NOMINATIONS.

The Democratic District Convention, at Seattle, on Feb. 22d, nominated O. F. Gerish as delegate at large to the Constitutional Convention, and Col. C. H. Larrabee as delegate for the 3d Judicial District. The Democratic nominees from the Council Districts are as follows: King county, David Sires, Kitsap, Snohomish and Whatcom, Mr. Emery, of Port Madison.

The Republican District convention met at Seattle on Feb. 23. Edward Eldridge, of Whatcom, was nominated as candidate at large, and James Beavy, of Port Townsend, for the Third Judicial District.

L. B. Andrews had been selected as the candidate for the King county Council District, and S. Hayes of Port Gamble, from the Council District of Whatcom, Snohomish and Kitsap counties.

ITEMS FROM LA CONNER.

The social changes at this place, the capital of the tide marshes, are quite noticeable and worthy of mention. The public hall is being used this winter as the place of assembly of the Washington literary society of La Conner. Dr. T. C. Mackey is president, John McGinn Esq., vice president and Dr. J. S. Church secretary and treasurer. Under these efficient officers it is not only doing a good work in La Conner, but its influence is strongly felt over the whole Snohomish flats. When the roads are not so muddy as to become impassable, large numbers from the surrounding country come to enjoy these pleasant and profitable meetings. The following agreement proves La Conner to be the banner town on the vexed Chinese question:

"We, the undersigned citizens of La Conner and vicinity, do hereby agree that we shall use every lawful means to discourage the introduction of Chinamen in our midst; and we further agree that we shall under no circumstances whatever employ Chinese as laundrymen, in our kitchens, workshops, as farm laborers or in any capacity whatever."

There was an attempt made to start a Chinese laundry in the place. The whole question was debated in the literary society, after which a copy of the above agreement was drawn up and circulated through the town, when over twenty-five residents of the place signed it, being all to whom it was presented.

With the exception of Clerk of the District Court, the following is a list of the professional and business men at present resident at La Conner: Doctors—Mackey, Powers and Church; lawyers—W. R. Andrews and L. Thomas; hotels—the La Conner hotel, J. J. Conner proprietor, and the Maryland House, John McGinn proprietor. Mr. Gilliland is, as ever, the old and reliable telegraph operator. The two stores for the sale of general merchandise are kept by Gatches Bros. and L. L. Andrews. Wm. Tracy and W. T. Deere have recently opened up a saloon in a new building erected for their use. Church & Bowman are kept very busy at their business of boat builders, while Potter & Chandler have boats to let, and are prepared to carry passengers to any desired point they may wish to go in small boats. W. R. Andrews has so far created an excellent impression in his favor at that place. Dr. Powers was for some time with Dr. Minor at Port Townsend. He will, no doubt, do well in his new location. Mr. Alexander, formerly of Whidby Island, is conducting the drug store started by Dr. Mackey, the doctor's time being too well occupied at his profession to make it desirable to try to run the drug store.

Mr. McGinn formerly had charge of the Swinomish reservation. Recently he purchased the valuable property where he is now located. His accommodations are not extensive, but everything is fixed up so tidy, neat and clean, with food so well cooked and served in so acceptable a manner, that no pleasant place could be desired than his hotel for a week's lodging. Mr. Conner's hotel is so well known, as well as its pleasant spoken proprietor, that it is unnecessary to further describe him or his well filled hotel.

Bayard Taylor has been nominated envoy extraordinary, and minister plenipotentiary to Germany by the President. So hot the man who has imitated Joaquin Miller is to be a minister! Now may the long haired bard of Oregon take courage; his style is coming into respect, and ere long, perhaps himself will be made happy by the bestowal of some long-wished-for foreign office.

WHAT'S BEFORE US.

The prophecy was made some 400 years ago foretelling the event of the Crimean war of 1854, and the destruction of the Turkish power as the result of the present contest, that now appears so like being fulfilled; also foretells the end of this world in 1881. This prophecy of old mother Shipton is now going the rounds of the press, and, as if this was not enough, the astrologers now assert their prediction that between 1881 and 1885, all life on this globe is to undergo the severest possible test and trial, caused by the co-incident perihelia of the four great planets, Jupiter, Uranus, Saturn and Neptune, an event that has not taken place before since the Christian era—the theory being that when one or more of these large planets are nearest to the Sun, it so disturbs the condition of our atmosphere as to cause pestilence, failure of crops, &c., &c., and all the woes attendant thereon.

Olney, who commands the Yakima, is one of the most able, prompt, faithful and reliable, as well as accommodating officers, and his boat is one of the best on the Sound. The trade of the Puget Mill Company by this would be more than double what it is now, if not nearly equal to the trade of this place with Seattle.

The Austrian government is apparently desirous of having peace, but at the same time it is quietly preparing for war. Troops to the number of 80,000 have been assembled at Pesh, and two camps of 20,000 men have been established at Palosa. Arrangements have been completed whereby they will be supplied with provisions should they take the field.

A sample of the Russian army bread recently analyzed in Bulgaria, was found to contain 19 per cent. of saw dust, and 14 per cent. of sand. The army contractor is evidently as much of an institution in the Czar's dominions as he was in the United States during the civil war. No wonder that the Russian soldiers gave evidence of having sand in their craves.

EASTERN STATES.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28—A message has just been received from the President, announcing that he had vetoed the silver bill. It has not yet been laid before the House.
The House at half past one passed the silver bill over the President's veto, by a vote of 196 against 73. The vote will be taken in the Senate shortly.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE TERRITORY OF WASHINGTON.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of the Territory, by an act approved the 9th day of Nov. A. D. 1877, provided that a special election should be held in said Territory on the 9th day of April, 1878, for the purpose of choosing delegates to assemble at Walla Walla, in said Territory, on the 11th day of June, A. D. 1878, to frame a State Constitution, and—

WHEREAS, it is further provided in said act that the delegates to said convention shall be elected in the Territory at large and in districts as follows:—

- 3 delegates in the Territory at large.
- 1 delegate in the First Judicial District.
- 1 delegate in the Second Judicial District.
- 1 delegate in the Third Judicial District.
- 1 delegate in the county of Walla Walla.
- 1 delegate in the county of King
- 1 delegate in the counties of Thurston and Lewis.

1 delegate in the counties of Clark, Skamania, Killekat and Yakima.

1 delegate in the counties of Cowlitz, Pacific and Wahkiakum.

1 delegate in the counties of Pierce, Chehalis and Mason.

1 delegate in the counties of Clallam, Island, Jefferson and San Juan.

1 delegate in the counties of Kitsap, Suquamish and Whatcom.

1 delegate in the counties of Columbia, Stevens and Whitman.

WHEREAS, it is further provided in said act that the counties of Shoshone, Idaho and Nez Perce, in the Territory of Idaho may be represented in said convention by one delegate, who shall have the privilege of the floor, but shall not be entitled to a vote.

Now, THEREFORE, I, ELISHA P. FEBRY, Governor of the Territory of Washington, by virtue of the power of authority in me vested by said act, do hereby call a special election to be held in the several counties in this Territory on the

Ninth Day of April, A. D. 1878,

for the purpose of electing the delegate heretofore mentioned. The said election to be conducted and returns thereof made and transmitted as is now provided by law in cases of general elections for Delegate to Congress, Prosecuting Attorney and members of the Legislative Council of the Territory. And the said counties of Inland, Nez Perce and Shoshone, in the Territory of Idaho, are requested to elect the delegate to said convention provided for in said act, at such time and in such manner as may be deemed advisable by the citizens of said counties.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed at Olympia, this
