POLICEMEN ON THE RAMPAGE.

Outrage—Citizens Dragged from their Beds at Midnight. Friday night last Walla Walla was the scene of a parallel in the annals of crime. The perpetrators of this outrage were two members of the police force, and in the pay of the city at the time of the commission of the crime.

Friday night, but no arrests were made until a late hour on Saturday afternoon, when two young men assailed swore out a complaint, which Robert Lee and Adam Crossman, both wearing the "stars" of the city police, were arrested. The hearing was set for Monday morning, at 10 o'clock, before Judge E. B. Whitman.

TRIAL OF POLICEMAN LEETE. The first case was that of Robert Lee, who called for a jury trial. Messrs. Wm. Cullin, C. A. Lamkin, S. Maxon, G. W. Wain, J. Morrison and J. N. Fall, were sworn to try the case. T. J. Anders and T. H. Brents, for the prosecution; J. D. Mix and N. T. Cato, for the defense.

TESTIMONY FOR THE PROSECUTION. Wm. Cook testified that on Friday night, about the hour of 10 o'clock, Policemen Lee and Crossman came to his house, and inquired for a man by the name of Gardner. He was not at Mr. Cook's house.

W. G. Kirkman, of the San Francisco restaurant, testified that the two policemen came to his house and inquired for Gardner. Told them that they would find Gardner at Mr. Ward's house.

A. L. Davis testified that Lee called at his store, Friday night, and asked for Gardner. M. B. Ward testified that Policeman Crossman came to his house, between 10 and 11 o'clock, Friday night, and asked if Gardner stopped there. I was in the affirmative. I called Gardner; he went to the door, and asked Crossman what he wanted. Crossman replied that he was a policeman of Walla Walla, and wanted him (Gardner) down town.

When I reached the door, Lee and Crossman were waiting for me. Lee asked me if I had ever had any relations with his wife? I answered, "No." Another question too vulgar to repeat was asked, and a similar answer returned. Lee then showed eight and struck witness; Crossman struck me with a pistol. Crossman had two pistols, one in each hand.

A. E. Moyea testified that Friday night he came to town and went home early. He came down stairs just behind Gardner, who told him that a policeman was after him. Lee asked Gardner if he had made indecent remarks about his wife. Gardner said, no. Crossman said to Gardner, "Give up your arms." Gardner did not do so.

TESTIMONY FOR DEFENSE. David Gunn had known Gardner about two months; had a conversation with Gardner about Mrs. Lee; but did not know when told Lee last Friday that Gardner asked me if he (Lee) had much sense.

Robert E. Lee testified in his own behalf. He met Gunn and told him the statement just made. Lee said that he had seen him again. I went to Gunn's house and he told me all. I then went and hunted up Gardner to have an explanation.

Adam Crossman testified that he was present at the fight. Went to Ward's in company with defendant. Lee asked me to go with him, as he wanted to see Gardner and wished him to be present as a friend. Took an active part in the fight after getting a blow in the eye. Lee was armed; I took Lee's pistol after Gardner came out. I had no pistol. [Defense here rested.]

After hearing argument by counsel, the jury retired, and after a brief absence returned with a verdict of "Guilty." Defendant Lee was ordered to pay a fine of \$20 and costs of suit. Tuesday morning, the case of Adam Crossman was called. The defendant stands charged with an assault with a deadly weapon. After hearing the evidence, which in no wise differed from that given in the case of the Territory R. Lee, defendant was held in the sum of \$1500 to answer at the next term of the district court.

This ends the first chapter in the history of an outrageous violation of the peace and quiet of the town—an outrage which in its inception and execution was characterized by gross brutality, and without doubt contemplated murder as a possible result.

AN EXPLODED HUMBUC.—For years the STATESMAN has contended that the police force, as organized in this city, was an unmitigated humbug, having for its object the support of certain able-bodied paupers at the public cost. The exposures of the last week have served the purpose of opening the eyes of our citizens to the facts of the case, and already the city is relieved from the support of a brace of idlers who will now engage in some honest employment. Two sober, industrious policemen can attend to all the requirements of the city and at all times maintain good order. They must, however, keep out of saloons, and in no case be permitted to act as "cappers" for gambling bells. Hereafter the main business of the police has been to hang around saloons and play the part of "setters" and "cappers." In older cities where they have regular police organizations, policemen, whilst on duty, are absolutely prohibited from entering saloons. An offence of this kind is punished by suspension, and if repeated the penalty is dismissal. A similar regulation in this city would work well and enable two policemen to do the work for which four men have been drawing pay. The laborer, the mechanic, or the clerk, whilst engaged in the discharge of their duties, are not expected to idle their time around saloons. Policemen during hours of duty should give their whole time to the service of the city, and in that way earn their monthly stipend. Off duty they should have the same privileges that are enjoyed by other citizens—no more, no less.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS. WALLA WALLA, January 29th, 1878. Special meeting—Present, Mayor Moore; Councilmen, Winans and Taylor. Absent—Councilmen Adams and Reynolds. Mayor Moore stated that the meeting was called to consider the recent action of certain policemen.

The resignations of policemen Lee, Crossman and Kay read, and on motion the resignations tendered by policemen Lee and Crossman were rejected. The resignation tendered by policeman Kay was, on motion, accepted.

The following preamble and resolution, offered by Councilman Winans, read and on motion adopted: WHEREAS, Robert Lee and Adam Crossman, of the City Police Force, have by their recent lawless conduct shown their utter unfitness for the service to which they were appointed, and instead of conservators, have become disturbers of the public peace; Therefore Resolved, That they be and are hereby dismissed from the service. On motion, the council adjourned.

For years I have striven to raise and educate my children and bring them up respectfully. My friends understand the difficulties that have been in my way and the influences that have sought to rob me of my children. If chastisement has been administered, it has only been when absolutely required, and in the discharge of my duty as a father.
