WOMAN IN THE BIBLE.—The Bible is the book of women. It is the only book which has come down from the misty ages of antiquity that presents us with women as the equal and meet for man. LARGE NUGGETS FROM HIGHLAND GULCH.—This gulch is one of the richest in the Territory, and astonishing developments are daily made. We were shown a beautiful nugget the other day taken from Major Packard's claim in Highland Gulch, which was worth \$346 80—weighing over 19 ounces. We learn that another nugget was lately taken from Capt. H. B. Steele's claim in the same gulch which was worth \$284 50. From the great wealth of this gulch we are confident that Highland will be a lively camp this season. It has a population already, we have been informed, of about 500, and is daily increasing.—*Helena Herald.*

THE PRESBYTERIANS IN ENGLAND.—The question of union among the Presbyterians in England has been taken up in earnest in the London Presbytery of the English Presbyterian church. At a late meeting of that body, two overtures to the synod were adopted, one to make ministers and probationers in the negotiating churches in Scotland eligible for calls to vacant congregations in the English Presbyterian church, and the other to instruct their union committee to take steps to promote a union of the different sections of the negotiating churches located in England.

Mr. Craig met with the total loss of his drug store, brick cellar full of goods, even his clothing and all his personal effects, in the late fire. A Scandalous Affair.

This community has been thrown into an intense excitement to-day, caused by the development of an act of outrage and villainy, which is seldom perpetrated.

The chief actor in this last drama of crime is one who officially occupies an exalted position, whose sworn duty it is to uphold and enforce the law. Up to this time he has enjoyed the utmost confidence and respect of the entire community. By those who most intimate with him, he was considered the very soul of honor, and the personification of integrity, while his impartial and fearless administration of the law, upholding its dignity, enforcing respect to law and rendering crime odious, gave him the highest recommendation to all peaceable and law-abiding citizens throughout the district over which he has been called to preside. But, alas, how have the mighty fallen! The ermine of Justice has not only been stained but vilely polluted in the person of this man. We refer to Charles B. Darwin, at present Judge of the Third Judicial District of this Territory, who to-day, is branded by the verdict of a just and righteous people, as more deserving of the convict's cell or the hangman's halter than the vilest criminal upon whom he had passed sentence.

About a year ago, Judge Darwin came to this Territory a stranger, but highly recommended, and received at the hands of prominent citizens of the Territory, the warmest welcome; and by none more cordially than by F. A. Wilson, Esq., Collector of Customs. Very soon he became the honored guest and trusted friend in the Collector's family, which, so far as he is concerned, betrays that confidence—a confidence, the betrayal of which is the more aggravated, because greater trust had been reposed in him as a brother bound by the most sacred ties.

By assiduous attentions to his friend's wife, who was as unsuspecting and trustful at the outset, he managed to gain her affections, and by instilling into her mind some of the damning heresies of the present day, falsely termed philosophy, he has completely alienated her from her husband and children, till at length she consented to break all the ties which bound her to them and home, and became his affinity as soon as she could secure a divorce from him to whom she had solemnly pledged her love, and he (Darwin) in like manner released from a wife with two children he has left in Iowa.

In Town.—Judge Hough and lady, just arrived from the Atlantic States, are in town, and stopping at the Oriental Hotel.

TRAVEL.—Hon. P. B. Johnson kindly furnished us with the report of the Fourth of July demonstration in town, for which we will please accept our thanks.

RASPBERRIES and CURRANT.—By a walk of a few hundred yards, ladies and gentlemen can find a cool shade and spring and plenty of raspberries and cream, at the residence of A. B. Roberts, at the upper end of town.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—We are requested to suggest that the officers and members of the Walla Walla Agricultural Society meet at the Court House, on Saturday afternoon, July 13th, for the purpose of arranging for the Annual Fair, and transacting such other business as may require attention. It is desirable that prompt action be taken in relation to the Fair. From all parts of the Valley we hear expressions of the intention to take part in the exhibition, and it is important that the time and place for holding the Fair should be announced at the earliest possible moment.

FIAT.—At an early hour on Wednesday morning, the house of Isaac Laswell, situated about a mile below town, caught fire from a defective stove pipe, and was burned to the ground. The family made their escape with barely the clothes they had on, and are now camped in the neighborhood, without shelter or protection. What adds to Mr. Laswell's misfortune, is the fact that he has a daughter, aged about 15 years, who is prostrated by sickness, and scarcely expected to recover from one moment to another. We learn that Mr. L. is straitened for means, and under all the circumstances, we think it would be well if those of us who are more favored, would come forward and assist him in rebuilding his house and providing a shelter for his afflicted family.

MILITARY EXPEDITION.—On Saturday last, the company of Cavalry, lately stationed at Fort Walla Walla, took up the line of march for Waiwaine Ferry, where they will report to General Crook, now in command in the Indian country. The company numbered sixty-one enlisted men, commanded by Lieutenant Force, late commanding the post. Some forty civilians, in charge of trains and in the capacity of packers, accompanied the expedition, swelling the command to one hundred men. The command took out four months' supplies, and expected to reach the mouth of the field until the rations are exhausted. The patient commander, during his stay at Walla Walla, made many friends, and to him and his command we wish every success and any amount of glory.

Seitel, we return our thanks for the efficient manner in which they so well performed the duties assigned them.

Our thanks are also especially due to the ladies and gentlemen of Glee Club, and to Mr. Wineset, H. Wolfstein, and H. Duvois, for the appropriate vocal and instrumental music, which were furnished by them; also to Mr. A. Kyzer, for the use of his beautiful grove before and after the speaking.

The Committee kindly appreciate the successful efforts of Washington Engine and Hose Company, to enliven the occasion by appearing in the procession with their engine and hose carriage, beautifully and appropriately decorated.

To R. Guichard, Mr. O'Neil, Mr. George Young, Sheriff of Stevens county, and other gentlemen who assisted in firing a salute. We also extend our thanks to the Honorable City Council, and without further specification, to all who assisted in making the celebration, what is acknowledged by all, to be credit to the patriotism and public spirit of our community. We hereby return our thanks for their contributions of talent and material support in getting up and consummating the celebration.

ANOTHER tragedy occurred in Diamond on the evening of the 4th inst., about 12 o'clock. A young man by the name of Lane Smith, being intoxicated, went howling up the street in search of the chief of Vigilantes, bursting in the door of the Star Bakery, and with a drawn dirk in his hand rushed into the back room, and flourishing it drove it into a table and broke it into several pieces, then returned to the front room and called for liquor, and on being refused made an assault upon the bar tender. The proprietor, Mr. Joseph Whitman, then interfered, and was instantly knocked down by Smith, falling behind the bar. On arising, Mr. Whitman drew a pistol from under the counter and immediately fired, hitting Smith in the neck, inflicting a mortal wound, from the effects of which he died on the 4th inst., about 3 o'clock. Whitman was arrested and taken before justices Weston and Garigan, and after a thorough investigation was honorably discharged.—Helena Gazette.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES, Passed at the Second Session of the Thirty-Ninth Congress.

As Act to establish a uniform system of bankruptcy throughout the United States.

OF PROPERTY FURNISHABLE AND IN DISPUTE. Sec. 25. And be it further enacted, That when it appears to the satisfaction of the court that the estate of the debtor, or any part thereof, is of a perishable nature, or liable to deterioration in value, the court may order the same to be sold, in such manner as may be deemed most expedient, under the direction of the messenger or assignee, as the case may be, who shall hold the funds received in place of the estate disposed of, and whenever it appears to the satisfaction of the court that the title to any portion of the possession of the assignee, or which is claimed by him, is in dispute, the court may, upon the petition of the assignee, and after such notice to the claimant, his agent or attorney, as the court shall deem reasonable, order it to be sold, under the direction of the assignee, who shall hold the funds received in place of the estate disposed of, and the proceeds of the sale shall be considered the measure of the value of the property in any suit or controversy between the parties in any case, the court shall not prevent the recovery of the property of the assignee of the assignee by any proper action commenced at any time before the court orders the sale.

EXAMINATION OF BANKRUPTS.

Sec. 26. And be it further enacted, That the court may, on the application of the assignee in bankruptcy or of any creditor, or without any application, at all times require the bankrupt, upon reasonable notice, to attend and submit to an examination, on oath, upon all matters relating to the disposal or condition of his property, to his trade and dealings with others, and his accounts concerning the same, to all debts due to or claimed from him, and to all other matters connected with the bankruptcy, and the due settlement thereof according to law, which examination shall be in writing, and shall be signed by the bankrupt and filed with the other proceedings; and the court may, in like manner, require the attendance of any other person as a witness, and if such person shall fail to attend, the court may, on being so directed, direct to the marshal, commanding him to arrest such person, and bring him forthwith before the court, or before a register in bankruptcy, for examination as such witness. If the bankrupt is imprisoned, absent, or disabled from attending, the court may order that he be produced by the jailer, or any officer in whose custody he may be, or may direct the examination to be had, taken, and certified, at such time and place and in such manner as the court may deem proper, and with like effect as if such examination had been had in court. The bankrupt shall at all times, until his discharge, be subject to the order of the court, and shall, at the expense of the estate, execute all proper writings and instruments, and do and perform all acts required by the court touching the assigned property or estate, and to enable the assignee to demand, recover, and receive all the property and estate assigned, wherever situated, and for neglect or refusal to do so, the court may, on being so directed, order that the bankrupt be committed to prison, and that he be liable to arrest during the pendency of the proceedings in bankruptcy in any civil action unless the same is founded on some debt or claim to which a discharge in bankruptcy would not release him.

COMPLIMENTARY TO THE JEWS—A Judge of one of the old Virginia Courts, bears the following flattering testimony to the good behavior of the Jews:

"I was Commonwealth's Attorney of the city of Richmond for twenty-one years, and in that long interval I prosecuted only three Jews, and two of them were acquitted, there being no evidence to sustain the charges. During my fourteen years of service as a Magistrate, one Jew was before me for trial and he was acquitted. In all the long interval I do remember having ever received an application for public charity from any individual of either sex or any age belonging to that faith. And, so far as I am aware, no Jewish child has ever received the benefits of our free schools, for which their parents, without a murmur, pay their taxes."

OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE BANKRUPT'S ESTATE.

Sec. 27. And be it further enacted, That all creditors whose debts are duly proved, and allowed shall be entitled to share in the bankrupt's property and estate pro rata without any priority or preference whatever, except that wages due from him to any operative, or clerk, or house-servant, to an amount not exceeding fifty dollars, for labor performed within six months next preceding the adjudication of bankruptcy, shall be entitled to priority, and shall be first paid in full: Provided, That any debt proved by any person liable as bail, surety, guarantor, or otherwise, for the bankrupt, shall not be paid to the person so proving the same until satisfactory evidence shall be produced of the payment of such debt by such person, or the share to which such debt would be entitled may be paid into court, or otherwise held for the benefit of the party entitled thereto, as the court may direct. At such meeting the majority in value of the creditors present shall determine whether any, and what part of the net proceeds of the estate, after deducting and retaining a sum sufficient to provide for an undetermined claim which, by reason of the distant residence of the creditor, or for other sufficient reason, have not been proved, and divided among the creditors; but unless at least one-half in value of the creditors shall concur at such meeting, either in person or by attorney, it shall be the duty of the assignee so to determine. In case a dividend is ordered, the register shall, within ten days after such meeting, prepare a list of all the creditors entitled to dividend, and shall calculate and set opposite to the name of each creditor who has proved his claim the dividend to which he is entitled out of the net proceeds of the estate set apart for dividend, and shall forward by mail to every creditor a statement of the dividend to which he is entitled, and such creditor shall be paid by the assignee in such manner as the court may direct.
