising. We observed the Colony people heaving away on the timbers of the new saw-mill; likewise Mr. Sisson, a colonist, repairing the old hotel building for a store and residence, in which he has already established himself with a large stock of goods. Mr. Steinway is neatly established with a "bran new" store-building, new stock of goods, new-everything; the Str. Welcome, on which we traveled, just landing him eight tons of merchandise to be added to his extensive stock. Besides these business houses there are two hotels, kept by Mr. Sevier and Mr. Fouts; and two saloons presided over by Messrs. O'Brien and Conover. We found our friend Fouts talking politics, as usual, and laying the wires so as to get away with the South End in the next campaign. We of course protested, and finally agreed to disagree on the main question. We missed Captain Lakeman from town, but learned that he was a hale and hearty tiller of the soil on the Guide Meridian. Speaking of the dear old Captain, the latest related of him is that he was captured in the Nooksack the other day just after having been to the postoffice and received the MAIL. Being a good swimmer he got out easily, and his only anxiety appeared to be as to whether our valuable journal was "OK." This reminds us that "once upon a time" we suggested to N. W. L., as he was running for the Legislature, that he might combine business with politics and solicit for this paper upon a liberal commission. He accepted the proposition, but, to our surprise, we learned that to every one approached he offered to throw off his commission, invariably adding that it was all the paper was worth, anyhow; but that at the same he regarded it as indispensable to every well-regulated citizen of the county.

But we have digressed from our topic. We have, however, only to add that our visit to Whatcom was a pleasurable one; we rejoice at the growing evidence of its future prosperity. Traveling on the fine Str. Welcome was no less a pleasure, for aside from her comfortable appointments Capt. Brannon and his staff know how to run her to perfection.

THE NEW MILL.—Just as we go to press the Schooner Perry arrived with Messrs. Milne, with the lumber and machinery for the flour and oatmeal mill. Hurrah!

We shall hereafter note progress.

SUMMONS.

Action brought in the District Court of Washington Territory, holding terms at La Conner for the County of Whatcom, and complaint filed in the office of the Clerk of said Court in the said County of Whatcom.

To FLORA A.
