Good Report.

In a conversation with J. J. Stage, our old and experienced nursery man located but a short distance from the city on the Moran road, we learn that the fruit trees have all escaped damage from the winter.

He left with us a number of top twigs taken from peach, apple, cherry and plum trees and all show a healthy condition and well developed buds.

Even the apricot is in fine shape, and all the fruits promise an abundant yield the coming season.

Mr. Stage is well versed in treeology, having made the growing of fruit both for the market and for nursery purposes a close study for years, and his opinion on the subject is deserving of attention and will carry considerable weight.

He is satisfied that all of the fruit of the temperate zone will succeed in this climate and can be cultivated profitably.

Care should be taken not to over-cultivate about August.

We believe that as this part of the Territory becomes more thoroughly developed greater attention will be paid to orchard culture, and in a few years every land-owner will have sufficient fruit on his own place for home consumption, and the market will never be without a supply.

It would be well for parties taking up land to set aside a small tract at least for on hard purposes and by planting a choice variety of fruit trees not only lend additional value to the premises but when in bearing will find the satisfaction of having good fruit at hand sufficient payment for the trouble the orchard cost.

AN UNWISE MOVE.

A special dispatch to the *Tribune* from Spokane Falls, W. T., gives some very important information as to the feeling of the business men of that and other towns of that region concerning the recent advance in freight rates to the points by the Northern Pacific Railroad Company. There can be no doubt of the serious character of the situation to the business of the places named, and of the decided hardship it puts upon the wholesale merchants and manufacturers of Minneapolis and St. Paul. An advance of the freight rates between Minneapolis and Spokane Falls to a figure exactly equal to the rate between New York and Spokane is at once an absurdity and an injustice, concerning which there can be only astonishment and emphatic protest on the part of the entire Northwest. It is not easily understandable how the Northern Pacific Company could have thought it to its own interest to attempt a ruinous discrimination of this character against the very Territory through which its lines are built and upon which it must depend for its business, to say nothing of the charges of gross unfairness as to its business methods which it would be compelled to bear at the hands of reasonable business men everywhere. The cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul are certainly considerable elements in the development of the Northern Pacific system, and they would be so even if the Northern Pacific railroad extended much farther toward the east than it does. Occupying, as they do, practically terminal positions on the line, they become of still greater importance to the business of the road. New York City cannot develop the Northwest, nor can she furnish with the promptness desired and cheapness essential the sum total of the supplies needed in the prosecution of that great work. Neither can Boston, nor Pittsburg, nor St. Louis. They are all too far distant from the country itself to safely maintain those close commercial relations, involving the usual business credits and accommodations, and they can never be legitimate exclusive centers for the trade of the great Northwest. That trade, or the bulk of it at least, belongs in Minneapolis, and its natural tendency in this direction is well illustrated by statements of certain wholesalers and manufacturers in this city who state that their business from the farther Northwestern Territories in January, February and the first half of March of this year has been for these months respectively 50, 70 and 90 per cent. greater than it was for the same months of 1883. It cannot continue to increase in this or in any other proportion if the new rates are to stand, and their general effect upon the entire northwestern business, west of Bismarck, at least, cannot be otherwise than paralytic. Such a state of affairs must also bring its disadvantages and its losses to the Northern Pacific road itself and secure for it the ill will of a very large business community which ought to be and wants to be its constituent and its friend. There seems, in fact, to be necessity for no argument as to the unwisdom of this move on the part of the new managers of the road. The action should be reconsidered and rescinded—and that, too, at the very earliest possible date.
