A TRUE ACCOUNT OF AMERICAN TAXES.—

The following account of English taxation appeared in the Edinburgh Review, a number of years ago, supposed to be from the pen of Rev. Sidney Smith. It will apply as well to our present system. We give it in full:

"Permit me to inform you, my friends, what are the inevitable consequences of being too fond of glory. Taxes upon every article which enters into the mouth, or covers the back, or is placed under the foot; taxes upon everything which it is pleasant to see, hear, feel, smell or taste; taxes upon warmth, light and locomotion; taxes on everything on earth, and the water under earth; taxes on the raw material; taxes on every fresh value which is added to it by the industry of man; taxes on the sauce which pampers man's appetite, and the drug that restores him to health; on the emblem which decorates the judge; and on the rope which hangs the criminal; on the poor man's sail; on the nails of the coffin, and the ribbons of the bride; at bed or board, on the comb or the want, we must pay.

The schoolboy has paid his tax; the headless youth mangles his taxed horse with a taxed bridle on a taxed road; and the dying man, pouring his medicine which has paid 20 per cent., into a spoon which has paid 15 per cent., flings himself back upon his chintz bed which has paid 26 per cent., makes his will on a ten dollar stamp, and expires in the arms of an eagle of putting him to death. His whole property is then immediately taxed from 5 to 10 per cent. Besides the probate, large fees are demanded for burying him in the church, his virtues are handed down to posterity on taxed marble; and he is gathered to his fathers, to be taxed no more.

In addition to all this, the habit of dealing with large sums will make the government avicious and profuse; and the system itself will infallibly generate the base vermin of spies and informers, and a still more pestilent race of political tools never longer more than a second hand odious description, while the prodigious patronage which the collecting of this splendid revenue will throw into the hands of Government, will invest it with so vast an influence, and hold out such means and temptation to corruption, as all the virtue and public spirit will be unable to resist.

DELICACY OF THE CABLE.—At a supper, given in honor of Cyrus W. Field, he said:

"Our two cables do their work well. There are no way stations between Ireland and Newfoundland, and the messages have to be repeated, and the lightning never lingers more than a second in the bottom of the sea. To those who feared that they might be used up or wear out, I would say for their relief, that the old cable works a little better than the new one, but that is because it has been down longer, as time improves the quality of the gutta percha. But the new one is constantly growing better. To show how delicate are these wonderful records, it is enough to state that they can be worked with the smallest battery power.—When the first cable was laid in 1858, electricians thought that to send a current 2,000 miles, it must be almost like a stroke of lightning. But God was not in the earthquake, but in the still, small voice. The other day, Mr. Latimer Clark telegraphed from Ireland across the ocean, and back again, with a battery formed in a lady's thimble! And now, Mr. Collett writes me from Heath's content: 'I have just sent my compliments to Dr. Gould, of Cambridge, who is at Valencia, with a battery composed of a strip of zinc, excited by a drop of water, the similitude of a tear.' A telegraph like that we think nearly perfect. It has never for a minute or an hour failed.

Mrs. PARTINGTON sometimes gets things mixed up, but in regard to marriage her ideas are tolerably clear, and she is, we are happy to see, sensible to the last. 'If ever I'm married,' said she, looking up from the book he was reading, and kicking the door to energetically, 'if ever I'm married'—'Don't speak of marriage, Isaac, till you are old enough to understand the bonds that bind congenial souls. People mustn't speak of marriage with impunity. It is the first thing children think of, now-a-days, and young boys in pianofore, and young girls with heads fricased into spicuous curls, and full of foretold stories, are talking of marriage before they get into their teens. Think of such ones getting married! Yet, there's Mr. Spald, when heaven took his wife away, went right to a young lady's cemetery and got another, no more fit to be the head of a family than I am to be the Board of Mayor and Aldermen.

CHIMNEYS.—The Boston Transcript recommends that in building chimneys bricklayers should put a quantity of salt into the mortar with which the interstices of the brick are to be laid. The effect will be that there will never be any accumulation of soot in the chimney for the reason that the salt in the portion of mortar which is exposed absorbs moisture every damp day. The soot, thus becoming damp, falls down into the fireplace, which, we should say, would be a remedy about as bad as the disease.

Radical Stultification.

The course of some of the would-be radical leaders in Congress is incomprehensible. That is to say, it does not appear to be guided by any rules of common sense or reason, but by mere violent passion. The leaders strike wildly and blindly, and not infrequently the blows they administer hit them instead of their adversaries.

All Union men have contended that the Military Commissions frequently in vogue during the war were founded in necessity and justice. Especially is this the case in relation to the Commission which tried the assassins of President Lincoln.

The rampant radicals, in particular, have been extremely unctuous in their maintenance of the legality of Military Commissions, and have gone so far, even, as to denounce as rebels all who did not swear by the Commissions and uphold their decisions. The radicals even proposed to virtually abolish the Supreme Court, because that tribunal, in one instance, pronounced against the legality and justice of a Military Commission.

In face of all these radical arguments in favor of Military Commissions, we find certain radical leaders in Congress endeavoring to amend them, and by so doing to place the Nation in the position of having willfully perpetrated a monstrous crime in the name of justice. Ben Butler, the idol of rampant radicals, and the hero who never won a battle, in a speech in Congress declares, that the members of the Military Commission who tried the assassins of President Lincoln are prepared murderers; that they wrongfully hanged Mrs. Surratt and her confederates; and, as a logical consequence, that the people who sanctioned the acts of that Commission are the applauders of assassins. Following up Butler's outrageous speech, one Ward, a radical follower of the redoubtable general, introduces a resolution in the House of Representatives, declaring that Mrs. Surratt and her associates were wrongfully convicted. This phase of radical self-stultification is an exhibit to what extent vile passions will lead men. In order that they may vilify and abuse the present President, they outrage public decency, and every principle of justice, by denouncing those who administered just punishment to the assassins of the former President. Their partisan hate and malice press them forward to the point of becoming the champions and advocates of assassins. One day, in Congress, they propose to abolish the Supreme Court for daring to hint that, in some cases, Military Commissions were illegal, and, on the next, they contend that the members of those Commissions are cold-blooded murderers. These specimens of radical self-stultification, insulting as they are to the common sense of the people, and vindictive of justice, and illustrative of the blind hate and vindictive passions which control the radical leaders in Congress, should warn the people not to put too much faith in the men who can thus demean themselves and insult the Nation.—S. J. 624.

GEN. WASHINGTON'S LAST VOTE.—

The Father of his country was conscientious in the discharge of every duty as a citizen, and never failed to vote. The last occasion of his doing so was in the spring of 1799, in the town of Alexandria. He died on the 11th of December following. The Court-house of Fairfax county was then over the old market house, and immediately fronting Gadsby's tavern. The entrance into it was by a slight flight of crazy steps on the outside, and while election was progressing—several thousands of persons being assembled around the polls—Washington drove up in his old and well known family carriage. The crowd spontaneously gave way and made a lane for him to pass through, as he approached the court-house steps. A gentleman who was standing at Gadsby's door saw eight or ten good looking men immediately spring forward and follow the General up the steps, in order to uphold and support him, if necessary. According to the customs of that time, the five or six candidates were sitting on the bench, who rose in a body and bowed profoundly on the entrance of Washington. Very gracefully returning their salutation, the Register of the polls said: "Well, General, how do you vote?" (It was then by *via voce*.) He looked a moment at the candidates, and replied: "Gentlemen, I vote for measures, not for men;" and having audibly pronounced his vote, he made another graceful bow, and retired. He was loudly cheered by the outward crowd on returning to his carriage.

A FEW WORDS ON SQUEEZING.—

While we are growing very sensible, indeed, in the matter of dress, in the way of boots, balmal skirts, warm stockings and high necks, we are degenerating in some other matters quite as important. The corset is not a necessary part of a woman's wardrobe; and alas! when a woman does begin to wear corsets, she will wear them too small, and will tug at the laces until her breath becomes short, and she feels it necessary to refrain from anything like a comfortable meal. We say nothing against a well shaped corset, worn loosely, but there lies the difficulty. A loose corset injures the appearance, instead of improving it, and people wear corsets that they may have small waists. All we can say is, don't squeeze whatever you do. You have small waists, but you are exposing yourself to a dozen misfortunes which are as bad as a large waist. First, you'll surely have dyspepsia, and secondly, your hands will soon grow red; thirdly, your nose; fourthly, you will be unable to walk a mile at once; fifthly, dinner will be a misery; sixthly, your shoulder-blades will increase in size and altitude; seventhly, your eyes will grow weak; eighthly, you will break down at thirty or thirtieths, and be a sickly old woman from that time forth. If these truths do not frighten women from tight corsets, perhaps the information that gentlemen generally do not admire what dressmakers call a "pretty figure" so much as a natural one, may have some influence.

OIL THAT WILL EXPLODE.—

Fill a tumbler three-fourths full of moderately cool water, then pour half a teaspoonful of oil into it, stir them together; then hold a lighted match over the tumbler, and if it takes fire from the vapor before the flame comes in contact with the oil, then it is dangerous, as good oil will not thus ignite, and indeed will not burn readily when the flaming match is thrown into it; while that which has been much adulterated with benzine, will emit a vapor which is nearly as explosive as gunpowder, and the oil will burn freely. Kerosene ought always to be tested in this way before using.

Thieves and their Way.

In the report of the New York Prison Association, there is, among other interesting matter, a valuable paper from Hon. J. S. Gould, upon the condition of the county jails of that State, in which, under the head of "Repression of Crime," some remarks occur which let us into the secrets of certain thieving operations. Says Mr. Gould:

Washington Correspondence.

WASHINGTON, March 4th, 1867. EDITOR STATESMAN:—I cannot let this day pass without penning you a few lines. To-day I regard the most eventful one in the history of our country.

THE THIRTY-NINTH CONGRESS.—The Thirty-ninth Congress adjourned to-day, at 12 M., and immediately thereafter, in pursuance of an act passed by that body, Mr. McPherson, Clerk of the Thirty-ninth Congress, called to order the Fortieth Congress, and proceeded to call the roll.

THE IMPROVEMENT QUESTION. The whole question of improvement has at length been settled. After months of labor on the part of the Judiciary Committee of the House on this question, they, at the closing hours of the session, bring in a report stating that they have had no time to investigate the charges made against the President, and ask to be discharged from their further consideration.

THE DALLES MINT. A bill was introduced in the House at the last session of Congress, establishing assay offices at Portland, Oregon, and Boise City, Idaho.

DELEGATE TO CONGRESS. I here again enter my protest against the return of Mr. Denny, or any man of his caliber, to Congress from Washington Territory.

MISCELLANEOUS. Senator Nesmith was, a few days since, offered the position of Commissioner of Indian Affairs by the President, but he declined; he leaves in the steamer of the 1st inst. for the Pacific Coast.

VANCOUVER CORRESPONDENCE. EDITOR STATESMAN:—A General Court Martial was in session at this place, this week, for the trial of Capt. Converse, and after a thorough investigation, he has been unanimously acquitted by the Court.

ELECTION. The County Convention was held for this county, to-day, and delegates elected to the Territorial Convention by the republicans party.

FRESH OYSTERS.—A gentleman named Cooper, at the "St. George Chop House," on Thursday night, accomplished the feat of swallowing eight dozen oysters, at a single sitting. Notwithstanding this great consumption, the proprietors of the "St. George" are still prepared to serve up the liveables in style to suit the taste of customers.

BEST TIMES.—The farmers throughout the valley just at this time are busy putting in their crops. The season is unusually late, and owing to this cause there will be less breadth of land seeded, this year, than usual. The freeze-up in the month of March kept the farmers back with their plowing, and notwithstanding their utmost exertions they will be unable to break up as much land as they desired. Anticipating a brisk demand for grain, this is to be regretted.

THE FIRST CASTING.—All their arrangements being completed, it is the intention of Messrs. The Council is composed exclusively of business men, who will keep a sharp eye to the city finances, and see that not a dollar of the public money is expended uselessly.

MINEING IN MONTANA.—There has just been exhibited at the General Land Office, by a gentleman direct from Sterling, Montana, two gold bricks; one stamped as in value \$147, and the other worth \$75. The gold was obtained by the Clark and Upson Mining Company at Sterling.

COTTON SEED FROM EGYPT.—The Department of Agriculture has recently received from Alexandria, Egypt, a small quantity of the celebrated long staple Egyptian cotton seed, which will be sent out in small parcels, for experiment, upon application to the Commissioner. The distribution of this seed will be confined exclusively to the Gulf States.

THE DISPOSAL OF PUBLIC LANDS.—Commissioner Wilson is in receipt of returns showing an aggregate disposal of 12,057 acres of the public lands during the month of February last at the Falls of St. Croix, (Wisconsin.) Stevens Point, (Wisconsin,) Taylor's Falls, (Minnesota,) and Ironton, (Missouri,) local offices. The greater portion of the land was taken up by actual settlers under the homestead law, and the remainder located with agricultural college scrip, military warrants, and sold for cash.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Second Session of the Thirty-Ninth Congress.

AN ACT to provide for temporary increase of the pay of officers in the army of the United States, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That for two years from the first day of July, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, all officers of the army below the rank of major general, including the professors at West Point, shall be paid an addition of thirty-three and one third per centum to their present pay proper; and the pay and emoluments of all field and other mounted officers shall hereafter be the same as is now provided for cavalry officers of like grades.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That section one of the act entitled "An act to increase the pay of soldiers in the United States army, and for other purposes," approved June twentieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, be, and the same is hereby, continued in full force and effect for three years, from and after the close of the rebellion, as announced by the President of the United States, by proclamation, bearing date the twentieth day of August eighteen hundred and sixty-six.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the provisions of the joint resolution, approved July twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, entitled "A Joint Resolution in regard to rations of Union soldiers, held as prisoners of war," shall be extended so as to allow commutation of rations at cost prices in the settlement of the accounts of all enlisted soldiers, of the army, navy and marine corps, who died while held as prisoners of war in the rebel States, or who, having been so held as prisoners of war, have died or may die subsequent to release; to be paid, however, only to the widow of such deceased person, if such widow remain unmarried, or in case there be no such widow, then to the surviving children of the deceased, or if there be no such widow or children, then to the parent or parents of the deceased; or if there be no such widow, children, parent, or parents, then to the brothers and sisters of the deceased.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That section one of the act entitled "An act to increase and fix the military peace establishment of the United States," approved July twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, as relates to the promotion of assistant surgeons after three years service, shall be amended so as to read "and persons who have served as surgeons or assistant surgeons three years in the volunteer force shall be eligible for promotion to the grade of captain."

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That the act entitled "An act more effectively to provide for the national defence by establishing a uniform militia throughout the United States," approved May eighth, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and the several acts amendatory thereof, be, and they are hereby amended by striking out the word "white."

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That the act entitled "An act to increase the pay of officers in the army of the United States, and for other purposes," approved March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, be, and the same is hereby, continued in full force and effect for three years, from and after the close of the rebellion, as announced by the President of the United States, by proclamation, bearing date the twentieth day of August eighteen hundred and sixty-six.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That (excepting the ordnance storekeeper and paymaster at the Springfield Armory, who has the rank, pay and allowances of a major of cavalry) all storekeepers of the army shall hereafter have the rank, pay and allowances of captains of cavalry, and the post chaplains now in service, or hereafter to be appointed, shall be commissioned by the President, and all vacancies occurring in the grade of chaplain, which is hereby established to rank as captain of infantry, shall be filled by the President, and all such appointments shall be subject to the approval of the Senate, and the several acts amendatory thereof, be, and they are hereby amended by striking out the word "white."

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That in any case where a person entitled to receive payment of bounty under the provisions of any act shall make application therefor, or where such application shall be made by the proper representatives of such person, being deceased, and the discharge of such person has been lost, it shall be competent for the accounting officers to receive, in lieu of the actual production of such discharge, proof of the actual loss of the same and secondary proof of its issue and contents, together with proof of the identity of the claimant or person deceased, under such rules defining the character and form of the evidence as the Paymaster General shall prescribe.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That the section fifteen of the act entitled "An act to provide for the national defence by establishing a uniform militia throughout the United States," approved July fifth, eighteen hundred and thirty-eight, be amended so that general officers shall not hereafter be excluded from receiving the additional ration for every five years' service; and it is hereby further provided that officers of the army shall hereafter have the same allowance of additional rations for every five years' service as officers in active service.

Approved, March 2, 1867.
