News Favors.—Mr. S. J. McCormick, of the Franklin Bookstore, Portland, sends us full files of illustrated and other papers, for which he will accept our thanks.

The Crop.—Our farmer friends tell us that the crop in Walla Walla Valley this season will be very light. Much less than the usual quantity of land was "seeded," and the yield even from the cultivated land shows a falling off.

Farm Hands.—Farmers are offering from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per day for harvest hands. Such is the scarcity of help that some of the farmers fear that they will be unable to harvest their crops. No excuse for idleness in this Valley.

How is It?—For several weeks our usually attentive friend Cann, of Wells, Fargo & Co., has failed to forward our package of exchanges. Cann has just been getting a little boy—the very image of its dad—and possibly this accounts for the neglect.

Misken & Co., of Boise City, are arrears to this office. They evidently think that cheating printers is commendable. Z. H. Fairchild, the Elk City expressman, is also a delinquent. The list might be extended, but this will answer for this week.

Egg Speculation.—An enterprising operator left Walla Walla in the early part of the week with a team loaded exclusively with eggs. He bought the "fruit" in this Valley at from twenty to thirty cents a dozen and on reaching Boise he expects to realize at the rate of \$1 per dozen.

Neat Fitting Scraps.—Those of our readers who desire a neat fitting suit of clothes will find J. Marony, Merchant Tailor, on Main street, next door to the Gem saloon, prepared to accommodate them. Mr. M. is prepared to manufacture clothing to suit the most fastidious taste.

Through Tickets.—The O. S. N. Company have arranged to issue through tickets to the various mining districts and different points on the River. The rates of fare have also been materially reduced. We are pleased to notice these changes, evidencing as they do a disposition to attract trade and travel to the Columbia River route.

The Scratt Trial was progressing at last accounts. Evidence introduced for the defence establishes the fact that Scratt was not in Washington at the time of the assassination. He was evidently cognizant of the plan to abduct the President, but beyond this the evidence fails to connect him with the greatest crime of this or any age.

Walla Walla Finances. WALLA WALLA, W. T., June 30, 1867.

To the Honorable Board of Common Council of the City of Walla Walla, W. T.—I herewith submit report and summary statement for the quarter ending June 30th, 1867.

At the close of the last quarter the amount due on warrants outstanding was \$5,091 73

Amount outstanding June 30th, 3,495 12

Reduction of city debt to date, \$1,996 61

The total revenue for the quarter amounts to the sum of \$3,924 14

The total expenditures, \$2,286 90

The sum of \$2,027 39 of the quarterly revenue was derived from taxes, and the expenditures for the quarter are \$390 15 in excess of all revenue except from taxes.

The City Marshal has now the delinquent tax list in his hands, amounting to \$550 00. Of this amount there may be \$500 00 collected, which with licenses, will give a revenue for the current quarter, not to exceed \$2,000 00, and according to the expenditures for the last quarter, there will be nothing to apply to the city debt.

The 3 per cent. interest on bearing warrants have been reduced \$750 00, leaving a balance of \$2,650 00, and 2 per cent. warrants have been issued to the amount of \$422 00. The monthly interest on these amounts to \$87 50.

The sum of \$174 20 still remains against I. L. Roberts.
