Hurray for Mukilteo!

Bellingham Bay, nor Seattle's deep pond, Will never get much of the "Company's bond," To the devil Olympia with her tide-flats may go, But the railroad will help little Mukilteo.

A rumor was put in circulation here in town, on the arrival of the North Pacific on Thursday last, that the Northern Pacific Railroad Company had really located its final terminus, and that surveyors were on the spot busily engaged in laying off the site for the modern Carthage that is to be on this Mediterranean of the Pacific.

Some two weeks ago we were made aware that the railroad company would send a party of surveyors from this side to explore the Skagit River Pass through the Cascades, and that the supplies for this party would be stored somewhere near the point where the surveyor's work would begin is natural to suppose.

Mukilteo is located on Point Elliott, on the south side of Port Gardner, which is the water between the southern end of Whidby Island and the eastern mainland. The place is at present the trading post of Messrs. Frost & Fowler, about which are settled a few families.

If there is any truth in the rumor, Port Townsend will be benefited; much more so than if the terminus of the road were located at Olympia for the next four or five years.

A CONSTITUTIONAL DEAD HEAD.—Allowing for the charming ambiguity of the first sentence of the subjoined paragraph from the Echo, what a consistent critic the inditer proves himself to be.

We heard, in fact we ascertained beyond a doubt, by a forced loan from our scanty purse of two dollars for the privilege of a part of our progeny to be present at an entertainment or performance given by Marshall's Japanese troupe.

MILITARY AND TELEGRAPH.—We understand that Gen. Canby intends to make a visit here with his family and will occupy quarters at the military station of Port Townsend for a couple of months during the summer.

MATHEW HURLEY, one of the men who walked away from the penitentiary the other day, has been arrested at Victoria, and will be given up to the authorities on this side.

Mr. Garfield and the "Courier."

The Puget Sound Courier has been pleased to discuss the observations of the Anous in relation to the election and Mr. Garfield. The Courier, like some men we wot of, seems to have the idea that what it says must and will be accepted as truth, however grossly the same may be perverted.

All very well, if the present was the beginning of Mr. Garfield's term. During the campaign of '70, in this Territory, while Congress was yet in session, Mr. Garfield in his speech at this place said of the custom-house that the bill for appropriations had been passed, but that he had secured a reconsideration of the same and had had an amendment attached thereto, providing an appropriation of \$50,000 for a custom-house for the District of Puget Sound.

The mail service between Port Townsend and Sitka was established before Mr. Garfield was elected. Afterwards it was dis-established, and although the advertisement for bids includes Port Townsend in the said route, there is no connection made here, and to communicate with Alaska we have to send our mail matter south to Portland, to have it brought by again on the way to its destination.

The many other matters alluded to, we suppose, are in a like predicament.

The Courier infers that questioning the policy of Mr. Garfield in these matters evinces an unworthy interestness on our part; that it is not Republican; that it is not patriotic.

If putting the interest of the public before that of its servant is not republican, then we are not.

If making an official's political success depend upon the manner in which he executes his work is not patriotic, then we are not!

This mode of logic adopted by the Courier shows of what stuff it is made—tears down the mud wall between its real policy and the public eye, and exposes its utter disregard of everything that pertains to the welfare of the public and its single devotedness to a league of men whose principles are as corrupt as is bid the logic by which they attempt to fasten themselves upon the people.

ROUGH ON AN OREGON JUDGE.—The Washington correspondent of the Eugene Journal, under date of the 24th of April, reports the following colloquy in the Senate about the citizenship of persons born in Oregon previous to 1846, which places Judge Deady at a serious disadvantage among his peers of the legal profession by a decision rendered last year in the case of McKay vs. Campbell.

Mr. Corbett called up the bill to make citizens of persons born in Oregon previous to the treaty of 1846, the same as if they had been born elsewhere in the United States.

Mr. Trumbull said he considered them as citizens already, but thought the passage of the bill could do no great harm, and would be a great gratification of the Senator from Oregon, who informed him that the courts in Oregon had decided that such persons were not citizens.

Mr. Thurman wanted to know what court had so decided, and on being informed by Mr. Corbett that it was the United States District Court, he exclaimed:

"Holy St. Patrick! what a court!" He pronounced such a decision supremely absurd and ridiculous, and said the Judge who made it "did not understand what

he was about." He thought there must be some mistake, and that no judge had made such a decision. He remarked that we claimed to 54 deg. 40 min., and thought it hardly possible for a United States judge to decide that we did not even own up to 49 deg., and only acquired that territory by treaty, and had to naturalize people born on its soil.

The case above referred to was commenced in the United States District Court of Oregon by Dr. William C. McKay, a three-fourth Indian, against defendant—one of the judges of election in Wasco county at the general election two years ago—for refusing his vote. Judge Deady decided adverse to plaintiff, much to the surprise of the higher minds among the legal profession, but as it was thought to be more economical to reverse the error of the court by legislation than by appeal, the decision was suffered to stand until it thus became a topic of decision in the United States Senate.

Consistency a Jewel.

The Courier, of the 18th inst., in an article relative to aid for railroads, quotes this plank from the platform of the California Republicans:

"That the subsidizing of railroads, or other private corporations, by grants of public lands or by taxation of private property in any form, is contrary to sound maxims of government, productive of gross corruption and abuse and a plain invasion of the rights of the citizen. And we hereby pledge the Republican party to an uncompromising opposition to any and all legislation for such purpose; and whereas the Supreme Court has decided that such legislation is not in conflict with the Constitution, therefore resolved, That we are in favor of an amendment to that instrument prohibiting the enactment of any law granting such subsidies."

This closely resembles the policy of the Chicago cow that gave the bucket of milk and then kicked it over, and the lamp, too. We believe in a reasonable amount of aid being extended to enterprises that tend to public benefit, but not in establishing them altogether at public cost. There is moderation in all things.

HALIBUT.—The schooner Sabina which went out to catch dogfish found her trail hooks loaded with halibut, the other day. She brought fourteen very large ones to town yesterday, which, we understand, were sold at one dollar apiece. These fish are plentiful this season.

FUNERAL.—The funeral of Capt. McIntyre's little son, who died at San Francisco on the 17th ult., took place from the residence of F. W. Pettygrove on Monday last. Rev. J. R. Thompson, of Olympia, conducted the obsequies.

Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to the regular call for the same, the Republican County Convention met on the 20th of May, when Albert Briggs was elected to the chair and Frank Wellington as Secretary.

Money Market.

Gold in New York 112 3/4. Currency, here, buying at 88c; selling at 89.

Exchange on San Francisco 1/2 of 1 per cent. premium.

Rates of interest vary according to amount; money can be had for from 1 1/2 to 1 per cent. a month.

The cause for the rise in gold is said to be on account of an increase in the rate of interest to 4 per cent, by the Bank of England, which has had the effect to call much coin from the United States.

Trade.

Local trade continues fair. Our merchants continue to lay in stocks which are called out by purchasers at a like rate.

One day this week the firm of Rothschild & Co. alone disposed of more than \$1500 worth of goods.

The northern fishing fleet for this coast will be very small this year; the scarcity of vessels in San Francisco operates against this industry.

There are more than 17,000 bales of wool now in San Francisco, awaiting sale and shipment.

Proceedings of the County Commissioners of Jefferson County, Washington Territory—Regular Session.

Monday, May 13, 1872.

Board met at 1 o'clock p.m.; present—C. C. Bartlett, C. E. P. Wood and R. S. Robinson, Commissioners.

The petition of S. S. Bulkeley and 30 others, asking to have a road laid out to Point Wilson, was presented; said road to commence at a point on the north side of the county road, about two hundred feet east of the old county cemetery, and thence running to Point Wilson. Ordered by the Board that the above-named petition be accepted and approved, so far as it refers to laying out said road, and that it be rejected as to other matters asked for. And it is further ordered that Thos. Bracken, A. A. Plummer and O. C. Hastings be appointed viewers to view out the route of said road, and report their findings at the next session of this Board, and that they meet for that purpose on the 21st day of May, 1872.

Ordered by the Board that viewers be appointed to view out the route of a road to commence near the west end of Stock and's lane, so called, in Port Townsend, thence running to the north of Hastings and Wilson marsh in a westerly direction over the most practicable route to strike the Cimacum road near Clinger's hill; and also to view the route of a road to commence at the junction of A. Briggs' private road with the Port Discovery road, thence to run to the proposed road above mentioned, over the most practicable route to a point on the north side of the Hastings and Wilson marsh; and further, that Henry Webber, A. Briggs and L. B. Hastings be appointed viewers to view out the route of said roads, and that they meet for that purpose on the 19th day of May, 1872.

The Supervisor of Road District No. 4 (Port Ludlow district) appeared with his road book and accounts, which were examined and approved, and his report placed on file.

Ordered by the Board that the money for saloon licenses in Jefferson County be paid to the Treasurer on or before the 15th day of May, 1872, and that any person to whom a license has been granted at this session of the Board, failing to pay the license money required for his license on or before that time, be proceeded against for violation of the license law, if he has retained liquor since May 1, 1872.

After an examination of the assessment roll as returned by the Sheriff, J. J. H. Van Bokkelen, for the year 1872, the full amount of the valuation of real and personal estate in Jefferson County was found to be \$477,336, which assessment roll was duly approved by the Board.

After an examination of the county accounts for the last year it was estimated by the Board that it would be necessary, in order to meet the current expenses of the County for the ensuing year and to pay a part of the demands against the County now outstanding, to raise by tax for County purposes \$3,341.35, whereupon it was ordered by the Board that

The County tax for the year 1872 be 7 mills on the dollar;

The School tax for 1872, 2 mills on the dollar;

The Special tax for 1872, 3 mills on the dollar;

The Territorial tax for 1872, 3 mills on the dollar;

The Poll tax for 1872, \$2;

The Road tax for 1872, 2 1/2 mills on the dollar;

The Poll Road tax for 1872, \$4.

The petition of J. G. Swan and 43 others, asking to have a bridge built across the slough in the beach on the Henry Wilson claim, was read and rejected for the reason that it would be more for the public interest to locate a road on the upland north of the Hastings and Wilson marsh, viewers having been appointed for that purpose.

The Board then adjourned.

The official charts for the location of the line of the Northern Pacific Railroad through the territories of Montana and Dakota have been filed in the General Land office at Washington. The line denoted on the charts crosses the Red River of the North at Fargo, just above the mouth of the Big Cheyenne river; thence nearly due west to the crossing of the Missouri river; at the mouth of Hart river; thence west to the crossing of the Yellowstone, at or near the mouth of Powder river; thence up through Bozeman Pass; thence past the site of Hamilton on up the valley of Jefferson and Wisdom rivers, through Big Hole or Deer Lodge Pass, down Deer Lodge and Hell Gate rivers to the mouth of Big Blackfoot river; hence straight across to and down the Snake and Flathead rivers to Coeur d'Alene Lake.
