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Tragedy at Wallula.

On Monday last a telegram was received from Wallula requesting the presence of Dr. J. M. Boyd, the coroner for the county. He being in the mountains recuperating, Drs. Mauzy and Mariani, two of our best physicians, went down in his stead for the purpose of making the examination of the body of James Brewster, a railroad employe, who had died that morning under circumstances that denoted a terrible crime.

On the part of some one. The justice at Wallula being absent, Judge Lacy, of this city, went down also for the purpose of making the examination. In order to gather the full facts of the case for our readers, the STATESMAN representative went also. Arriving there, a jury was empaneled and the body viewed; then all adjourned to the office of Capt. Peabody and the examination of witnesses commenced. A full account of what each witness said would be too prolix, we give the essence of the evidence. On Sunday morning the son of the dead man found a bottle of whiskey lying on the road; he took it into the house and drank of it, and the dead man, partook thereof with him.

That night, about 10 o'clock, Brewster came home from his work; we were informed by those who spoke to him as he was going, that he appeared in as good humor as his wont; when he entered the house he prepared another drink from the same bottle that had been found in the morning, drank, and said nothing. In about fifteen minutes he said he would take another drink; his wife said she would get it for him, which she did; he drank it, and immediately complained of its bitter taste, and told them to throw the stuff away; he then declared:

He had been poisoned. Witnesses declared that he continually repeated this statement, and intimated that a dose had been prepared for him. He very shortly went into convulsions and spasms, and suffered so terribly that his general condition, all night he lingered in terrible agony and died at 6 a. m. the following morning. The doctors state that his symptoms were exactly those of

strychnine poisoning. This, in connection with the fact that his wife on the 21st of August, purchased strychnine in this city, makes the case look very suspicious. The jury adjourned at a late hour till Wednesday for the purpose of giving the doctors time to make a post mortem examination. On Wednesday the jury re-convened, and the wife was examined; she stated that she bought the strychnine in order of a doctor, although a search had been made, it cannot be found. The man was buried on Tuesday, but on Wednesday was disinterred for another examination. In the course of the last examination of witnesses, it came out that when the sister heard that

Poison was in the house. She remarked that, "she would do that, but," "she didn't like a man she would have him." Also, that Mrs. Brewster was very anxious to get money, and had expressed herself to the effect that money was all that was necessary to make people respectable. She also told a story of her desire to start a house of ill fame, for there was money in it.

As we go to press we are informed that the doctors have detected strychnine in the stomach by thorough tests.


