axe. An Indian squaw, wife of a friendly Apache sheep herder, who worked with us, saved my life by holding me behind her and begging them to spare me.

Thus far, over one hundred persons have been massacred in the Apache outbreak.

Page's Chinese bill, which passed the house some twelve days ago, it is expected, will come to a final vote and be passed in the senate to-day.

The California republican convention will be held at Sacramento on the 30th of August.

The expected decision on the permanent site for the Methodist University in this city will probably be postponed till title to grounds more suitable than either already offered the school can be obtained. Both the proposed sites are in the city, and the one on the east side is a fact which will always be a moving force to teachers and students, if they are compelled to stand it. Each location is without water, and the prospect of obtaining this necessary article is coupled with considerable expense. These locations, also, do not command as fine a view of the city and surrounding country as the new site fixed upon in the minds of the friends of the school. As the location of this important educational institution is to be permanent, and as its position is to be advantageous to the future growth of our city, it should not be decided without weighing the subject thoroughly. The location should be for the future interests of the school, mainly, and in order to decide that question judiciously more time will be required.

**THE CANADIAN PACIFIC**—Major Rodgers, engineer in charge of the western division of the Canadian Pacific railway, arrived last night from Victoria and leaves this morning via Lake Pend Oreille for the Kootenai country. His mission is to permanently locate the line through the east slope of the Rocky mountains, through the Kicking Horse pass, to the Columbia river valley. This route has been adopted by the directors of the company in preference to the Yellow Head pass, some 200 miles farther north, and permission for such change of location has been asked from the Dominion parliament. That the company's request will be granted, there is no reasonable doubt. The line from the east, is now 200 miles west of Winnipeg, and will be extended 500 miles by January 1, 1883, the country traversed being unbroken. This will bring the western terminus within 200 miles of the Rocky mountains. Should the line be diverted from the original survey to the Kootenai region—and all indications point to this change—supplies will have to be drawn from Portland and the Colville valley. The valley will furnish grain, hay and stock, while this city, by its location, will naturally be the purchasing depot for all other supplies.—Oregonian.

**NEWS OF THE WORLD BY TELEGRAPH**

John Russell Young, minister to China, was married at Hartford last Tuesday, and started for the Pacific coast, on his way to China.

On Tuesday last a fight occurred at Horseshoe canyon, New Mexico, between Indians and Indian scouts and troops. Four Indian scouts and three soldiers were killed, and four soldiers wounded. The Indians number over 300 bucks, squaws and children, but they are surrounded and corralled in Doubtful canyon.

On Saturday last suit was opened at Marcellus against ex-empress Eugenie to compel her to relinquish the imperial chateau, presented under the empire to the emperor by the municipality, which, according to the mayor, now belongs to the town.

Concerning the Indian massacre which took place in Arizona last week, the only survivor, a 9-year old boy, says: Before daylight the Indians attacked the camp while we were all asleep. My father and ten other men attempted to get their guns, but were too late. Indians rushed in from all sides and overpowered them before a shot could be fired. The work of slaughter then began. An Indian put the muzzle of his gun against the head of one man and fired. I saw them kill my mother and two little brothers by beating their brains out with stones. They killed five men and then tied my father and tortured him most dreadfully. He begged them to spare him, but they only tortured him the more. When they were tired of torturing him one of them split his skull with an
