DRESSING POULTRY FOR MARKET.

We take the following suggestions from the Country Gentleman:

Poultry will always sell much more readily, and often at higher rates, if well dressed, than if poorly dressed. The following directions are given, as the result of much experience, by a poultry dealer:

Food in the crop injures the appearance and sale; therefore keep from food twenty-four hours before killing. Opening the veins in the neck is the best mode of killing.

If the head be taken off at first, the skin will recede from the neck-bone, presenting a repulsive appearance. Most of the poultry in market is "scalded," or "wet-picked," "dry-picked" is preferred by a few, and sells to a limited extent only, at full prices.

Poultry may be picked dry without difficulty if done without delay after killing. For scalding poultry, the water should be as near the boiling point as possible, without actually boiling.

The bird held by the legs, should be immersed and lifted up and down in the water three times. Continue to hold the bird by the legs with one hand, while plucking the feathers with the other, without a moment's delay after taking out. If skillfully handled in this way the feathers and pin feathers may all be removed without breaking the skin.

A torn or broken skin injures the appearance. The intestines should not be "drawn." After removing the feathers the head may be taken off and the skin drawn over the neck-bone and tied. This is the best method, though much comes to the market with the head on. It should next be "plunged," by being dipped about two seconds into water nearly or quite boiling hot, and then at once into cold water the same length of time.

It should be entirely cold but not frozen, before being packed. In packing, use clean, hand-thrashed rye straw. If this cannot be had, wheat or oat straw will answer, but be sure that it is clean and free from dust. Place a layer of straw at the bottom, then alternate layers of poultry and straw, taking care to stop snugly, back up-wards, legs under the body, filling the vacancies with straw, and filling the package so that the cover will drive down very closely upon the contents, to prevent shifting on the way. Boxes are the best packages and should contain from 150 to 300 pounds.

How to Keep Potatoes.—A correspondent who has had much experience in growing and keeping potatoes, sends us the following: Potatoes are always injured by exposure to the light, and if the exposure is continued long enough, they are utterly ruined.

So great is the change that a tuber, naturally mealy, nutritious and palatable, is changed by exposure to light, and that alone, during its ripening period, to a green, bitter, water-mess; and every hour that a potato is exposed to light after taking it from its dark bed, where it grew, it is injured in some degree though not actually spoiled until it has been exposed for a long period.

There is no way of preserving potatoes fit to eat except by keeping them in darkness—let this be remembered. Let every grower of potatoes keep the truth here stated constantly in view, and we shall have better ones to eat, because they will keep their stock where it is not continually suffering injury. Dig your potatoes as late in the season as possible, and keep them in utter darkness thereafter until you offer them for sale. If you doubt my word try the experiment.

Clover Seed.—We believe, says the Rural New Yorker, that a crop of clover seed taken from the land exhausts the soil more than the crop that is cut for hay. Any seed crop, it is well known, is more exhaustive than a mere fodder crop. One strong reason for cutting timothy for hay early, is to remove it from the soil before it has abstracted those elements which form the seed. It impoverishes the soil much less than if cut later. The first growth of clover is not generally disposed to seed much; hence it is not so exhaustive as other grasses if cut late. But the second crop, which bears the seed, is injurious to the land, at least the taking it away is. Unless remuneration is paid to the soil, it will pay better to let the second growth of clover rot on the land, or feed it off.

LOOK TO THE MICE.—One of the serious troubles of the orchardist is the girdling of his trees by field mice. If the proper course is pursued, however, their depredations may be easily prevented. Clean culture is the first step. Now is the time to attend to this part of it. Remove all grass, weeds, rubbish, etc., that may be in or about the orchard for it is in such that the mice are harbored. As their mischief is generally done under the cover of something, as a coating of snow. When the first fall of snow comes, tramp it down about the trees and shrubs. They will not persevere to get under if this is thoroughly attended to. But as we remarked above have your fruit grounds cleaned now.

A PERFECT LOCK.—A new invention called the needle latch, or patent snappable lock, has just been introduced, which promises from its simplicity and moderate cost to bring an almost infallible protection for desks, safes, etc., within the means of all.

The following description of it is from the Engineer: "It is simple in its construction, as it is composed of neither more nor less than steel wires—call them needles if you like—strung together on stumps, attached to the running bolt on which they revolve, and they require to be lifted by the key to a position to admit of their being passed through certain holes in a plate of brass, and thus passing carry the running bolt with them, which carries the 'read bolt.' The needles move obliquely, perpendicularly, laterally, and, indeed, in every direction; hence the difficulty in raising all the needles with an instrument simultaneously to their required position to run through their own apertures, and escape the many traps set for them in the shape of a number of holes pierced nearly halfway through the fence plate of the exact size to fit the needles. In the more expensive latches, as we have only been describing the cheapest ones, there are protectors and detectors."

Good FOR PENNSYLVANIA.—The good old Keystone State has effectually punctured two political wind-bags. Thad. Stevens and John W. Forney were candidates for the United States Congress in Pennsylvania. Forney withdrew from the canvass in favor of Stevens. The united strength and influence of this pair of agitator worthies was sufficient to procure seven votes and seven only—for Stevens in the Union caucus. Even Governor Curtin, a moderate radical, could only receive twenty-three votes. He was too much tainted with Stevens and Forneyism.
