NEWS OF THE WORLD

BY TELEGRAPH EXPRESSLY TO THE Daily Evening Times.

WASHINGTON.

BY TELEGRAPH, SPECIAL TO THE TIMES

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The republican members of the house

were in better spirits to-day than for weeks past. It is very generally felt that the action in caucus last night cleared the political atmosphere. The determination not to favor the reduction of the whisky and tobacco taxes, and to make an earnest effort to reach the tariff commission bill under the present rule, give definiteness to the purposes of the majority heretofore lacking. Extreme protectionists admit that the caucus action was a surprise. Nevertheless, there is very little talk of renewed attempt to force a reduction of internal revenue which would result in the retention of high customs duty.

The Chinese Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The debate on the Chinese bill in the house to-day, although not of an exciting nature, was on the whole decidedly interesting. The house manifested more than a common interest in the subject under discussion by maintaining an unusually large attendance of attentive listeners.

GENERAL NEWS.

BY TELEGRAPH, SPECIAL TO THE TIMES

Democratic Celebration.

CHICAGO, March 16.—The headquarters of the Iroquois Club in Haverley's building presented an animated appearance to-day, the occasion being the reception in this city by the club of a large number of distinguished democrats from outside the city on the 115th anniversary and A. Jackson's birthday. A banquet was given at the Palmer House in the evening.

The Iroquois Club is a newly organized body, and its membership comprises the best democrats in the city. This event is its formal introduction to the attention of the outside world. The visitors were escorted about the city during the day, and late in the afternoon an informal reception was held where political questions were avoided. At 6 o'clock in the evening the club and its guests, including a large number of local democrats not members of the club, assembled in the large dining room of the Palmer House, which was appropriately decorated, and partook of a superb banquet. The speeches, while necessarily tinged with political matters, were in reality not politically significant.

During the evening telegrams and letters were read from those invited who could not attend. Samuel J. Tilden wrote as follows from Greystone, N. Y.: "Gentlemen: I cordially sympathize in the homage which you

propose to pay to the memory of that great soldier and statesman who represented the exultant nationality of sentiment which had always characterized the democracy and manifested in the great public crisis; his own inevitable determination to maintain the territorial integrity of our country an indissoluble union of states. He likewise represented the beneficent Jeffersonian philosophy which prefers that nothing shall be done by the general government which the local authorities are competent to do, and nothing by any governmental power which individuals can do for themselves. The great contest of his administration arose out of his efforts to resist usurpation by congress of derogation of the rights of localities and of individuals as well as of the nation.

Senator Bayard sent a strong states rights letter.

Governor John M. Palmers in a letter discussed the relations of state government, and criticized the policy of President Arthur, and denounced the bill retiring Grant, and Logan's education bill. He trusted the Iroquois Club would with words of no uncertain meaning reassert the ancient democratic faith in the simple, rigid, masculine purity of the democratic party. Other letters were received from ex-Senator McDonald Horatio Seymour, Gen. Hancock, S. G. Randall, and a score of other prominent men, including democratic senators.

S. circuit court to shorten the time for his execution four days, to enable his Indian friends to witness the execution, who have to leave for their homes Wednesday the 29th inst. Judge Deady changed the time for the execution from Friday the 31st to Wednesday the 28th.

Patching Mutilated Coin. The nuisance of mutilated coin, says an exchange, is not one-half as bad as it was a short time ago. It had become so bad that a large proportion of the coin, especially silver, in actual circulation, was mutilated. For some time past mutilated coins have been rapidly disappearing from circulation. This is owing to the fact that the general refusal to receive the debased coinage has led to its being redeemed by the government upon presentation. The holders of it in any quantity send the mutilated coin to the mint at the rate of \$1 for every ounce of bullion. They, of course, lose on the transaction when the face value of the coin is considered, but by being unable to dispose of it in any other way they have to do the best they can with it. The U. S. treasurer does not redeem mutilated coin, although every day a large quantity of it is sent to him. It is always returned. The coin should be sent to the mint, where in sums representing a face value of \$25, it is redeemed as bullion at the rate of \$1 for every ounce. There has been a slight rise, it is reported, in the price of silver, in order not to lose as much as they do by having it redeemed simply as bullion. They have gone to the jewelers and had the punched holes filled in with gold or silver, as the case may be, and at a cost which would make a saving if these coins could be passed in that way. This matter has been brought to the attention of the treasury department, and it was referred to the director of the mint for a decision. His decision is, that as soon as a coin is mutilated it ceases to be a coin, and is simply bullion; and no patching of it can make it good. Mutilated coins will have to go out of circulation, and they are going out very rapidly.

Mysterious Disappearance.

More Information Wanted.

C. N. Williamson's ranch is situated on the south end of Moran prairie, about nine miles southeast of Spokan Falls. "Newer" Williamson, as he was familiarly known hereabouts, owned a span of gray horses, one flat-iron and chunky, branded E or F on left shoulder, about 9 years old; the other a dirty white, slender, with dim brand, 8 or 5 on shoulder. He had returned from the railroad work with over \$100 in his possession. Soon after the 20th of July last, it seems, his wagon was driven alongside his oat field, a few rods out and carried to the wagon, after which no tracks could be followed. Farming implements were left in the field, and door of house locked, indicating a hasty departure. His parents, supposing he would soon return, waited for several months, and then had published in the Spokan Times a card asking for information regarding his whereabouts. His father received word that a wagon, containing harness and cooking utensils had been abandoned near the mouth of Dry creek, in Walla Walla valley, and proceeding hither, recently, recognized the same. No trace of the missing man can be found. It is presumed that some one hired him to drive to Walla Walla, and dealt foully with him on the way. He was about 32 years of age, 5 foot 7 1/2 inches high, weight about 130 pounds, dark brown hair and mustache, dark blue eyes, and of pleasant address and few words. A vigorous search for any evidence of his whereabouts will be made as soon as the snow has disappeared. The grief-stricken parents request that all persons between Spokan Falls and Walla Walla—on any route—keep a lookout for any evidence showing which road he may have traveled. He wore a 7 or 7 1/2 black wool felt hat, No. 8 boots, dark blue beaver coat and black vest, overcoat, well worn and cut sacque fashion, with one sleeve replaced by new cloth a little different in color and quality on left arm, brown jumper, and brown duck overalls; probably crossed Snake river about the 25th of July, at Texas, Central or Panamint ferry. Spain is having built in England several iron ships for her naval fleet. The company which built for her some time ago an iron cruiser has recently launched a second after the same design. The length of these ships is 210 feet, and their tonnage, 1,020; the armament being three six-inch guns. They belong to a type of fast, unarmored cruisers, now largely used in the European navies, which are employed on distant stations in lines of peace, and in times of war are well adapted to the protection of mercantile marines. At the royal dock yards in Spain other vessels of similar design are being built.
