LONDON, Feb. 6.—The Irish parliament has re-elected Parnell chairman and resolved to raise a question of administration in Ireland, particularly the suppression of the tenant's organization in an address in reply to a speech from the throne.

PACIFIC COAST.

ADVERTISING.

In discussing the difference between advertising in a newspaper and issuing circulars and posters, the Seattle Intelligencer has been moved to express the following sound ideas: "It is safe to say each paper is read by four persons. It is taken up eagerly and read carefully, and what it says is given credence and respect. Compare its reception with that of the circular, which has to be forced in a surreptitious manner upon the reader, and who generally throws it down in disgust. Again, the cost of advertising in a daily paper is much less. No circular can be placed in the hands of two, five or ten hundred, or ten thousand persons, at anything like the price that an advertisement can in a daily paper that will do more good. What we say of circulars is no less true of other irregular methods of advertising. There are merchants who act upon an apparent belief that people before buying carefully inspect the hotel registers, that they eagerly scan card-boards, run through catalogues of county fairs, and the like. Such delusions are costly, to say the least. Merchants are as often saved money by legitimate advertising as they are enabled to make it, and not unfrequently it is done in this way: A San Francisco or a Portland dealer has more stock than he can conveniently sell in his own town, and he looks over the field to see wherein he can dispose of it to the best advantage. He gets the leading newspapers from the largest towns in Oregon and Washington. If no advertisements can be found in them from merchants in his line—say dry goods—he concludes that that is the place for his venture. The local merchants, he naturally infers, are a slow and unenterprising set, and that he can beat them. He sends some one, or comes himself, and he makes a grand flourish, cleans up handsomely, and departs. We have seen this done several times in the last year, and every time successfully. The money that is lost to the local merchant in this way is more than sufficient to pay all his advertising bills, and not only that but in retaining his home trade against outsiders he secures the better opinion of his customers, retains his own self-respect, feels better, is happier and longer lived. The best of all advertising mediums are the newspapers—the newspapers that are read in the family circle, that are quoted from the pulpit and rostrum, and that can be found everywhere—are in this matter superior to the other newspapers as the latter are in turn to the circular."

It is expected that the main attendance of scholars will come from the Union Sabbath school.

The Tacoma News says: "The ship Paetolus, Captain W. D. Burnham, D. C. Liechman, 1st officer, 130 days from Philadelphia to Cape Flattery is discharging railroad iron and material at the R. R. company's wharf, her cargo consisting of 1575 tons for the N. P. R. R. Captain Chas. A. Enell who with Capt. R. N. De Lina, constitute the firm of Chas. A. Enell & Co., shipping and commission merchants, Port Townsend, is superintending the discharge. The Paetolus is a handsome ship with fine cabin accommodations, something over 200 feet in length with a beam of 35 feet 10 inches, is 17 years old and until this voyage has been engaged principally in the San Francisco trade. With the exception of a bit of hurricane in the gulf stream and a few hours' blow off Cape Flattery, her trip was a pleasant one. The 1st officer states that the Annie H. Smith was to leave Philadelphia 4 days after the Paetolus left, and the Great Admiral three weeks later, both with R. R. material for this port. He also reports six other ships under orders for this port with R. R. supplies."

Council Proceedings.

The rate from San Francisco to Sound Ports is from \$5 to \$6.50 on general merchandise, pri-

mage to be added. In making up a table of estimated weights the Oregon companies have put down agricultural implements and wagons at about half the figures of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company. For example, ordinary sized wagons in lots of five are reckoned 2000 pounds; freight \$5. From San Francisco the charge would be \$15.—Tacoma News.

Under the new revenue law mortgages, growing crops, "good will" of any business, and in fact anything capable of private ownership and of value, are taxable, with no right of deductions for indebtedness. This will work a hardship in many cases.

The N. P. Railroad Company, through its agent, Judge D. C. Lewis, will sell a small tract of land to the trustees for the Methodist college on very reasonable terms, if the school is located in this city. This, added to the twenty acres already offered, will make quite a respectable and valuable tract.

To the shallow pated individual who feels, like Guitau, always inspired to attend to other people's business, and who claims to have the regulating of mails at the front, it may be news to learn that supervising engineer Thielson and the proper authorities have made arrangements to establish offices and carry-mails to the extreme front wherever and whenever practicable.

President Arthur has appointed Jno. L. Wilson, of Indiana, Receiver of the Land Office at Colfax in place of Judge E. N. Sweet, term expired. This indicates that there is little disposition to make reappointments or to select appointees from residents of this Territory. Judge Sweet has been a competent and popular officer, and so far as we know, there was no reason for not reappointing him.

MARRIED.—In Spangle, this county, Feb. 5, 1888, in the church, by the undersigned, Mr. W. L. Gray and Miss Eliza A. Blakley. The bride is a daughter of the well-known Jno. Blakley of Spangle. The church was crowded to its utmost capacity, and the happy pair was congratulated by many friends; then several of the company repaired to the house of the bride's father, where we found a well filled table. All seemed to enjoy themselves for a considerable time, but after a while W. A. Sanders, seeming to be blessed with the gift of constance above all the rest, coolly remarked that after an hour or so sweating over the table he had generally lost his appetite, and so left the table (still alive). The happy couple have our best wishes through life. They were wedded upon by Mr. Benjamin Robinson and Miss Mary Blakley, who seem to be patiently awaiting their turn. It looks rather as if to see a lady so young as the bride turn Gray so soon; still, strange things will happen.

Difference in favor of Puget Sound.....\$3,715

A ship can safely come up to Tacoma under sail by waiting a few days for fair wind without either tug or pilot, but in order to save time a tug is most always engaged. The dangers of the Columbia river bar are not counted; but are getting well known to ship owners, and will be avoided in the future wherever there is an opportunity to come to Puget Sound.

From Thursday's Daily. We learn that in the Crab creek section of our county stock is doing fine.

Mr. C. B. Bagley and wife, accompanied by a young daughter, have gone to California, from Olympia, for the benefit of Mrs. B.'s health.

The county commissioners, having considered carefully all the matters

pertaining to the county coming before them, probably adjourned this afternoon.

The Cheney flour mill, with its 50-horse power and its fine new machinery, moved every pulley, yesterday, with only 60 pounds of steam, and did it easily.

Mr. Villard, in accordance with the promise made during the recent session of the legislature, has forwarded a check for \$1000 to the regents of the Territorial University, to meet the present wants of that institution.

The bark Rainier, from Puget Sound to Honolulu, was lost Jan. 5, about 200 miles west of Cape Blanco. Captain Wolf was killed when the vessel capsized. The crew was taken off the wreck by the brig Orient, Jan. 24, and arrived at Unqua on the 25th.

FIRE.—On the evening of the 6th instant a slight fire occurred in Walls Walla. The house of Henry Rhul, occupied by Edith Stiller, with its contents, was totally destroyed. The loss is partly covered by insurance. The fire is thought to be due to an incendiary.

Effect of Manufactories.

The examples of what manufactories do toward increasing the value of land and building populous towns are numerous, and can be referred to readily. An exchange remarks that commercial cities are about agreed that a new industry established is better than a fleet of ships entering their ports. Manufacturing Glasgow has outgrown commercial Liverpool in population. The establishment of iron works in an English fishing village raised the population from 835 inhabitants in 1847, to more than 50,000 in 1881. The Rapid River Sun shows that the rapid growth of Philadelphia within the last quarter of a century is not due to the commerce, of which, coastwise, she has but little, but to her steady promotion of all kinds of manufacturing industries. The manufacturers of the little State of Rhode Island have given her a larger population to the square mile than any other State in the Union. The wealth of Massachusetts and Connecticut and the growth of Chicago, Cincinnati and Pittsburg have been derived from manufactories.

The Crop Outlook.

The California papers report the San Joaquin valley as "brown and bare." One gentleman who has large interests in Kern and other southern counties, has just returned from a visit to that section, and confirms the worst reports that have come from there. He says that "the country is as bare of vegetation as a barn floor, and while it is raining in the central and northern counties a couple of days ago, the sun was shining warm and bright over the San Joaquin plains, parching and drying everything in the shape of vegetation to a crisp." While we feel sorry for the San Joaquin and other California farmers, we rejoice to state that the outlook for crops in Walls Walla valley, and in fact in all Eastern Washington and Oregon, was never better. A soaking rain is now melting the snow and taking the frost out of the ground, leaving it in fine order. An extra area of ground has been seeded to fall, and an immense area will be sown in spring grain. With an average season the crop of 1888 will exceed in total quantity, average yield and quality all other years.—Union.

From Friday's Daily.

A few days ago 250 Chinamen passed through this city bound for the front to work on the Northern Pacific.

PROBABLY DROWNED.—A gentleman just from Montana by the N. P. railroad line reports the supposed drowning of a Frenchman in Pend d'Oreille lake last week. The Frenchman started across the lake in a small boat loaded with liquors, and not being heard from for some time search was instituted, which resulted in the finding of the boat frozen in the ice, but no traces of the Frenchman could be found, and there is no doubt that he found a watery grave. So says the Union.

A colporter has been canvassing our city in the interest of the Bible cause, presenting the scriptures to those who have not and will receive them, selling them to others, and offering a selection of choice books for moderate prices. He reports having found over twenty families in our city without a copy of the Bible. Yet there was no disposition to ignore the sacred book; its absence was occasioned by mere neglect. The gentlemanly agent reports marked respect shown him fill over the city, with the exception of one occasion when he was snubbed by a crank from whom nothing better could be expected.

To-Day's News.

The Social at Fife's Hall last night was largely attended, highly enjoyed and unmarred by the presence of the crank who has heretofore inspired, like Guitau, to regulate the affair.

The Ring.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 5.—Dr. Austin, a noted physician, has professionally examined Ryan and Sullivan, and says if Ryan does not win no one can satisfy him that he did not throw the fight for more money than he could gain by winning. Sullivan, said he, is powerfully built in the arms and shoulders, but is deficient in the loins and legs, where one looks for endurance. Ryan is of a sturdy build from his heels up. His legs and loins are grand, and the muscles of his back and shoulders, though small, are powerful. He is able to stand punishment all day. Several car loads of roughs are on their way here for the purpose of raising a disturbance. The police commissioners have ordered 100 men to the ground to preserve order. Ryan and Sullivan left this evening for the grounds, which are about two hours' ride from this city.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 6.—Everything is in readiness for the Ryan-Sullivan excursion to-morrow. The Bertree train embracing 34 passenger coaches, will leave at 4 A. M. It is understood the battle ground will be between Ridoutte and Pass Christian. Chicago, Cincinnati and Memphis contingents arrived to-night. Betting continues about even. It was reported the governor would stop the fight; but he was assured positively that the battle would be beyond the state line. A point on the New Orleans & Mobile railroad within the limits of Louisiana had been selected, but the objection of the governor made it necessary to make a change. It looked at the time as if the mill would be postponed; but late in the evening Sullivan agreed to a choice of a place beyond Louisiana. He would not, however, sign new articles. Early a large crowd assembled at the Mobile depot in the afternoon, to witness the departure of the pugilists. Ryan and his seconds, Jas. Dunn of Brooklyn, and Tom Kelly of St. Louis, left on the train, intending to go over the state line and take the train in the morning. Sullivan remained in this city. Both men are in fine condition, and say they are ready to enter the ring at any moment. Tickets for the excursion, costing ten dollars, are being sold rapidly.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—A Herald's New Orleans special says that after the battle the doctor examined Ryan and found his left jaw broken in two places and several other injuries. To

add to the poor fellow's misfortune, some rascal entered the house where he put up and stole all his clothes and three hundred dollars in money. Thus, misfortunes seem to pursue him even to the bitter end. Wilmet, backer of Sullivan, intends to challenge the world with him for any amount of money, and he will probably take him to Europe should he not find a customer for him in this country.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The Sun's New Orleans special says Ryan and Sullivan met last evening in the parlor of the St. James hotel, and had a pleasant time, together with friends. They popped corks to the tune of 28 bottles of Champagne. In course of conversation Sullivan said, "Ryan, you are a good, game man, and I will do all in my power to inaugurate and will participate in an exhibition for your benefit.

The reporter said, Sullivan, you have been very successful in beating all your men. Do you intend to fight any more?"

"Yes, and you can publish that I intend to beat a good many more of them before I get through."

ROCHESTER, Feb. 8.—About a hundred students of Rochester University, most of whom were seniors, created a great disturbance at Oscar Wilde's lecture in the Grand Opera House last night. They occupied seats mostly in the gallery, and during the lecture kept up a running fire of hisses, groans and hootings, which compelled the lecturer to pause more than a dozen times. When the hullabaloo became so noisy his aesthetic voice could not be heard, he would stop, fold his arms across his breast, and look calmly at his tormentors; but he evidently thought discretion the better part of valor, and made no comments on the annoyance. When the lecturer had proceeded about a quarter of an hour, an old darkey, dressed with a swallow-tail coat, white kid gloves and a bouquet of flowers as big as a peck measure, walked down the aisle with many antics and grimaces and took a front seat. This was the students' work, and the appearance of the darkey was the signal for a great burst of applause which ended in guffaws, catcalls, and other specimens of collegiate jokes. A great many people became disgusted and left the hall before the close of the lecture. A policeman attempted to eject one of the disturbers, when the gas was turned off. The manager of the house sent for more policemen, but before they arrived most of the students had left, and Oscar finished his lecture before the few people who had remained more to see the fun than to hear the lecture. The sunflower's apostle is very much wrought up by his reception.

Washington Revolvers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—About a month ago an article reflecting on the character of A. M. Soteldo of this city, and clerk to the senate committee on railroads, appeared in the local columns of the National Republican. Several similar articles have been published since, and this morning another appeared. The last publication appeared to trouble Soteldo, and during the day he was said to have been in conversation with friends from whom he solicited advice as to what steps he should take to prevent the appearance of further stories of like character. Between 9 and 10 to-night, while Clarence M. Barton, news editor, and Frank Conger, business manager of the Republi-

can, were alone in the editorial room, Soteldo and his younger brother Charles entered and took seats by the side of Barton. According to the statement of Conger, A. M. Soteldo, looking Barton full in the face, drew from his pocket a paper of manuscript which he requested Barton to read. Barton inquired, "Is that another of your statements?" Soteldo persisted in his request that Barton should read the paper, which was finally complied with. After concluding the reading, Barton informed Soteldo that he must confer with Gorham, the editor, on the subject, and that he (Barton) could not act in the matter, and passed the paper back, at the same time rising from his chair; whereupon Soteldo struck him, knocking him against the table at which he had been sitting. A scuffle ensued, during which a lamp on the table was tilted where Conger was, who packed it up hastily and left the room. Three or four pistol shots in quick succession were heard, when an alarm was given. Coppositors upon the floor above rushed into the hall and found Barton ejecting the younger Soteldo from the editorial room. Two of the force at once seized Soteldo upon Barton's calling out, "I am shot!" and against some resistance on his part took him down to the street, where he was turned over to the police and by them lodged in the station house. Barton was found to be shot twice, once in the neck and once in the left breast. Neither wound is thought fatal. He was placed in a carriage and driven to his home on Capitol hill, where Dr. Bliss was shortly afterward in attendance upon him.

It was not known for several minutes whether the elder Soteldo had been shot; but soon inquiry was raised, and one of the attaches of the paper entering Barton's room, found A. M. Soteldo unconscious on the floor with blood slowly oozing from a bullet hole in the back of his neck. The news quickly spread, and in a few minutes a crowd of several hundred persons had assembled in and about the capitol office. Dr. Blair and Adams leaned over the dying man, and as each counted the feeble beating of the pulse, announced that he was sinking very fast, and that his death was but a matter of a few hours. The chief of police took charge, and only the doctors and a few intimate friends were admitted to the room. Shortly after ten the wounded man opened his eyes, called for water, and moaned, "Cut it out. I can't move my hands." Whiskey was put to his mouth, but he refused it and called for pure water, which was given to him. His pulse and breathing became stronger, and the doctors decided to remove him to a hospital, which was done. At about eleven o'clock the physicians in the hospital concurred in the opinion that he could live but a few hours, and might die within a few minutes. The ball entered the back of the neck, shattered the vertebrae and lodged in the throat.

Wheat Declining.

CHICAGO Feb. 9.—It was rumored yesterday morning that a shipment of California wheat had reached St. Louis over the new St. Louis and San Francisco route, and that more was en route. California wheat coming into St. Lou-

is was enough to deprive dealers of wheat of what little courage they had, and for the rest of the day there were no notable attempts to stop the decline in prices.

Catholics Excited.
New York, Feb. 8.—Great excitement prevails among the Catholics, owing to an assault made on the Sisters of charity and the closing of their schools by Father McCorkick. Steps are being taken to close the church.

ALBANY, Feb. 8.—Tammany assemblymen withdrew from the democratic caucus to-night, the caucus refusing to adjourn till to-morrow. Tammany wanted an adjournment that they might deliberate on certain questions intimately connected with the plans which they have formed to secure a monopoly of legislation. The caucus, however, nominated a full line of officers who cannot, though, be elected without the aid of Tammany.

CHATTANOOGA, Feb. 8.—Mormon missionaries are hard at work in Union county, East Tennessee, and have secured a number of converts, notably some negroes. The community is very much worked up against them, and threats of lynching them are frequently made.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—The transfer of the Pacific Coast Steamship Co's property to the Oregon Railway and Navigation Co. was formally made on Saturday last. From C. H. Prescott, who is stopping at the Palace Hotel, it is learned that while contract had passed from Goodall, Perkins & Co., they would still remain in the agency, and would also be given, the agency of the O. R. & N. Co's steamship division, which has up to the present time been vested in Capt. Otterendrop at 210 Sansome street. There will be but few changes in the steamship Co., either in its employes or in the time tables. The prospects for the various enterprises of Mr. Prescott's company are most encouraging.

An Oregon Fire.

JUNCTION, Ogn., Feb. 6.—Fire broke out this morning in the rear of Berry's hotel, which was entirely destroyed, together with J. L. Williams' saloon, Heath's saddle and harness shop, and Craig's saloon. Berry's loss is \$12,000, insured for \$8,000; Williams, \$3,000, fully insured; Craig, \$11,000, insured; McAlpin & Williams, \$2,000, insured for \$1,000. Origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to have been from a defective flue.

Isaac Barman.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—The examination of Isaac Barman, a Portland merchant, on three charges of having obtained goods by means of false representations from merchants in this city, was concluded before Judge Rosensbaum to-day, and the accused was held to answer in each charge, with bail set at \$10,000 on each.

A Gambler Killed.

PRINCETON, Ogn., Feb. 9.—At Centerville, yesterday evening, Dan Swagert shot and killed Jas. Coyle. The parties were engaged in a game of poker, when Coyle drew his revolver and began twisting it around with his fingers through the guard. The weapon flew off and striking the floor was discharged. In the scuffle which ensued for possession of the weapon, Swagert got it and fired a shot which struck Coyle just below the breast, causing his death. Such are the facts as reported. Investigation is now in progress.

Produce Exchange.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—In the Produce exchange, the report of the call committee was submitted to a committee of seven, appointed to make rules for the conduct of business, and the board of directors was asked to establish standards of produce. The minority report by Horace Davis and G. W. McNear opposing the call system as tending to introduce a gambling feature into the grain trade, was rejected.
