It is printed in tabular form, on card board, and is valuable for reference, giving the names, ages, nativity occupation and residence of each officer and every member of both Houses.

The youngest member of the legislature is W. W. Holcomb, aged 23, from Klitchit Co., and the oldest is Thos. Warman, aged 60, from Pacific Co. The most experienced one is Amosa Miller, of King Co., who is credited with 9 legislative terms. The only member born in Washington Territory is Conclumina Wallace, of Colville Co., aged 30.

Pilot Commissioners' Meeting.

PORT TOWNSEND, MONDAY, NOV. 7, 1881. The regular quarterly meeting of the Pilot Board of Pilot Commissioners was held this day.

Present—C. C. Bartlett, chairman, Capt. J. H. Swift, Capt. B. S. Hoxie, commissioner.

Reports were read and accepted from Pilot James Diggs, E. H. McManis, N. E. Oliver and W. H. Stevens.

Capt. John Edwards petitioned for a license as a Pilot Sound Pilot and after having been thoroughly examined by Commissioners Swift and Hoxie, and having been found competent, it was ordered that a license be granted. John Edwards as a Pilot Sound Pilot upon his giving the bond required by law, whereupon said Edwards filed a bond with E. A. Hart, Bartlett and D. C. H. Hoxie, child as sureties, and a license was issued in due form.

Ordered that hereafter no special license for Pilot shall be issued unless in case of a vessel at Port Townsend wanting a Pilot, when a special license to pilot that particular named vessel may be granted. But all such special licenses shall only be issued at Port Townsend.

Ordered that hereafter, all vessels applying outside the outer limits are entitled to half pilotage if pilot is reported, and that all vessels applying within the limits shall be free to any pilot offering his services to take her out.

Leave was given to give up charge of Pilot Diggs, who was granted Pilot License to proceed to Victoria to pilot a vessel he has purchased for a pilot boat.

Secretary read a communication from Edward Crow Baker, Esq., Secretary of the Pilot Commissioners of Victoria, relating to mutual non-interference about jurisdiction on the straits of Juan de Fuca and American pilots from Capeattery to Race Rocks. From there eastward is in American waters and northward is British Columbia waters, that our pilots can take vessels in from there to Esquimaux or Victoria, they may give up charge of Pilot as may be agreed on between the Pilots themselves, as has been the custom for many years past.

Secretary Baker also complained that Pilot Stevens had refused to give up ship Harry Morse when taken by Pilot Mcintosh of Pil' Port.

Board decided that as the ship Harry Morse is an American vessel and was bound to the Columbia river and merely anchoring in Royal Roads, and as she was actually taken by Pilot Stevens as far as the Columbia river, he did perfectly right in not giving her up to Pilot Mcintosh, of the Victoria Pilots.

Ordered that the Secretary communicate the action of the Board to Pilot Commissioners of Victoria.

No other business being presented the Board adjourned.
