





Local Items.

RETURNED.—The party mentioned last week as having gone out to explore "Fabieter Pass" through the Kaimia and Lewis River mountains, returned on Thursday. They had reached within three miles of the "divide" on the mountains between the Gowitz and Lewis rivers, their most sanguine expectations in reference to its practicability as a route for a railroad being more than realized, when unfortunately they were confronted by an insurmountable obstacle to their further progress—the top of the mountain was the solid sheet of flame—and abandon their enterprise and return. They represent the country through which they passed as not only producing an excellent grade for a railroad, but abounding in patches of good farming land as any one would wish to see. Their tramp, though necessarily slow and tedious, camping within three miles on an air-line in some instances of the scene of their bivouac of the night before, was not altogether wanting in a pleasurable adventure. Three bears were slain, furnishing more fresh meat than they could consume. They were so tormented by gnats and mosquitoes at one place that sleep was found impossible, and had to break their blankets and seek refuge in a cloud of smoke. Taken altogether the enterprise, though prematurely interrupted, was not barren of results. Sufficient was seen to convince them of the complete practicability of this route for a railroad; it was demonstrated that we have to the Northwest of us enough unswayed arable land for ten thousand farms; it was proven that the one thing needful, besides a railroad, for the development of our resources, was the introduction of some cheap labor. When a lashed of whetted will pay for a day's labor there, and not till then, will this wilderness be made to blossom as the rose. The exploration will be resumed at an early day.

CONVALESCENT.—Mr. A. J. Remington, who was accidentally shot ten days ago, on the Mill Plain, is now at the St. Joseph Hospital, having been removed there from his home on Sunday last. On Tuesday he had a severe "loading spell" but since then has improved considerably. He is tenderly cared for by a devoted wife, and the benevolent Sisters stare to print to make his suffering as light as possible. Mr. Remington for the warm sympathy of the whole community, and that he may be speedily restored to his wonted health is the general prayer.

Mr. Harry Wood struck water at a depth of 22 feet in digging a well at his residence on Seventh street. He expected to have to sink from 75 to 100 feet, and was exceedingly disappointed by his misadventure. Between water and water works it seems our people are determined to keep them very well supplied with that most useful of all elements.
