LATEST NEWS SUMMARY

Contributions to the Garfield monument fund, \$11,200. A correspondent writes the Times there is some likelihood the British government will co-operate in an international expedition in search of the Arctic exploring steamer Jeannette.

The election in Newark, N. J., resulted in giving the Republicans control of all departments. Henry Lang was elected mayor by 254 majority over Fiedler, elected by 207 majority.

The president has sent the following nominations to the senate: Geo. A. Steele, postmaster at Portland, Ore.; and Wm. S. Tallman, collector of public money at Santa Fe. The senate confirmed Septimus J. Hanna, register of the land office at Leadville, Col.

Instructions have been telegraphed to every military station in Ireland, enjoining vigilance, and lying columns are being readied for immediate movements. The number of troops now in Dublin is 3000. Every entry is provided for action.

Parnell, Dillon, O'Brien and Sexton, leaders of the Irish agitators are all in prison in Dublin. Five gates of Dublin castle are closed and arms stacked in the upper yard. The city is divided into three districts entrusted to the charge of magistrates specially appointed.

The president has nominated Frank H. Eastman of Montana; A. C. Coopey of Nebraska; and John W. C. Coopey of Dakota, at Devil's Lake; Jas. McLoughlin of Dakota, at Standing Rock; and Geo. H. Sawyer, of Minnesota, at Crow Creek, Dakota.

It is reported here that the object of Conkling's visit to Washington, was to advise with the president respecting the formation of a cabinet, so much as to advise and beg him not to urge a certain man to become a member of it. The man in question is General Sherman.

The Couriers-Journal of Tuesday publishes a letter from Prof. Klein saying: "I have for several months past noticed a singular phenomenon in the heavens in the shape of a double comet or comets attended with nine smaller ones, all in a circle and closely resembling the planet Saturn's rings. They all appear to be connected together as they move in the same orbit, and the larger or double comet will at regular intervals eclipse the smaller one, and the little ones are on such occasions lost sight of. I have no doubt this is the comet of 1843-75, supposed to have been destroyed, that now appears to us in this singular shape, attended with numerous satellites which, by some of the wonderful processes of nature, have been re-created, while in the light of the arc included in a glass globe the vegetation flourished to an remarkable extent as in his previous experiments. The unfavorable action of the open air is supposed to arise from certain non-luminous rays which are intercepted by the glass. The botanist has here a subject for study."

ALLEN WEIR JUSTICE OF THE PEACE, PORT TOWNSEND.

On Sunday night the house of J. M. McCarthy at Cook's Corners, New York, burned and four of McCarthy's children perished. A large meeting in San Francisco denounced the arrest of Parnell and others. Four hundred dollars were subscribed to the fund.

The British ship Friedberg while discharging rails at Oakland wharf had her slings slipped and three rails went through the ship's bottom. Steam was kept just deep enough to cover her hull. Chas. Siegel, a miner of Plute mountain, California, was found dead in his cabin with three bullet holes in his body. Tom Herbert, a discharged employe, has been arrested, charged with the murder.

A Tombstone dispatch says there is much rejoicing at the news of Fremont's resignation, but disapproving of the probable appointment of Gen. Banks. The people want some resident appointed who knows their needs. Sam F. Dorey, an old and respected citizen of Nevada, who had been shot in the head at Elko, Nev., Oct. 18th. He was alone in his room. He has not been conscious, and it is doubtful if he lives.

The president and all the cabinet except Windom, Kirkwood and MacVeagh, have gone to Yorktown. From all quarters of the north and south troops, gubernatorial staffs, and eminent citizens are moving toward the same place. Geo. H. Berthard, now in jail at Washington for having asked for a revolver to assassinate Parnell, has been a legal military crank in the west for many years. Newspapers finally ran him out of Omaha as a trickster and drunkard.

The Herald, referring to Parnell's reported resignation, says the rumor that Gen. Banks will succeed him as governor of Arizona, reports an interview with Banks, in which he denies any knowledge of the report and believes it inspired by his enemies. The nomination of Commissioner Dudley, who was appointed by President Hayes, and who succeeded to the office of the late Commissioner Dudley, was confirmed by the senate, although it is not likely to get his confirmation without a struggle.

A young man named Sphers, son of the Mormon bishop of Panama, in the southeastern part of Nevada, last week shot an Indian without provocation near Bullionville. The Indian is not expected to live. His tribe are greatly excited over the shooting, and it is feared they may retaliate. The Grand Trunk has made another savage drive at Vanderlief's lines, which will almost inevitably bring them to a fighting attitude with that railroad. It ordered Detroit and Chicago to sell tickets to all points reached by Michigan Central in Michigan at reduced rates. The thinking was that the amount of money the purchase might be able to spare would be the price charged in each case.

Diverse opinion prevails among democrats in regard to the question of secretaryship of the senate. Some have set their eyes on a certain man, but he has not yet been confirmed by the senate, although he is not likely to get his confirmation without a struggle. Colored Washington and his friends are anxious to push the question to a vote as soon as the senate reassembles in December. The Republicans seem more disposed than ever for the present to let the officers now in charge alone until December.

A Tucson dispatch reports from Wat-hat mountains that three men were killed while following the trail of a band of cattle which had been carried off Saturday. George and 14 of his band had a running fight with soldiers near Eagle creek. The Indians got away with the horses. Gen. MacArthur is ordered to the department of Missouri, and Gen. Kneller sent to examine affairs here. He says Arizona is free from hostilities and likely to remain so unless the Chiricahua return from Mexico, which is doubtful. Troops are being disposed along the border about the reservation to secure order.

VERY SIGNIFICANT.

Mr. Villard in his speech in Portland, a few days ago, gave utterance to the following significant language in reference to his future operations:

PORTLANDERS IN TROUBLE.

The Portland "Standard" of the 23d inst. has the following: "Mr. H. Villard had a conference with some forty of the prominent business men of this city at the rooms of the Merchant's Protective Union..."

THE remarks of our representative, Hon. J. A. Kuhn, in the legislature, over federal appointments, rather reflect on Collector Bash, and merit a few words of explanation.

BUSINESS ON THIS COAST.

A late San Francisco "Merchant," a journal devoted exclusively to business affairs, uses the following language in reference to the general welfare of matters upon the Coast:

most articles we manufacture, cannot but redound to the benefit of the interior merchant, because it gives his customer, who is the producer, a larger income. The advance in prices which we have had to note of late, not being the result of speculation by capitalists, but the result of a healthy demand, is enriching the whole country...

Speaking of groceries and provisions, it remarks that: "Coffee is quiet and dull, and the outlook, both here, in New York and Rio Janeiro promises no immediate reaction. On the other hand sugar is very firm here, especially the refined kinds, and the refineries are barely able to keep pace with the demand..."

"In provisions the whole line is advanced, with the exception of beef, which remains steady. There is a great demand for all descriptions of provisions, which seems rather to increase rather than diminish with the advance in price."

WELL SAID.

The following, from the "Courier" of Olympia, in reference to a want in our Criminal Code of law, is certainly very timely, especially while there are such frequent acts of violence and murder committed among us:

"Washington Territory is a law abiding place. Our laws are stringent, officers faithful and public sentiment and healthy in tone; but here, as elsewhere, all over the nation, the quibbles and quirks of the lawyers defeat the ends of justice nine times out of ten. We are pronounced in our opposition to mob or lynch law. Where it is made to do justice one, it is the engine of oppression, of private malice and unreasoning prejudice, a dozen or score of times so, where the machinery of our courts is free to act the guilty one be punished lawfully as well as justly; and it is to be hoped that our law makers, now in session, will put upon the statute book laws framed to protect the people and not to render easy the escape of criminals from the punishment or their misdeeds. Sweep away all the flimsy technicalities that now hamper and defeat the right, and above all let men of intelligence and honor sit on our juries instead of the class that so often disgrace the courtroom. It is high time that the fact that a man being able to read the newspapers and inform himself as to current events, one capable of forming his own judgment on all subjects of ordinary interest, should no longer disqualify him as a juror. As the laws are at present administered, the better qualified a man is to serve on a jury the less possibility is there of his being accepted."

The death of Mrs. Mary Craig, said to have been the largest woman in the United States took place recently at Danville, Ind. It is reported that she weighed 800 pounds, and was six feet in height. For a long time she was exhibited by Barnum, under the name of Rosina Richardson.

THREE HUNDRED TRIPS.—The Toronto "Mail" says: Capt. W. McMeikan, of the Bathula, has traveled 936,000 miles on the Atlantic and never lost a man. Such a record rarely falls to the lot of a sailing master, particularly if he be the captain of an ocean steamer and has to do with a large number of passengers. With the recent arrival of the Bathula in New York Capt. McMeikan completed his three hundredth trip across the Atlantic. On these trips he has attended altogether to the welfare of more than 60,000 passengers, of whom 18,000 were first class. On this last trip the Bathula brought over 225 first class passengers, the largest number of its class on record.

STEERING A SHIP BY ELECTRICITY.—An Edinburgh electrician has invented an apparatus for steering a ship by electricity. The object is to dispense with a helmsman and make the compass itself steer the ship. For this purpose the compass card is fitted with an index which is set to the true course, and one degree on either side are adjusted; each pin is connected to a single Daniell cell, and when the ship deviates as much as a degree from her course on one side or the other, the index comes into contact with one or other metal pin, the result is that a positive or negative current flows and actuates a hydraulic apparatus which works the helm.

FIVE counties in Michigan suffered by the great fire. The number of dwellings burned was 117. The burnt district has an extent of about 2300 square miles. Not all this was devastated, but an area of about 900 square miles was left without a building nor a living tree standing upon it.

Her two sons, Mr. C. J. Bonaparte and Colonel Jerome Bonaparte, were with her in her last hours. The late Mme. Bonaparte was the daughter of Benjamin Williams, a prominent merchant of Bal-

timore, originally of Roxbury, Mass. In November 1825 she married Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte, the only son of Jerome Napoleon, brother of the great Emperor, and Elizabeth Patterson. She was a very wealthy lady and brought her husband a large fortune. She survived her husband about 11 years. Of the two sons of Mme. Bonaparte the elder, Colonel Jerome Napoleon Bonaparte, is a graduate of West Point and was a lieutenant in the United States Army. He also served with distinction in the French army. C. J. Bonaparte, the younger son, is a member of the bar at Baltimore.

An Englishman named Suggs has invented a new gas lamp which bids fair to come in direct competition with the Brush electric light, for street purposes at least. The new invention provides for four gas jets in one lamp, each of which jets is equal to 40 candle power. The cost, of course, is only that of four burners in one lamp, and the light is fully six times greater than the ordinary gas light. The street in front of the house of Parliament, London, is lighted with the Suggs lamp, and a number of them have been on trial in St. Louis, with satisfactory results.
