MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

A little girl named Ella Burns, four years old, from Cincinnati, is exciting astonishment in New York as an elocutionist. The perfection with which she reads and recites productions that would seem to be wholly above the capacity of such a child, is said to be something less than miraculous. She learned to read without books, by inquiring the words upon signs in the streets.

One of the neatest replies ever heard in a legislative body, was lately made by Mr. Tilson, of Rockland, Maine. A member had replied to something Mr. Tilson had said, and pausing a moment, he inquired if he saw the thread of his argument. "Mr. Speaker," said he, "in answer to the gentleman, 'I would say, I hear the humming of the wheel, but I do not see any thread.'"

According to the report of the New York State Superintendent of Instruction, there were in that commonwealth, in the year 1858, 11,837 schools, of which nearly 10,000 were frame, less than 3000 brick, about 500 stone, 300 log. Children attending school 842,187; teachers 26,158, of whom 8,266 were male, 17,897 female.

A young man named Jerome B. Leonard, of Gorham, Catawagus county, N. Y., on the 5th Jan., threw a silver under the nail of one of his fingers with such force as to drive it upward to the second joint, and although the silver was extracted, inflammation ensued, which extended up his arm, causing death on the 5th of Jan.

The smoothness of the ice between Albany and Newburg, on the Hudson river, has brought out several ice boats, which get over the ice at the rate of nearly thirty miles an hour. One of these boats, says the Knickerbocker, left Albany for Hudson a few weeks ago, and went the first seven miles in thirteen minutes.

A gentleman who was at Zanesville, Ohio, a short time since, gives a description of a maverick sorrel horse, which was raised in Pennsylvania, and purchased by a resident of Zanesville. He is "pony built," measures twenty hands high, and weighs 2400 pounds. The price was \$1000. He will probably be exhibited at the State fair at Zanesville.

In Quebec, a short time since, the 30th Regiment turned out in full force upon the St. Lawrence, and performed all the light infantry evolutions consequent on the corps acting as skirmishers thrown out to cover the advance of a brigade across the frozen surface of the river. The effect is described as very picturesque.

Mr. Crabbe, the biographer of John C. Calhoun, states in a letter that the Senator never was connected with any of the denominations of the Christian church, but regarded religion as an essential property of the inner man. "He looked," says Mr. Crabbe, "simply to the commandments of his Creator."

A bill passed the Michigan House of Representatives on the 9th Feb., amending section 25 of chapter 153 of the revised statutes, so as to punish any person bringing a colored person into the State, claiming him as a slave, by imprisonment not exceeding ten years, or by a fine not exceeding \$1000.

Mrs. Anna Cooper, of Cincinnati, formerly of New Jersey, claims to be a lineal descendant of Sir Francis Drake, who died in England in 1620, or thereabout, and left an immense estate, worth some \$80,000,000, which, after passing through several generations, has at last been unable to find one of the family upon whom to bestow itself.

Miss Amelia Ross, aged 117 years, died last month in England. She lived in the reigns of five sovereigns of Great Britain. One hundred years ago her parents settled with her in the town of Newtownhamar, and she lived there until the day of her death.

Miss Alice C. Wedge, daughter of Joseph Wedge, of Plattville, Kendall county, Ill., aged eight years and six months, blind from birth, had her sight immediately given her by an operation performed, a short time since, by Dr. F. A. Cadwell of Cleveland.

A divorce case is now on the legal tapis in Cincinnati between two parties, both young, and married but three years, whose disagreement arose out of a nightcap which the wife insisted upon wearing in spite of her husband's wishes, petitions, tears, threats, oaths and commands.

An editor in Kansas says that the publication of his paper will be suspended for six weeks, in order that he may visit St. Louis with a load of bear skins, hoop-poles, shingles, oak-bark, pickled cat-fish, &c., which he has taken for subscriptions.

A well-dressed woman in Trenton, N. J., was arrested recently for drunkenness and fighting. She blackened the eyes of two men, knocked another flat, and the services of several officers were required to arrest her.

Major Sprague, U. S. A., who recently purchased a silver mine situated in Dona Ana county, New Mexico, from Hugh Stephenson, for \$8000, has sold the same to a company in New York, for \$40,000.

The Detroit Tribune says that out in Michigan they seek corn in whiskey, and place quantities where the wild pigeons pick up the kernels, get drunk on them, keel over, and allow the boys to pick them up.

Five executions have, within six months, taken place by Lynch law, in Pike county, Ill. The last was of two brothers named Crysp, who were swung up on the same tree. All desperados.

The Princess Frederick William of Prussia, daughter of Queen Victoria, has given birth to a son, causing great rejoicings in Prussia and much satisfaction in England.

Squire Sayres, an old man, well known in Ingham county, Michigan, committed suicide about the 10th Feb. The deceased was a soldier and a pensioner of the war of 1812.

The value of food consumed in New York, last year, is estimated at 19,000,000 dollars, and the number of the various quadrupeds eaten were—beaves 191,874, cows 10,128, veal 98,675, swine 501,479.
