The unearthing of silk frauds in connection with the New York customs service has been followed by disclosures of similar operations among the crockery dealers, several of whom are at the mercy of the Government.

Since the disagreement of the jury in the Tilton-Beecher trial, Plymouth Church has raised the salary of its idolized pastor to one hundred thousand dollars for one year. The object, partly, of this increase is to help him defray the expenses of the suit.

The Government has lately sold ten millions of dollars of the new five per cent. bonds and purchased nine millions of dollars in silver, which will be used to retire a similar amount of fractional currency. This begins to look like resumption, and gradually changing the form of our outstanding bonds we shall soon have a hard currency, and have to pay a much lower rate of interest on our debt.

TEXAS AND MEXICAN TROUBLES.—The capture of Cortina, the Mexican brigand, does not seem to put an end to depredations by Mexicans upon United States territory, as telegrams continue to report cases of plunder of our citizens. The Mexican Government is ill prepared to capture and punish its lawless subjects, if so disposed, and it may be necessary for our Government to assume the responsibility of punishing the marauders.

The jury in the case of John V. Smith, late engineer of the steamer Senator that was recently blown up at Portland, brought in a verdict of not guilty of manslaughter, which was received with demonstrations of joy by nearly all present. The Portland Bulletin in speaking of the trial says, the case has been an expensive one to the county but it is money well spent, as the lesson will have a tendency to make all engineers and firemen more careful in future, and, above all, it will bring engineers to the knowledge that if through carelessness any accident happens they will be held strictly accountable to the law, and punished the same as if maliciousness had entered into the deed.

NORTH PACIFIC RAILROAD.—Under a decree of Court all the assets of the North Pacific Railroad are to be sold the first week in August next. The bondholders have arranged to bid in the property and then push the construction of the line a distance of five hundred miles further west, where they find a large amount of business in the mining and stock-raising regions of Montana. They hope by this means to be able to realize something on former investments. Should such a result be attained the present year it will heighten the chances of its completion to the Pacific, as the adding to that of a few hundred more would suffice to the end had in view. Our Territory and Oregon are more or less interested in this matter.

AN IMPORTANT TRIAL.—The trial of John D. Lee, the Mormon, who is charged with having led the murderous band at the time of the Mountain Meadow massacre, was set for the 15th of the present month. Although many years have elapsed since that terrible slaughter of men, women and children, yet the capture of Lee has served to refresh the memory of readers every where, and much interest will be felt at the result of the trial. It is thought he will be convicted, and that the testimony will implicate Brigham Young and many other prominent Mormons. No pains or expense should be spared to sift the matter as far as possible, that the guilty may be discovered and punished, as they deserve. The annals of history hardly furnish a parallel to this unprovoked and horrible slaughter.

RESPECT FOR SACRED THINGS.

An English writer, by way of advice to young men, thus refers to this subject: "Impress your mind with reverence for all that is sacred. Let no wantonness of youthful spirits, ver betray you into profane sallies. Besides the guilt which is thereby incurred, nothing gives a more odious appearance to youth, than the affectation of treating religion with levity. Instead of being an evidence of superior understanding, it discloses a pert and shallow mind."

It has become a fact that in our country irreverence for sacred things has developed into a characteristic of society, and no element that enters into American humor has a higher place, excepting, perhaps, extravagance of speech. No one can calculate the injury inflicted by even the slightest jest or pun, which has for its basis a justly revered character, or a verse of the sacred Scriptures. But it seems to be held that the more sacred the subject the keener the joke. It cannot be denied that the flippant references often made by newspapers to George Washington are apt to weaken the respect and affection of the rising generation for his name and fame; and so with every other character sacred or profane.

This irreverence of the men finds its counterpart in the boys, and the mass of our youth are growing up to respect and reverence neither age nor sanctity, and there is little hope of reformation so long as men set them the example, and violations of propriety and good taste are witty or funny. It is said that in the Reign of Terror in France, while the men were cutting off human heads and carrying them around Paris on pikes, the boys were imitating them by guillotining cats and carrying around their heads on sticks. So all of the evil practices of men seem readily adopted or imitated by the boys. No better example of this all-pervading irreverence can be furnished, than that of the little boy who being told by his mother the story of the two-and-forty children who were torn by bears for mocking the prophet, instead of heeding the moral, went put into the street and saluted the first bald-headed individual he met, with, "Go up thou bald-head! Now bring on your bears." And it is not inaptly illustrated by the Sunday school, which was addressed by the minister, upon the solemn subject of life, death and a judgment to come, in tones so pathetic and tears so sincere that he seemed to touch chords of tenderest feeling; but when he concluded his remarks by requesting them to sing Jordan, instead of "Jordan's stormy banks," he was shocked to hear in one unbroken chorus that "Jordan am a hard road to travel."

It might be reasonably supposed that in an enlightened Christian land a stream whose banks had been hallowed by the footprints of prophets and of saints, whose waters mirrored the peaceful dove that descended upon the Redeemer, and whose flow makes music with the dying song of praise, and fills the departing soul with visions of "sweet pastures by the still waters," would not be polluted by the ribaldry of our youth.

The subject is solemnly suggestive to thoughtful minds. Year by year the rising youth of our land are stepping forward to assume the duties of life and citizenship, and is there not room for apprehension, lest bereft of regard for the sanctity of law—human and divine—society shall drift to anarchy and ruin? There is no safety under a government where each man is a sovereign, except in the inculcation of a never-failing respect and reverence for the good, the truly great and the sacred. They lie at the foundation of all public usefulness and private worth. Without them genius is blasted, and talent is misdirected and made an engine of evil.

LATEST NEWS

By Telegraph and Mail.

Col. Steinberger, who went to the Navigator Islands as U. S. Commissioner, was warmly received by the natives. The Colonel framed a constitution for the islands, making the government an elective monarchy, the king to serve four years, to be chosen alternately from the two royal families who have previously been rulers of the islands. Steinberger is elected prime minister for life.

Fred Douglas and others have taken initial steps towards starting a weekly paper in Washington City devoted to the interests of negroes.

Louis McLane leaves Baltimore on the 20th inst., for San Francisco, having completed arrangements for eastern connections of the new bank.

A dispatch from Cincinnati says the Licking river is rapidly rising. The coal elevator of Gordon & McClure, was carried away.

A dispatch from Raleigh, N. C., states that a most inhuman murder, committed in that county last March, has just come to light. A white man named Portinas cut his wife's throat, then cut her head off, unjoined her at every joint, then cut the flesh off her bones and attempted to burn her body up, but did not succeed. Then he murdered his child, 8 months old, in the same manner and buried the two bodies in a marsh, where they were found last week by the infuriated neighbors. Circumstances show Portinas and one of his brothers accessory to the murder.

The people and temporary residents of Peckskill and neighborhood, preceded by a band of music and a company of militia went to the residence of Henry Ward Beecher on the evening of the 13th. After a speech by Judge Wells Mr. Beecher made an address. Among other things, he said: "When I began my life I had no intention of being a great and eloquent and wise man, but I did mean to be a good man and honest, and I did mean to spend all the strength God gave me in making my fellow men better. This I have done by the help of God. I make this assertion more emphatically because a few papers seem to think I have done it by the help and permission of newspapers but I have done it in spite of them. I don't ask that they should care for my future. My future is in the keeping of the God to whom my mother directed me. I have no new course to take; am too old to change my position; shall go on trusting men. I have pursued that doctrine all my life, and only once in forty years have I made a mistake. The expenses of the trial have been enormous—enough to bankrupt a country minister five times over, and would have destroyed me but for Plymouth Church, and even with their help I shall barely get through, for the expenses to me have been over 75,000 dollars.

The officers of the Central Pacific Railroad have dropped upon 100,000 acres of land bought by Miller in Oregon. Stealings thus far discovered exceed \$600,000.

Gen. John A. Logan, of Illinois, arrived in San Francisco on the 12th, on a short business tour.

The following is a telegram from San Francisco to Victoria dated July 13th: Mr. Rhodes, the new mail contractor, has succeeded in making most favorable arrangements for first-class steamers to Victoria. The steamers to be employed will be taken from the China and Panama lines. They are new, are fitted with every modern convenience, are fast and reliable, and are ranked among the best ships that sail from San Francisco. The British steamship, Vasco de Gama, will be the first ship of the line. She will sail hence for Victoria on the 22d inst., sailing from Victoria for San Francisco on the 1st of August. She will be followed by vessels equally good, which are now being prepared for that important and too-long neglected trade.

Mrs. Algernon Sartoris gave birth to a son on the 11th inst., at Long Branch.

Gen. Frank P. Blair died at St. Louis on the 9th inst.

A dispatch to Superintendent Adams of the Express Company of Cincinnati, states that a desperate attempt was made to rob express messenger Burke, on the Illinois and Vandalia Railroad. The engine and car were cut loose and the engineer killed. Burke barricaded the doors and kept the robbers at bay until help arrived.

A Washington special says the Republican Congressional Committee are sending out to all the Federal officials of the country, demanding one per cent. of their salaries for carrying on the Fall campaign.

Bark Union Intentionally Wrecked by her Captain and Mate.

On the 8th of May last information was received in this city of the sinking of the bark Union on Clark's Island, at the eastern entrance to the Straits of Rosario, B. C. The bark was owned by Donald Beadle of this city and others, the Captain, J. M. Lindell, having a one-fifteenth interest. She sailed from this port on the 20th of March, bound for Nanaimo, where she was to take a cargo of coal and return to this port. The announcement of her wreck and total loss excited great surprise, because of the unusually safe character of the locality where she was sunk. Circumstances which have since transpired have heightened the surprise in no inconsiderable degree and developed the particulars of a dastardly plot between Captain Lindell and his mate, a fellow named Dean, to run the vessel on a rock for the purpose of obtaining the interest of the captain in the insurance. The vessel was insured for five thousand dollars in the State Investment Company, and for five thousand in the Commercial Company. On the voyage from this port the captain and mate held frequent consultations over the matter in the cabin whenever the lack of deck supervision permitted.

Notwithstanding their caution, the steward, whose duties led him in and out of the cabin on several occasions during a conversation between his superior officers, managed to catch the outlines of the plot, and subsequently confirmed his suspicions by giving close attention to the dialogue while pretending to perform his regular duties. On the passage up the vessel ran aground on a flat in Puget Sound, but managed to work off in about two hours and proceeded to Nanaimo. The captain and his mate had contemplated abandoning the vessel, but upon consideration, they resolved upon waiting until they should be on the return trip with the cargo on board. Upon the arrival at Nanaimo about 250 tons of coal were taken on board. In the meantime the steward apprised the American Consul at Victoria of the plot which he had overheard and prophesied that the bark would never reach San Francisco.

The Consul acquainted the U. S. authorities in this city with the steward's prophecy, and it was followed in a couple of days by the announcement of its fulfillment in the wrecking and total loss of the vessel. The spot which the conspirators chose for the consummation of their plot was Clark's Island, a rock located at the eastern entrance to the Straits of Rosario and distanced three days sail from Departure Bay. Before the time had arrived the boats were got ready and everything prepared for a sudden desertion of the vessel. On the third day, the bark struck, the bark struck. The weather was fine and water almost as smooth as in our bay. The boats were lowered and the vessel abandoned. Many of the sailors repaired to Victoria, but the captain and mate came to this city. The Secret Service Department had been apprised of the affair, and Detective Finnegan was on the lookout for the conspirators. He succeeded in arresting the mate Dean and a watch was maintained on the residence of the Captain, and when he put in an appearance he was also arrested. It will be a matter of news to the majority of readers when it is learned that the penalty for this offense is DEATH. The mate has confessed everything.

The barkentine Amelia, Capt. McFarland, is now loading for San Francisco. The new schooner Ida Schauer, Capt. Schauer, recently launched, sailed for San Francisco last Saturday with about 250,000 feet of lumber. She is a facsimile of the Cassie Hayward, and is the eighth vessel built here by the Messrs. Hall. Her dimensions were given last week. The builders are undoubtedly constructing some of the finest vessels ever built on the Pacific coast.

No. 9 and 10 are now on the stocks. The former, not yet named, building for Utter & Ojeda, owners of the Coos Bay coal mine, Henry Winkelman and others of San Francisco, is to be a three-masted schooner, 135 feet long, thirty-three feet beam, nine and a half feet depth of hold, with fourteen inches rise at half floor, has Capt. W. G. Hall's patent stern-post, and all modern improvements, as steering-gear, patent travelers, windlass, capstan, &c. She has a very roomy house on deck for officers, with large quarter-deck aft of it; the fore-castle is below deck. She will register about 350 tons and carry 600 tons of coal.

No. 10 is a companion vessel to the above in every respect excepting her depth of hold will be ten feet. No. 9 will be launched about the 15th of August, No. 10 by the middle of October.

In addition to these vessels the Messrs. Hall are to build, and launch by the middle of November, a sister vessel to the Cassie Hayward, with some slight deviation in model.

Letter from Dungeness.

The Fourth of July was celebrated by the people of this place with a picnic, reading the Declaration of Independence and an oration by the speaker of the day on the third, Saturday. Demonstrations, however, were kept up until the fifth by some individuals, accompanied by the use of fire-crackers, and one fight was brought on by drinking bad whisky. The house and store of Wm. Law were nearly set on fire by firecrackers being thrown through his bedroom window, thereby setting the bedding on fire. Mr. Law has failed thus far to discover the miscreant.

There is a species of caterpillar doing a great deal of mischief to the hay and grain crops of this place. Some of the hay fields look like a porcupine's back, the leaves and seed are eaten, leaving nothing but the bare poles standing. The potato vines have been stripped of their leaves, leaving only the bare stalks. The worm resembles what is called the army worm in the Eastern States. It is believed it will not injure the hay after it is cut down, and where the farmers have so done the worms leave and travel to the next field. While going along a road yesterday I came to a place where the hay was cut on one side and was surprised to find my route covered with worms traveling to the other fields across the road. It is impossible to walk without stepping on them.

Letter from Port Ludlow.

I have no hesitation in saying that Port Ludlow, at the present writing, is as busy a place as any on Puget Sound. The mill commenced running at night Wednesday week, Mr. Arthur Attridge as foreman. The night sawing added to the average day cut of 60,000 feet, will show a nice little total at the end of each month.

Mr. Phlaney is constantly making improvements in and around his mill. He has recently extended his lumber wharf 25 feet in width by 300 in length. The Forest Queen, on her last trip, brought several new boilers which will soon be placed in position in the new building adjoining the mill, giving greatly increased power to the machinery.

LOCAL NEWS.

A COLLISION.—Last Sunday, about 3 o'clock P. M., as the Pilgokofsky was towing the barkentine W. H. Gawley down the Straits she collided with the bark Florence, upward bound, near Pillar Point. The circumstances attending the accident were such as to exculpate either party from blame, as a heavy fog prevailed at the time. The usual precautions had been observed on both sides—the blowing of the steamer's whistle and the sounding of the fog horn on board the Florence—and look-outs were on the alert, but neither party could discern an object at the distance of one hundred and fifty feet. All at once the Florence, with a fair wind and all sail set loomed up before the steamer and but a short distance off making directly across the steamer's bows. The emergency would not admit of any delay, and the captain of the steamer feeling assured that if she struck him amidstships he would go down prepared to ward off the impending fate by turning sufficiently to meet her bow to bow. The concussion resulted in considerable damage to both vessels, but fortunately no lives were lost. The Florence has gone to Port Blakely for repairs and will soon resume her regular trips, while the Polikofsky returned to Port Madison for similar treatment.

A PRACAS occurred at the county jail in this city on last Tuesday morning between the prisoners confined there, which came near terminating fatally to one of the parties. The origin of it appears to have been in a disregard of the courtesy usually existing between them. Watts, an inmate of long standing, was engaged in cooking, and the odor of some grease spilled on the hot stove not being congenial to the olfactory of one Tom Wright, he demurred to the proceeding. The ire of the cook was raised simultaneously with a hatchet he held in his hand, which latter descended upon the head of the unfortunate demurrer with such frequency and force as not only to perforate the scalp in three distinct places but also liberated several particles of bone from the skull. The uproar soon attracted the attention of the keepers, when the melee was ended, Dr. Wheeler called, damages repaired as nearly as possible, and peace once more enthroned with quietude in the ascendant.

RESCUE.—A horse belonging to Mr. F. W. James while hitched to a post in front of the store, on last Tuesday, took fright at the upsetting of a load of wood near by, and jumping, carried away the post, which being attached to his neck by a strong halter, served to increase his fright, and he ran around a couple of blocks striking out with his hind feet at the post, which was swinging right and left to the imminent danger of pedestrians as well as those who used efforts to stop him. He was finally captured near his starting point through the intervention of Mr. Delitang's sign-post, around which the log caught, and he was thrown down, when he was relieved of the saddle and liberated without sustaining material injury.

RAVAGES OF WORMS.—Reports reach us from Chimicum of alarming losses upon the crops of the entire valley by worms. They consist of apparently two varieties—those devouring the grass being green in color, while those at work upon the vegetables are gray. Large fields of grass are destroyed by the former in a comparatively short time. One of the farmers, Mr. Bishop, told us that he would lose fifty tons of hay by them. Mr. Trivigs, captured twenty-two of the vegetable eaters around one onion stalk.

On Wednesday evening last, the distribution of prizes took place in the writing school taught by Prof. E. J. Helms, at the public school-house. Master E. F. Plummer took the prize for the best penmanship, and Miss Mary E. Plummer for most improvement. The professor has gone to Port Gamble where he intends to organize a school, and we predict that he will have a large class. We are informed that the scholars he had here have been greatly benefited.

A BASKET of most delicious strawberries, from the garden of Mr. J. B. Murphy, one of the early settlers upon this peninsula, was laid upon our table last Tuesday. They were not only excellently flavored but exhibited a uniformity of rare size, few of them going less than five inches in circumference. Thanks, friend Murphy.

The steamer Linnie, Capt. Smith, arrived on Wednesday morning with a boom of piles from Utsalady for H. L. Tibbals, Esq.

THE Nicaraguan ship Mathilde, which has been lying at anchor off the city for several days past has gone to Burrard Inlet.

THE Gussie Telfair, from Portland via Shoalwater Bay, arrived Wednesday night freighted with produce and general merchandise.

ANOTHER COLLISION—this time in our harbor, between the schooner Lotta and sloop Fannie. The latter was engaged in conveying material to the ship Mathilde, lying at anchor a short distance from the pier, when she ran aground of the Lotta, carrying away her bowsprit, and at the same time demolishing her own mainsail.

A STABBING AFFRAY occurred at Port Discovery on the 10th inst., between two sailors of the brig Deacon, named Johnson and Lewis. During the affray Lewis received five cuts on different parts of his body, one of which was at the time considered dangerous. The wounds were dressed by Drs. Miner and Wheeler and the patient is now doing well.

SHOT HIMSELF.—A German, named Fred. Heim, who had a saloon under Mr. Eisenbeis's store, shot himself in his quarters about 4 o'clock P. M. of Thursday. The bullet penetrated the thoracic wall from the left side, about an inch above and to the outer side of the left nipple, entering the lung. Dr. Wheeler was called and bestowed all the attention possible, and at this writing (Friday morning) hopes are entertained of his recovery. The cause of the rash act is attributed to pecuniary embarrassment.

Two Indians, named Jim and George, were brought before Judge Learned on Monday, for being drunk and disorderly—fined, each, \$5 and costs. The same day James Good, charged with disorderly conduct, was brought before his honor—fined \$2.50 and costs.

Port Gamble Items.

The weather has been very warm—90 degrees in the shade. The public school has closed to be reopened next September.

Births are on the increase—marriages are in prospect—deaths none. The mills are running night and day, cutting about 150,000 feet of lumber during the 24 hours.

The bark David Hoadley, for San Francisco, and the South American ship Erminia Alvarez, for Valparaiso, sailed on the 10th.

The bark Rainier, from Vallejo, arrived on the 11th, and is loading for San Francisco.

Several vessels are due from San Francisco and South America. They will doubtless be along soon. Mr. Perry, an enterprising citizen of this place launched a pretty little schooner last week, named after his little daughter, L. J. Perry. She has a capacity of about eighty tons, and looks "a thing of life" upon the placid waters of Gamble bay.

Professor McDonald is giving lectures on phrenology to large audiences. The professor is a fine speaker and affords instruction and amusement to his hearers. He intends paying Port Townsend a visit soon.

The Band discourses almost nightly, and, under the management of Mr. Low, is acquiring an enviable reputation. Too much credit cannot be awarded the indefatigable manager for his efforts. A purse of \$250 was donated the members on the Fourth. It comprises 16 instruments.

The free library and reading-room is an attractive feature. Here large numbers congregate out of working hours and on Sundays. Papers and magazines from all parts of the world, beside several hundred bound volumes by our most popular authors, adorn its shelves.

The Teakale Hotel has recently been renovated and, under the management of Mr. Condon, is doing a good business. Soft beds and good wholesome food is John's motto.

Capt. Foster has been appointed Agent for the Seattle Homestead Association, and is disposing of a large number of shares at this place. To parties of small means this appears to be an excellent opportunity for investment. The Captain, we believe, intends giving the people at Port Townsend a chance in a short time.
