The New Income Tax.

Few of our readers, we presume, are aware of the
exact nature of the changes made in the In-
ternal Revenue Law, regarding taxation. We
give below for their information a list of the
proper returns to be handed in, and deduction
made.

RETURNS.
1. From the profits in any trade, business or
vocation from which income is actually derived,
or any interest therein wherever carried on.

2. From the payment of debts in a former
year considered lost, and which have not paid a
previous income tax.

3. From rents.

4. From farming operations—amount of live
stock sold; amount of agricultural products sold.

5. From profits realized by sales of real estate
purchased since December 31, 1863.

6. From interest on any bonds or other evi-
dences of indebtedness of any railroad, canal,
turnpike, canal navigation, or slackwater com-
pany; or interest or dividends on stock, capital
or deposits in any bank, trust company, saving
institution, insurance, railroad, canal, turnpike,
canal navigation or slackwater company.

7. From dividends of any incorporated com-
pany other than those above mentioned.

8. From gains and profits of any incorporated
body not divided.

9. From interest on notes, bonds, or other se-
curities of the United States.

10. From interest on notes, bonds, mortgages,
or other securities than those enumerated above.

11. From any salary other than an officer or
employee of the United States.

12. From any salary or pay as an officer or
employee of the United States.

13. From profits on sales of gold or stocks,
wherever purchased.

14. From all sources not above enumerated.
Gross income.

DEDUCTIONS.
1. Exempt by law \$1,000.

2. National, State, county and municipal taxes
paid within the year.

3. Losses actually sustained during the year,
from fire, shipwreck, or incurred in trade, and
not freely deducted in ascertaining profits.

4. Losses on sales of real estate purchased
since December 31, 1863.

5. Amount paid for hired land to cultivate
land from which income is derived.

6. Amount paid for the live stock which was
sold within the year.

7. Amount actually paid for rent of homestead.

8. Amount paid for usual or ordinary repairs,
excluding payments for new buildings, personal
improvements or betterments.

9. Interest paid out or falling due within the
year.

10. Salary or pay as an officer or employee of
the United States, from which a tax has been with-
held.

11. Interest or dividend from corporations
enumerated above in paragraph 6.

Taxable income.
Amount of tax at 5 per cent.

**CARRIAGES, GOLD WATCHES, BILLIARD TABLES,
GOLD AND SILVER PLATE.**
(Schedule A—Section 100, Act June 30, 1864, as
Amended July 13, 1866.)

TAXABLE PROPERTY.
Carriage, phaeton, carryall, rockaway, or
other like carriage, and any coach, hack-
ney coach, omnibus or four-wheeled car-
riage, the body of which rests upon
springs of any description, which is kept
for use for hire or for passengers, and
which is not used exclusively in hus-
bandry or in the transportation of mer-
chandise, valued at exceeding \$300 and
not exceeding \$500, including harness
used therewith. 30 00

Carrriages of like description valued at
above \$500. 100 00

Gold watches, composed wholly or in part
of gold or gilt, kept for use, valued at

Small Farms.
We are glad that the farmers throughout the
country are discussing this subject with so much
of interest and earnestness.

For a long time we have indulged in extrava-
gant notions of the value of land. Large possessions
and large wealth—these were counted essential
and few were the men who could toil contentedly
on small farms, and be satisfied with a limited
business. But the experience of the few last
years has taught us all, that money, beyond that
point which secures us independence, is not an
element of happiness or progress. When sought
for, for its own sake, it is every means of evil.
Nor can it be otherwise, if grasped at to gratify
a low social ambition. These truths have made
slow, but sure progress, among all classes, yet
among none more than the agricultural interests
of the land.

We may mention the growing disposition on
the part of farmers to protest only as much
land as they can cultivate well, and reject the
rest. And we cannot but rejoice at
it. For if rightly directed, their influence will
ever be exerted for the substantial good of all—
since it possesses, from a variety of causes, that
admixture of wisdom and prudence, which is
unwilling to run any great risk, or try hazardous
experiments in government, yet which is never
backward in making exchanges whenever in
reason they are called for, or urging reforms
when existing evils demand them. Just views
of home ensure just views generally, with regard
to every thing else. And when the farming
interests practice on their own soil whatever a
wise economy, comfort and real independence
may demand, we may feel assured, not only
that their influence will be rightly directed, but
that they will see it that these virtues are
practiced on our public affairs.

And as a general rule, the possession of as
much land as may be well cultivated will help
to establish these virtues. First, the farmer
who is so situated, can apply his industry better;
second, he can employ all his capital; third, he
can do more and obtain a surer and steadier
return from both; fourth, he can secure more of
those comforts which tend so much to improve
and civilize all of us—a good dwelling, good
measures, good fences, good cattle, greater
fertility of soil, and a better knowledge of his
business. Nor is this all. When men measure
themselves thus, by what they can do, and are
zealous to do it, they are not so apt to be led
astray by speculation, by avarice, by social dis-
play, or any of that class of evils which so much
disturb and distress society. They love the
earth they till; they are content to till it, being
proud of the labor of their hands—they find
and feel under these circumstances, that they
can do more good to others, and enjoy themselves
better, because necessarily they will look more
to what is in a man than what is around him, to
character rather, than to the number of acres
he may own or wealth he may possess.

[CONCLUDED.]
**QUESTIONS SETTLED BY THE ORGANIZATION
OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY, AND WHICH
DID NOT ENTER, EXCEPT INCIDENTALLY,
INTO ITS CARES.**

The speaker said, as his views were utterly
and radically opposed to the financial policy
now pursued by the government, he would state
here, some of the questions among others, which
were settled at the organization of the Republi-
can party, and which did not, except incidentally,
enter into its cares, and therefore, no man's fealty
to the party was to be measured by his views
on these matters. Among these matters
settled he would name the question of a
high protective tariff, or the "American
system," as it was called. Without referring
in detail to the several measures of the gov-
ernment on this subject, it might be stated
in general, that the public judgment had
been entered up against a high protective
system, and that at the inauguration of the
rebellion the country was drifting strongly
toward free trade. So, too, the question of
a National Bank had been determined, and
when Jackson placed his iron hand around
the throat of the monster it never recovered
from the throttling, and in the establish-
ment of the Sub-treasury system, the gov-
ernment declared its hostility to National
Banks. To these two questions may be added
the question of Territorial Acquisition. Many
of our leading statesmen considered that a
Republic could live only in a small area, and
cited in support of this theory, some of the
ancient Republics, and Switzerland and other
Republics of the present day, but a new people
placed on a new continent,
in extent, demanded a new policy, and their
ambition grew to the dimensions of the
continent, and refused to accept Switzer-
land, hidden in the Alps, as a model, con-
sidering it hardly sufficient for a nest for
their bird or a patch for Uncle Sam's trou-
sers, and under the irrepresible demand of
the people for stretching room for Uncle
Sam's limbs, from an area of 820,680 square
miles, at our independence, we have grown to
3,000,000 square miles, acquiring in the
first instance, more than 800,000 square
miles by our Louisiana purchase; 66,900
by Florida; 318,000 by Texas; 308,000 by
the Oregon treaty; 550,455 by our Mexican
treaty, and about 400,000 square miles by
our recent Russian American purchase.

**THE FINANCIAL STATUS OF THE COUNTRY,
AT THE CLOSE OF THE REBELLION, AND
THE FINANCIAL POLICY ADOPTED BY
THE GOVERNMENT.**

The war left on the shoulders of the
people a public debt of \$2,757,803,683, and
Congress had to provide for the current
expenses of the Government, the payment of
the interest on the public debt, and for the
extinguishment, faster or slower, of the
principal. In the settlement of the financial
policy of the government, two opposing
forces met at Washington. The manufac-
turing interests, representing hundreds of
millions of dollars, and which had grown
enormously rich during the war, and the
1663 National Banks, with a capital of
\$417,245,154, and a circulation of \$292-
671,753, on the one side, and 35,000,000 of
people, the producers and consumers of the
nation, the tax paying millions, on the other
side, and as the interests of the opposing
forces were hostile, the question, which in-
terest should control, had to be determined.
The manufacturing interests demanded not
only that the high duties levied to enrich
them, should not be reduced, but boldly re-
quired in many instances that these duties
should be largely increased. The people
paying enormous and ruinous rates for all
articles alike of the luxuries and necessities
of life, opposed this demand. Which side
had been the victor in this issue could easily
be determined by reference to the several
measures of Congress, imposing, in many in-
stances, duties several hundred per cent.
higher than the actual cost of the articles
before the war, and by the fact that the
people paid, the last fiscal year, in the way
of customs, at a currency valuation, the
sum of \$251,000,000 of which some \$50-
000,000 was derived from coffee, sugar, tea,
and spices, articles which go on every poor
man's table, and may properly be called the
necessaries of life. That these duties were
a tax on the people, going to enrich the
manufacturers, was a proposition well estab-
lished by the clear and well recognized
principles of political economy. Not only
was it a tax, but it was a tax of the most
objectionable features, as it was levied not
on the abilities, but the necessities of the
people, and under its operations the tax paid
by the poor approximated closely to that
paid by the rich, as it requires as many
yards of calico to make the poor man's wife
a dress, than it does the rich man's, and as
much sugar to sweeten his coffee. And if
there was any portion of the United States
upon which those high duties were more
oppressive and unjust than another, it was
the Pacific Coast, as we were too far re-
moved to participate in the real and pre-
tended advantages arising from the home
markets produced by the manufacturing inter-
ests, and the tax therefore fell on our people
with all its rigors, without any of the compensat-
ing advantages, real or imaginary. "To
such an extent," says a great writer, "have
regulating and restricting laws been carried,
in some countries, that they have nearly an-
nihilated both manufactures and legitimate
commerce, and reduced masses of the people
to the condition of paupers, besides encourag-
ing the pernicious and demoralizing pur-
suits of the smuggler." And the same high
authority (Chambers) adds: "It is likewise
customary to impose duties on goods im-
ported from foreign countries, with the view
of protecting the manufactures of such ar-
ticles in this country, but this only benefits

a class or a few persons at the expense of the
whole community, and therefore all such
duties are, in the main, detrimental to trade
and the public welfare." Commerce is a
child of the seas, and graded on its billows
from the day it was planted on the borders
of the Mediterranean Sea, it has imbibed
that freedom that sweeps over its home, and
when deprived of it, and bandaged with the
protecting and restricting laws of man, it
declines and languishes.

The course pursued by the government
on the currency question is even more detri-
mental to the public interests than its im-
position of high and oppressive duties. The
necessities of the war required the issue of
a large amount of irredeemable paper money,
but with the close of the war the nation ex-
pected that the government would take some
steps to reduce the currency volume and to
return to the specie basis, but this just ex-
pectation of the people has been thwarted
by the manufacturing interests and the bank-
ing interests.

The 1663 National Banks, with a circula-
tion of \$292,671,753, and a capital of
\$417,245,154, in order that they might reap
enormous profits and grow rich at the ex-
pense of the public interests, went to Wash-
ington, and set their will against the people's
will, and to this time, they have succeeded
in carrying Congress in their pockets. Hav-
ing their irredeemable paper bills issued to
them on government bonds deposited by
them and bearing interest, and loaning the
bills issued on those bonds, they are deriv-
ing a double interest—the interest on the
bonds deposited, and the interest on their
bills loaned and issued on the faith of these
deposited bonds. The condition of these
Banks all over the country, and their man-
ner of doing business may be seen by the
following exhibit of the Illinois Banks:

There is banking or you. \$30,000,000
loaned on \$11,000,000 of capital, with \$27-
000,000 on demand, with the grand reserve
of \$103,000 in specie to meet these liabilities,
as to run these machines. That this
vast issue of irredeemable paper money by
inflating valuations and keeping the country
in an un-etitled and feverish condition, and
by encouraging speculations and extrava-
gances, is a great evil is a proposition too
plain for discussion. Mr. Webster said that
"of all the contrivances for cheating the
laboring classes of mankind, none have been
found more effectual than that which deludes
them with an irredeemable paper currency."
Horace Greeley, with all his proclivities fa-
vorable to banks, declares that "there is no
end to the mischief which can be wrought
by the vicious principle of the inflationist—
that of irredeemable legal tender note of
the Government is money, or is as good as
money for any purpose under heaven. We
say that in its irredeemable state it is a
worthless rag, a transparent swindle, a glaring
lie; and the whole fabric of trade, com-
merce, industry, speculation, banking, based
on it, is a rotten fabric, resting on rotten
supports, and liable to crumble and go down
in one universal crash.

The more especially, we say, is this true
when the whole superstructure and founda-
tion rests on a reckless majority of spoliators
in Congress. The inflationists need not
tell us they do not mean this, and they do
not mean that. They do not know what
they mean. Their error and their vice is
that they trust themselves to the guidance
of an unsound principle which leads them,
volens volens, willing or unwilling, straight
down the precipice of individual and Na-
tional bankruptcy. They hold that to be
securely which is not money. They hold
that to be money which is not money. They
bedevil themselves and they bedevil the
country with the idea that the irredeemable
paper money of the Government is a blessing.
Following the lead of these false and perni-
cious ideas, they reason and they act accord-
ingly. Adopting the vicious principle that
a small inflation is a good thing, they pave
the way for a large inflation as a better.

The country must be made to realize that
the irredeemable paper money is a bold
swindle, by whomsoever issued, and is a
disgrace to its utterer; and that they who
would increase its volume, or prolong its
existence a day, except under the pressure
of a dire National necessity—a necessity
which has long since ceased to exist in this
country—are as much public enemies as
they who would conspire for the National
ruin in any other manner.

The people have suffered enough from the
evils of a depreciated currency to insist on
the demand for its extinction. The vast
body of consumers have been long subjected
to inordinate prices through the powerful
combinations of gigantic speculators dealing
in and controlling all articles of consump-
tion, and especially the necessities of life.
These speculative combinations are sup-
ported by the banks, who earn their exor-
bitant profits by issuing endless promises to
pay, which they are never called upon to re-
deem; and thus they become co-conspirators with these
plunderers upon the public. The banks are no
long administered for the purpose of facilitat-
ing commercial operations by legitimate loans.
Released from all obligation to pay, except in
paper promises, they issue their notes, they af-
ford their credit, they grant their aid to bloated
speculators on stocks and on commodities of
every kind and description. And the Tribune,
in showing that owing to the large profits
not got down at the bidding of politicians. Public
sentiment on these questions was restless and
somewhat surging, and when it did move in
earnest, it would grind into powder men and
parties that stood in its way.

The speaker said he had now stated his views
on the public questions to which he had called
attention, and he had been told by some, and
would be told by others that these were not
the sentiments of the Union party—probably not,
but at all events, they were his sentiments, and
he proposed, in the future as in the past, to fol-
low his convictions. As it was his habit to
keep up with rather than to lead public senti-
ment, he recognized the fact that there was al-
ways something of distrust against this class
men, as there was against those who might not
occupy the most advanced positions in an army,
but he thought the most active questioners of
his political principles were of a few sage brush
layyers and small politicians scattered over the
territory, who had imagined that, in some way
or other, he was in their way, while, in truth,
the lion in their path was nature. These senti-

The Philadelphia Ledger on this subject
remarks:

"We some weeks ago called attention to the
fact that the banks, in violation of the law,
were using their funds at a distance from

lating in Government securities and in gold,
also in violation of the law. On Saturday
last we called attention to the fact of a prac-
tice grown common with the country banks
when drawn on for balances due, of shirking
payment by answering with a draft on some
other country bank, and that in turn by a
draft on another near or remote. It is also
very well known that all the banks do not
hold the required reserve of greenbacks al-
ways on hand. The temptation of a profit
on what the bank considers a safe operation
is frequently too strong to be resisted, when
the reserve is used, loans made, and a mem-
