## THE CANDIDATES FOR OFFICE.

It is but a few short weeks before the officers, who for the next two years will hold the different political offices in this Territory, will be elected.

All the different conventions have been held, the nominations made, and the citizen has only to select from the candidates in the field, those who will best represent his interests, or who will perform in the most efficient manner the duties of the office to which he may be elected. It was intended prior to the nominations being made, to give a full biographical sketch of each candidate in the field, but not having space for this purpose, only a mere mention can be made of any of them.

### DELEGATE TO CONGRESS.

This is justly considered the most important political prize. This year Walla Walla secured it, as N. T. Catoe the Democratic nominee and Thos. H. Brents the Republican, both hail from there both are lawyers of average ability. Catoe the man of the longest residence

and best practical knowledge of this coast, Brents the best scholar and perhaps the best lawyer, but of weakly physical developments, and unfitted for the work necessary to make a thorough canvass. It matters little which one is elected, except as it may be construed into an endorsement or condemnation of their respective party platforms, especially that part relating to the N. P. R. R.

### MILITARY ASPIRANTS.

For the first time in a number of years a full set of military officers are in nomination. The Republicans put forth for Brigadier General, John H. Smith, a retired Regular army officer, who held the rank of Capt. and who now resides at Walla Walla; for Adjutant General, A. Slorsh, who holds a similar position in the Grand Army of the Republic; and who now resides in Seattle and is a brewer by occupation. Dr. Sparling the candidate for Quartermaster General, has many years been an army surgeon, one who is well acquainted with military affairs, and has held various public positions in this Territory, he resides at Seattle. D. N. Smith the candidate for Commissary General is an old volunteer soldier, who for some six or seven years has been a practicing lawyer at Port Townsend.

The Democratic nominees for these positions are, Geo. Hunter, Brigadier General; C. D. Emery of Seattle for Quartermaster General; J. S. Walker for Commissary General, and J. B. O'Dell for Adjutant General. C. D. Emery's name was substituted on the death of the lamented Gerrish of Port Townsend.

### DISTRICT ATTORNEYS.

The candidates for this important office for this district are both young men Irvine Ballard, the Republican candidate is well known at the upper end of the Sound. He is a pleasant, agreeable speaker, and will carry a very large vote in Pierce and King counties. G. Morris Haller is almost a native of the Sound country, his people settling here when he was but little more than an infant. From Seattle north to British Columbia, on either side of the Sound there is scarcely a hamlet he has not visited, nor an old settler with whom he is not acquainted. He is a well read lawyer, accurate and careful in his practice, one who would make an excellent prosecutor, and who would thoroughly understand the wants and necessities of his constituents. He will carry an overwhelming vote in the lower Sound country, and his chances for an election are excellent.

Kitsap, Snohomish and Whatcom constitute one election district for Joint Councilman. The Democratic nominee is H. B. Emery of Kitsap county, who was elected from this Council District to the Constitutional Convention last spring. He is well and favorably known in his county, and will probably carry it in this contest, but Whatcom and Snohomish can scarcely fail to vote almost solid for John McGinnis of La Conner; as this gentleman knows so much more thoroughly the agricultural and other interests of this side at least, and will efficiently represent them. Like Mr. Emery he has studied law but does not practice it. For a number of years he was in charge of the Swinomish Indian Reservation, opposite La Conner, now he keeps a hotel in that thriving town. Wherever known he will have warm friends and supporters. He will probably be elected.

This county is entitled to only one Representative, yet there are three candidates; H. Blackman, Democratic, O. B. Iverson, Republican and W. B. Moore, Independent; Blackman ran for Sheriff two years ago; he is an excellent citizen a go ahead business man, and will make a good Representative. His majority will be strong up the river, and in other

parts of the county, he will carry enough votes to make his election probable. Mr. Iverson was elected Representative two years ago and he did good work. He is a man who has an extensive and varied political experience, and whose influence is always felt in committees etc. He controls a large vote among his personal friends and is generally considered as representing the Scandinavian element in the politics of this county, and as that class holds the deciding vote, it gives him considerable personal influence in such matters.

Mr. Moore is a very energetic man, who employs a great many men, has many personal friends and controls a number of votes that might otherwise be cast for Iverson in that section. Had he been regularly nominated he would stand a good show of election, as it is his strength will be light in this part of the county. The only two offices over which there will be any real contest are the offices of sheriff and county auditor.

### CANDIDATES FOR SHERIFF.

Benj. Stretch had held the Sheriff's office for nearly a dozen years past. Although always nominated by the Republicans, he has been largely supported by Democratic votes, and for his present term of office, had a Democrat, Wm. Whitfield as his deputy. Mr. W. has performed nearly all the duties of the office during that time, has inherited much of Mr. Stretch's former support, and now is regularly running for the office. He is a native of England, his birth place being not far from London; yet he has been a resident of this county for over thirteen years and knows almost every one here. The worst criticism likely to be made on him is his apparent fondness for official position; having the past two years held to the position of Co. Com. while accepting the place of deputy Sheriff. Still it must be said that he has taken great pains for a long time past to thoroughly qualify himself for official life, so that there are few if any persons now in this county who have a more thorough knowledge of the duties of this office than has Mr. Whitfield.

Were it not that he has an extra strong opponent in the person of J. H. Plaskett, the Republican nominee, Mr. Whitfield would not have enough opposition to render his election uncertain.

Mr. Plaskett was born in Wayne Co. Penn. in 1846, is now 32 years old. He came to the Sound in 1869. He has been in this county all the time since, except about one year. He has worked some five years in logging camps and been employed at the Snohomish Exchange Hotel about three years. He is not a person to crowd himself ahead and persistently urge his own claims for any place or position. That he is selected as the Republican candidate for this important office is solely because, he was deemed the best fitted for the position, and the strongest candidate that his party could put in the field, and not from any self seeking of his own. The character as a citizen and a man he has earned for himself here, will canvass for him more persistently than any electioneering of his own. He is one who has always well performed all the duties of his station, whether in the army or in civil life, and the people will have no cause to regret it if he is elected.

### COUNTY AUDITOR.

John H. Swett was elected to this office two years ago. He is a gentlemanly accommodating public officer, as reliable and trustworthy as can be found for the position which he represents; if not re-elected it will not be because any real criticism exists either as to the way he performs the duties of his office, or because of any jealousy or enmity towards him as a man, because there is no more popular man in the county than Mr.

Swett. Besides he is still suffering from the effects of a severe compound fracture of one of his limbs, that renders him unfitted for heavy manual labor. This arouses sympathy in his behalf.

Horace A. Gregory the Republican candidate in opposition to Mr. Swett, the Democratic candidate, is a native of Steuben Co. N. Y. Has lived in the states of Ill. Iowa and Minn. Was a soldier for most of the war of the Rebellion, and wounded twice, for which he now draws a pension. In Minn. he was appointed by the Governor as one of three Special Commissioners to organize Rock Co. in 1870. He then was chairman of Co. Com. Court two years and Clerk of the District Court of Rock Co. three years, which office he resigned to come to this Territory. He has been Clerk of the District Court of this county ever since it was first established, nearly three years ago. He writes an excellent record hand, and is thoroughly competent for any county office to which he may be elected, so that notwithstanding the claim of sympathy and the great personal popularity of Mr. Swett, the race will be very close between them.

### The Fair of the Washington Industrial Association at Olympia, W. T.

The ten days fair of this Association, terminating October 12th, was lacking in many respects those features of success desired by the friends of the Association. The continuous bad weather during almost the whole of the fair was one of the chief causes of poor success in the display as well as in the comparatively small attendance. Another cause, was the small interest displayed by the lower Sound. King county had a successful county fair, but contributed nothing to the Olympia fair. Not one exhibit was made by Snohomish county. Monks and Bennett were the only exhibitors from Whatcom Co. Monks was there from Fidalgo island with a valuable horse, and Bennett's exhibit had previously been displayed at the King county fair, at Seattle, consequently the flowers etc. looked soiled and wilted. The exhibit was almost wholly made by Thurston Lewis and Mason counties. Lewis county had just held a county fair and from her exhibit there made an excellent selection, and bore away the prizes usually awarded to Snohomish county. Owing to bad weather and other causes the women of Olympia made no display of those articles of Fancy work etc. which usually lend so attractive an appearance to the general exhibit there. There was a good display of pictures and works of art, several manufactures and merchants of Olympia made fine displays of the of their manufacture or which they keep goods in stock for sale. Among these was noticeable the fine display of boots made by Benj. Vincent of excellent workmanship and fine stock. L. A. Treca made a display of nearly twenty different varieties of boots and shoes from the very smallest infant's shoes up to the finest and highest priced corksoled, sewed Alligator boots with morocco tops. Scarcely more beautiful or better made pair of boots placed on exhibition than this pair made by Mr. Treca.

Despite the many discouraging circumstances attendant on this fair, the display of fruits was excellent in quantity as well as quality, both fresh as well as dried fruits etc. Mrs. Howard had some 40 different varieties of dried fruits vegetables fish etc. prepared by the Plummer process, which was among the most creditable features of the fair.

There was an excellent display of vegetables also, but secondary to the display of fruits. Had King county made selections from their fair, and the usual

amount been forwarded from Snohomish, the display would have been in this respect at least better than usual.

The dances attracted the young people there; the races are of some local interest at the time, but they do not assist in the development of the country, therefore an attempt will not be made to describe them.

And all County and Precinct officers provided for by the laws of said Territory.  
The electors will also at said election vote "For" or "Against" the Constitution of the State of Washington.  
"For" or "Against" Separate Article No. One of said Constitution.  
"For" or "Against" Separate Article No. Two of said Constitution.  
"For" or "Against" Separate Article No. Three of said Constitution.
