

This is supposed to mean that the laborers upon the railroad, who have been kept out of their pay for months past, are now to receive their dues, and this is a cause for public congratulation. not only because it will relieve the disresses of a large number who were suffering for the wages which had been nonestly earned by labor, but allays the lesperation which was constantly liable to incite the most fearful crimes, putting in jeopardy the lives and property of innocent as well as guilty. The Tribune could not announce this fact without exhibiting its habitual toadyism to power by characterizing as "Modocs" the laborers who had been starved to desperation by withholding from them their hard earnings and only means of support for themselves and helpless families, forcing them to the last resort of threats and demonstrations of violence to recover the bread which had been snatched from the mouths of their starving little ones by a combination of heartless speculators. It is no credit to the railroad managers that these poor toiling men are to be paid their wages after so long delay; and instead of adding insult to injury, they ought to be thankful for the forbearance by which they have escaped the natural consequences of the great provocation they have given to lawless violence.

As the wife of the Attorney General ranks her husband in public honors and social position. As a politician, standing upon her rights as a voter, old Susan B. Anthony, Victoria Woodhull and Mrs. Dunaway would outrank her; an object of contempt to all chivalrous men and of horrer to all right-minded mothers of growing sons and daughters. 




