The Sprague Herald man flies into a rage over the same letter from Huchingson & Mann that evoked the epigram of Cheney Hooker. But Mr. Hooker's remarks are gentlemanly in comparison with the outburst of the thing who runs the Herald. No feeling of envy should exist between Sprague and this city. The people of the two places mingle in friendly relations, and we have no record of a word mentioned unfavorable to that place. Of course, the views of the Herald are not the views of the best citizens of that place; in fact, the good people of Sprague and the Herald have nothing in common with each other.

Next week the Republican National Convention meets in Chicago, and the greatest interest is felt in the result of the deliberations of that body. It depends in a great measure upon the wisdom shown in the selection of candidates for the election of next fall will go. The team was valued at \$80, which is a heavy loss to Mr. Hering.

ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance for the protection and maintenance of health.
SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City of Spokane Falls that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell or offer for sale the flesh of any animal dying otherwise than by slaughter, or slaughtered while diseased, or any diseased or unwholesome flesh of fish, or any unwholesome flour, meal, or other food, or any unwholesome decayed or rotten fruit or vegetable, or any unwholesome substance whatever which is to be used for food.

Any person, firm or corporation so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100, or imprisoned for any time not exceeding 30 days for each offense.
SEC. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to throw, place, or leave, or cause to be thrown, placed or left in or upon any of the waters

Any person, firm or corporation so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100, or imprisoned for any time not exceeding 30 days for each offense.
SEC. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to put down any drain, sewer or waste way, or to put down, or to use any drain, sewer or waste way already put down and running into any of the waters of the Spokane river, or any of the waters connected therewith, above the lower falls of said river and within the corporate limits of said city or within five miles thereof, for the purpose of carrying off any sewerage, drainage, slops or waste matter of any kind whatever.
Any person, firm or corporation so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100, or imprisoned for any time not exceeding 30 days for each offense.

A Glimpse of the City.

From the top of the high palisades that sweep from east to west just to the south and overlooking the city, one can obtain the very best view of Spokane Falls, and the surroundings. The picture is one that is well worth seeing, and when once seen the observer will turn to gaze again and again as loath to leave the spot. There are few cities extant so prettily situated, or which so favorably strike the eye of the lover of the beautiful. Looking down from this eyrie the city is spread out like a vast diagram, and every public building reduced in proportion by the abbreviating effect of distance, stands out prominently. Howard street, the main artery of traffic running north and south, along which can be seen pigmy men, singly or in groups, moving hither and thither, stretches out from the school house until it bumps up against Echo Mills, the architectural mastodon that rears its terraces of windows high above its lesser neighbors. One is struck by the enormous number of bright new shingle roofs that are scattered everywhere in sight, the progressive marks of rapid and substantial growth. There is not a point the eye reaches that is not rich in these indications of prosperity. One realizes the rapid spread of the city more vividly from an examination at this distance than walking around among the new buildings. It seems that the new structures of the present season predominate. And it is a source of gratification to note that all of the improvements of this year are far superior in every respect to those of former years. But the panorama here presented does not end with the city, with its diversity of color, here and there one catches glimpses of the foaming river, and a veil of mist points out the location of the main falls. The country to the west and northwest is rugged and broken, the high billow of mountain peaks stretch on and on until the dark tops mingle with the blue of the horizon and blend together as one; north and east a broad plain, covered with a carpet of velvet verdure spreads out for miles until it dashes up against the sides of far off hills, where it is lost amidst the shadows of the primeval forest. At this season everything is attractive to the eye. The city, nestled at the foot of the bluffs is a beautiful gem in an equally beautiful setting, one of the work of man, the other the handiwork of God, each incomplete without the other, and united as lovely a sight as can be seen on two continents. Just stroll up to the heights and take a look while the show is in its best form.

As It Should Be.

We have felt gratified of late to see so many vehicles from the country on our streets. It shows that the farming community have commenced to understand that it is to their advantage to move away than one to do their purchasing at the Falls, and when the tide once sets this way it will continue in the same direction. It stands to reason that this city is the best point for the farmer to deal at and find a market for his produce. The home demand requires our merchants to carry large and complete stocks of goods and competition has become so sharp that prices have dropped so low as to compare favorably with Eastern houses. Farmers are quick to learn where they can deal to the best advantage, and they invariably continue to patronize that place. During the past few months the trade from the country has increased to the point that the roads leading into town are lined with teams coming in loaded with those commodities common to the farm, or returning with a full cargo of household supplies. Several days last week the city was crowded with wagons, and from the general appearance of the owners it was evident that they were glad they came. Every city, depending largely on the retail trade, must look to the country for much of its support, and while Spokane Falls is rapidly becoming a wholesale point, yet this class of trade is a very desirable one. We take pleasure in inviting the farmers of this and adjoining counties to come to Spokane, to examine the stocks of goods and learn the prices before going elsewhere. They will not only never regret it but will never desire to go anywhere else to do their trading.
