THE FOURTH IN STEILACOOM.

The Fourth of July, 1860, will long be remembered with pleasure by the people of this county. On no former recurrence of the National Anniversary has there been so general an observance of the day.

In accordance with the order published for the occasion, the people of Steilacoom and the country adjacent assembled in town in large numbers, at an early hour on the morning of the Fourth, in order to participate in the festivities prepared for them.

At about ten o'clock, the procession was formed by the Marshal, and headed by the band, proceeded to the grounds selected for the oration and barbecue.

The hour having arrived for the commencement of the exercises, H. A. Goldborough, Esq., arose and announced a prayer by Rev. Mr. Kendall, followed by reading the Declaration of Independence, by Elwood Evans, Esq., of Olympia.

The people now proceeded in mass to the tables, there to discuss the feast prepared for them. This occupied about an hour, concluding with thirteen regular toasts, by Mr. Goldborough, which were responded to appropriately by Maj. Haller, Messrs. Evans, Lippincott and others.

Next in order was the ball, in the evening, which concluded the festivities of this holiday. Of the ball, much might be said; but time and room forbid an extended notice.

PIERCE CO. DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION. Owing to the non-appearance of the HERALD, the publication of the proceedings of this Convention, which should have appeared last week, has been necessarily deferred.

THE DEMOCRACY OF PIERCE COUNTY, W. T., having met in Convention at 12 o'clock, M., pursuant to notice, the meeting was called to order by John Rigney, Chairman of the Democratic Committee.

On motion of S. McCaw, E. A. Light was elected Chairman. On motion of W. H. Wood, L. P. Hanson was elected Secretary.

On motion of A. P. Delin, Wm. H. Wood was elected Assistant Secretary. On motion of S. McCaw, it was ordered that each voter's name be recorded, and a tally kept when he casts his ballot, and that the vote be handed to the tellers.

On motion of Chas. Egan, it was ordered that all persons participating as voters at this Convention pledge themselves with their own vote and influence to secure the election of its nominees.

[We are requested to state that Mr. J. S. Jaquith, after pledging himself in accordance with the above motion, came out boldly and denounced and opposed the action of the Convention; voting, and boasting of so voting, against the nominees, after exerting his influence to defeat them. We call this Democracy with a vengeance.]

On motion of E. H. Tucker, it was ordered that the majority rule be adopted. On motion of George Gallagher, Messrs. S. McCaw and A. P. Delin were appointed tellers.

On motion of R. S. More, it was ordered that the Convention proceed now to the nomination of candidates for the several offices vacant, in the following order, to wit:—Three Members of Legislature, one County Commissioner, one Superintendent of Common Schools, one Treasurer, one Auditor, one Sheriff, one Assessor, one Judge of Probate, one Coroner, one Wreckmaster, two Justices of the Peace, and two Constables.

The Convention now proceeded to nominate a candidate for Representative by ballot. Whole number of votes cast, 81; necessary to a choice, 40.

J. H. Stettin received..... 73 votes N. H. Cunningham..... 8 " Scattering..... 1 " Capt. J. H. Stettin having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly nominated.

Ballot was now taken for a second candidate for the House of Representatives, with the following result: Whole number of votes cast, 90; necessary to a choice, 46.

John M. Chapman received..... 70 votes N. H. Billings..... 10 " N. H. Cunningham..... 9 " Scattering..... 8 " J. M. Chapman having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly nominated.

Ballot was then had for the third candidate for House of Representatives, with the following result: Whole number of votes cast, 95; necessary to a choice, 48.

John Carson received..... 83 votes N. H. Cunningham..... 15 " Scattering..... 15 " N. H. Cunningham having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly nominated.

INDIAN ATTACK UPON CAPTAIN SMITH'S COMMAND. Mr. J. Louis Scholl, guide to Capt. Smith's command, arrived at the Dalles on the 3d inst., bringing the exciting news that the command had been attacked by a band of Snake Indians.

On Saturday, June 23d, Capt. Smith's party were attacked by from 60 to 80 mounted Snake Indians, and 150 or 160 foot, armed with guns and bows and arrows. They had followed Capt. Smith's party for two or three days previously, and made the attack just as he was going into camp.

Capt. Smith's company engaged the Indians very warmly, and obliged them to retreat to the mountains, with a severe loss of life to the Indians and the capture of six animals and saddles, three guns, and numerous other articles.
