TEMPERANCE EXPERIMENT.

The Gothenburg System to be tried in

England.

An experiment is to be tried in Birming-

ham, England, which will at once engage

the attention of all persons interested in tem-

perance. The Council of that city, by a

vote of 40 to 10, have decided that it is desir-

able for the municipality to obtain the requisite

power to "acquire, on payment of a

fair compensation to be fixed by Parliament,

all existing interests in the retail sale of in-

toxicating drinks in the city, and thereafter,

if it sees fit, to carry on the trade for the

convenience and on behalf of the inhabitants,

but so that no individual shall have any

pecuniary interest in, or derive any benefit

from the sale." The experiment is substantially

that which has been put in operation in

Gothenburg, Sweden, where the town coun-

cil the sale of liquor, dictates where it shall

be sold, who shall sell it, and at what prices,

and thus become responsible for the condition

of the people so far as sobriety is concerned.

In Gothenburg it is claimed by the advo-

cates of the system that it has worked well,

and it is stated that intemperance has been

materially reduced. This statement, how-

ever, is decidedly controverted by official reports.

INSURANCE MANAGEMENT.

Some Interesting Testimony in a New

York Investigation--S. N. Hammond,

of Cincinnati.

In the Continental Life examination, late-

ly, S. N. Hammond, of Cincinnati, known

among the insurance men as a professional

"wrecker," gave testimony that excited

much surprise and interest. He said in part:

"I was engaged by L. W. Frost, in May,

1874, to buy policies for the company, and

went to Nebraska, Kansas, California, and

afterwards to the Southern States. Under

what is known as the Continental plan of in-

surance, a certain reserve is left with the in-

surance departments of the States in which

the company does business. This reserve is

increased in proportion to the amount of the

risks taken in the States. The policies were

for thirty years, and, after that, were to be

null and void, but the 'loading' of this class
