





MAJOR BAINS TO GOV. MASON.

YAKIMA CAMP, No. 11, ROMAN CATHOLIC MISSION, Monday, Nov. 12, 1855.

GOVERNOR:—Here we are, without a battle, except a skirmish four days since, with some Indians, who defied us as we approached the Yakima river.

Late in the afternoon, after recalling all our force to the south bank of the Yakima river we heard some distance in the prairie, the reports of small arms, indicative of a fight; and taking two companies, we proceeded in that direction, until some time after night, when the firing ceased.

It appears to me that some person is to blame for this violation of their rights; they have been told by Gov. Stevens, that their rights to the fisheries were not to be violated.

Mr. DEWEY—This is the first opportunity I have had of dropping you a line since I left the Dalles.

We arrived in Yakima Valley on the evening of the 7th; no Indians seen; all the stock found in the valley next morning.

Nov. 9.—We made a short march, and arrived about our usual camping time to a gap in the mountains, where the river runs through.

Nov. 10.—With daylight the enemy appeared on the mountain tops. Three companies under command of Maj. Armstrong, were ordered to disperse them.

Nov. 11.—Showed three companies of volunteers and dragoons, under command of Col. Nesmith, started on an expedition from two to six days to meet the Washington volunteers and ascertain if possible, the whereabouts of the Indians.

Nov. 12.—Nothing new. The ground is covered with snow, but it will likely disappear before night.

Mr. EDITOR:—On looking over the treaty between the Indians on the Sound and the United States, I perceive that the right is guaranteed them to take fish at all usual or accustomed places.

Now, sir, why are the Indians deprived of this right, one of the most important of the treaty? The Indians have been, or are being removed to the western side of the Sound, after erecting their houses, and making themselves comfortable in their way for the winter.
