This may be true, but it should be borne in mind that it was done on a private track and privately; it should also be remembered that Bonner's horses have always had a happy family (peculiar to themselves) of making "the best time" in just this sort of a private school way. CENSUS day will be June 1, 1880. On that date about twenty thousand enumerators will commence their labors—those in the cities being required to complete their work in two weeks, while others will be allowed the whole month of June. Persons alive on the 1st of June, but dying before the enumerator reaches them, will be counted in the census; births subsequent to the 1st of June will not be counted. Special agents will be employed to collect statistics relating to education, mining, manufacturing, agriculture and various other departments of trade and industry.

THE Boise Republican takes us to task for being more pronounced in our recent strictures on a paper there who took our items and credited them to another paper here. It was a little more than we cared about to give a gallant young military friend a notice, and then to have it credited to another sheet than our own. DIRTY TRICKS. In regard to the circulation of Garfield's speeches through the mails under the frank of Senator Bismarck of Connecticut, says the St. Louis Republic, it has been discovered to be a dirty piece of strategy, for which somebody in the service of the radical managers of the Ohio campaign is clearly responsible. The matter was referred by the democratic national committee, and the latter replies at considerable length, pronouncing the transaction a fraud. The gist of his answer is contained in the following paragraph: "The sample sent is a forged—much better executed than the eighteen forged signatures to the Louisiana electoral certificates, upon which eight men made a president, but nevertheless a forgery." This covers the whole case, and shows to what disreputable practices the groomers of Sherman and Foster are resorting to impose upon the people of Ohio.

LETTER FROM EDISON. Some time since we wrote to E. A. Edison, telling him all we knew about platinum, and where he was likely to find it in quantities. This week a letter from him was received, in which he informed us that he had received four samples of black sand from Missouri, M. T., and that three of them contained platinum. The Mormon Question.

In our sister territory of Idaho the Mormon question is one that is puzzling the wisest brains. For a long time past the Mormons have held the balance of power in politics, and every instance their unanimous vote has been the means of placing their man in power. As a general thing he has been a democrat, and to gain their vote he has to promise in every instance to do their bidding or lose their support. This is of course very galling to the party who are naturally in the majority in Idaho. It is a necessity for the reason that the republicans are read and eager to take advantage of any hesitancy the democratic candidate may show, to gain the Mormon vote for themselves. This has been proved time and again beyond a doubt. That the Mormons are overrunning portions of Idaho is likely to have, at no distant date, a very serious effect on its economy both socially and politically. Already in the past four years two new counties have been formed solely by reason of the influx of Mormons. These new counties of Bear Lake and Oneida, adjoining the Utah line, and of course to all intents and purposes belong to it. We advise the citizens of Idaho to use all their influence, irrespective of party, to assist the present administration by every means in their power of stopping the great influx of polygamists, who threaten to overrun their territory. Polygamy is properly termed "the twin relic of barbarism." Of late it has assumed such huge proportions that the government has been forced to appeal to foreign governments for their support in preventing any more such emigration from their countries. While all this is going on, would it not be as well if our suddenly virtuous government would examine into and try to cleanse the Augean stables of their own immauculate republican senators and other officials? The scandals that have of late years so shocked and disgraced the country have emanated in almost every instance from those who have been more thoroughly identified with the "god and morality" party than all the rest of the nation combined. The godly Becher was the first to cry "let loose the dogs of war," and his case disgraced the christianity of the civilized world. Then came the affair of the venerable Winnebago chief and his *lessee* with the wild *Ojiver*; he was truly a new example for the rising generation, and of course will be rewarded in the usual peculiar manner. Kalkoh was another hot goppler and sound republican who never wavered in his belief that it was at once his duty and privilege to care for the wives of the people. Thad Stevens never ceased to lift up his voice over the horrors of concubinage in the southern states, in which the sweet and innocent progresses were the victims of the brutal lusts of the whites; and of course the divine Thaddeus exercised his full rights as a republican by living in open concubinage with an African wench. The latest and newest development of republican morals is a chief favorite for the next presidency in the person of Lord Koscoe Conkling. He has never been anything if not loyal, he has resisted foot to foot and breast to breast the advance since the war—of the hangly southerners. Who, bolder than he, has howled defiance at the red hosts, and made the heavens tremble with his words of cheer? Not one; and therefore has not he the right to arrange and to care for the domestic affairs of his neighbors? Most assuredly. It is for this grand reason that he assumed to regulate the married status of Mr. Sprague. He did it from the lofty height of his political convictions; and from the republican standpoint he did no more than he had a perfect right to do. Now the question that arises in the minds of all intelligent watchers of events is simply, can a party which has been, and is composed of such leaders, consistently hold the mirror up to nature, when by their own example they set the fashion; true, they do not follow polygamy in all the world implies, but by their actions in parading their mistresses before the eyes of a virtuous nation they show their contempt for the marital relations that ought above everything else, to be held sacred. Polygamy ought to be suppressed, and so had the harrens of the republican leaders in Washington. Hayes and Evarts are right in announcing that they are going to commence on the much married saint; at the same time he says nothing about abolishing the sergious of the "stalwarts" of his own party. The Hebers, Youngs, Kimballs and Cannons ought to be suppressed, and so should those rotten knaves and IS cardinals, Calkins, Rose, Crumpton and other leeches in the republican ranks. Until this last job accomplished, the country will only look upon their puny efforts for the suppression of polygamy as a fit illustration of satan rebuking sin.

NEVADA POLITICS. The *Sun*, under the head of "Pocket Borough States," characteristically denounces the efforts being made to re-elect Senator Sharon, who, encouraged by the recent success of his colleague, Senator J. P. Jones, now seeks another term. Between the senators who "hold over" and the representatives who may be persuaded to come over, the legislature will probably be amicable enough to gratify the ambition of Senator Sharon. Nevada and Nebraska were, says the *Sun*, "bought in as states to serve a partisan purpose. The former was a deluge of gold water over the priming of a big gun which the Ohio republicans had laboriously loaded for campaign use. Every one expected that, between democratic sympathy and republican activity, Gov. Blackburn's majority would be so greatly reduced that the republican orator could "point with pride" to the repudiation of democracy by the state of Beck, Blackburn and Carlisle. The returns thus far indicate that the heaviest losses have been experienced by the republicans, from whom the greenbackers have drawn most of their strength. While in some ninety counties Blackburn's vote only runs 2700 behind that of McCreary in 1875, Evans falls short by 10,000 of the vote of Harlan. More campaign artillery for the junk shop.

District and County Attorneys.

EDITOR STATESMAN:—I promised to follow a communication on the subject indicated in the caption with some facts and figures. When changes are suggested in a law providing for the expenditure of money, we may naturally conclude that the people desire to know whether there will be any increase of pay, or a greater tax upon the public purse, in order to maintain that proposed change. This is a proper inquiry. In answer thereto, I propose a few of the many thoughts I have on that question. The present law provides for a salary of \$1500 per annum, out of the territorial treasury, and to be paid by the counties of his district \$50 00 per annum for 1000 inhabitants or less, and \$25 00 for every additional 1000 over the first, and \$15 00 for every divorce case not defended.

The commands were out of supplies and Lieutenant Catley had started back this way with his train, the Indians attacked the train. A skirmish ensued; word was sent to Warren to return, and next day more fighting occurred; the Indians died; want of supplies prevented either commander from following up the enemy. Private Egan, of Catley's command, was killed. He was shot through the leg severing an artery, and bled to death before medical assistance could be made available. It is said to have a wife and children at Mr. Idaho. I have not full particulars; the above is all the reliable information I have. N. T. CATOS.

A WALLA WALLA FARM.—Last week we took a ride with Sam Gilliam out to his father's ranch on Dry Creek. It is on the old Dayton road and the most beautiful scenery can be indulged in the whole distance. What first struck us was the incongruity of the name "Dry creek" to the shady tree embowered stream, for a more charmingly verdant would be hard to find in the country. Mr. Gilliam is an old resident, who has lived here nearly twenty years. He is one of the men who can be pointed out as "his country's pride" if honesty, integrity and industry is implied by the term. He has 500 acres of land under cultivation; the soil is excellent; as some idea can be formed of its richness when it is stated that crops have been put in, in succession, for 16 years on the same land, and yet to-day it bears larger crops than at first. The orchard here contains 4000 trees of all varieties of fruit among other besides peaches, plums, pears, apples, cherries and apricots; we noticed many black walnuts and soft shell almonds; it is the first time we have seen this tree bearing fruit in this country, and the question naturally arises, if it will bear fruit in such a backward season as we have experienced this year, why should it not be more generally cultivated and be made a source of profit to the country? The trees were bearing so abundantly that the ground was literally strewn with branches broken off by the superabundant weight of fruit. The grape vines were amazing in the quantity of fruit they bore. This farm is beautiful by having long lines of Orange orange fences running around it. We expressed our wonder at it growing so luxuriantly and perfect, and were met with the information that, these bushes only required care and attention at the start. This we the more readily believe after seeing the scraggy plants on the line of fences in other places. They seem to have been stuck in the ground and there left to take their own chances. With their glossy, shapely, dark green leaves they add everything to the natural beauty of a country. Would that there were more of them to relieve the eye from constant contemplation of unsightly fences.

Ordinance No. 53.

An Ordinance to establish a Fire Department for the City of Walla Walla. The City of Walla Walla does ordain as follows: SEC. 1. The Fire Department of the City of Walla Walla shall consist of a Chief Engineer, one Assistant Engineer, a President, Secretary and Treasurer, and Board of Delegates, elected by the several fire companies of said city as hereinafter provided. SEC. 2. There shall be elected on the first Monday of October 1879, and annually thereafter, two members from each of the fire and hook and ladder companies of the city to the Board of Delegates, which Board shall consist of two members from each of said companies, and to be before entering on the discharge of the duties of their office shall take and subscribe an oath to well and truly perform the duties of Delegates. The Board of Delegates thus elected shall assemble on the third Monday of each month, and at their first meeting shall proceed to elect a President, Secretary and Treasurer, whose term of office shall be for one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified. The President shall be elected from the Delegates and the Treasurer and Secretary from the department at large. In all business relating to the fire department the President and Secretary shall be empowered to administer oaths and affirmations. SEC. 3. The Board of Fire Delegates shall make all laws and rules for the governing of the fire department, which shall be binding upon every member of the department, any violation thereof, or any disobedience of any lawful order of the Chief or Assistant Engineer, shall be punished by being censured, suspended, removed from office or expelled, from the department, as a majority of the Board shall adjudge. SEC. 4. Contested elections for Chief and Assistant Engineer shall be decided by a majority of the Board of Delegates, and if a tie should occur for either of said officers, the Board shall fill said office for the ensuing term. SEC. 5. The Chief and Assistant Engineer before entering upon the duties of their office shall subscribe an oath faithfully to perform the duties of their office, and thereupon they shall be entitled to certificates of office signed by the President and Secretary of the Department, and shall enter upon the discharge of their duties ten days thereafter. SEC. 6. When ever a vacancy occurs in the office of Chief Engineer the Assistant Engineer shall act until the next regular election for Chief Engineer. SEC. 7. There shall be an election annually on the first Monday of October for Chief Engineer and one Assistant Engineer. Said election shall be held at the residence of one of the Board of Delegates, by giving ten days notice thereof in the paper doing the city printing. The Board of Delegates shall appoint three judges to conduct said election, each from a different company, who, before entering on the discharge of their duties, shall take and subscribe an oath faithfully to discharge their duties. Said election shall be held at such place as the Board of Delegates shall designate, and the polls shall be kept open from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. The voting shall be by ballot, and immediately upon closing the polls the votes shall be publicly counted, and the returns of the election duly certified by the judges, shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Department, and shall be by him transmitted to the Board of Delegates to be acted upon within ten days thereafter and declare the result. SEC. 8. No person shall be allowed to vote at any election of Chief or Assistant Engineer unless he shall have been a member of the Fire Department sixty days next preceding such election, and shall be over the age of twenty-one years, and no person shall be eligible to office in the Department without possessing the qualifications of a voter. SEC. 9. Each fire and hook and ladder company shall be composed of not less than fifteen and not more than sixty members. SEC. 10. At the annual meeting of each company on the first Monday of March, of each year, each company shall elect a Foreman 1st and 2d Assistant Foreman, and two delegates to the Board of Delegates, one from each company, and such other officers as may be provided for by their constitutions, who shall hold their office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. SEC. 11. Each company shall have power to make rules for their own government, not inconsistent with the city ordinances or the rules of the Department. SEC. 12. The Chief Engineer shall report to the Common Council of the city on the first Tuesday of July and first Tuesday of January of each year, the number, location and condition of the disterns and water supply and fire apparatus, the company houses and all property of all cities in keeping of the Fire Department, and all accidents by fire during the year and the cause thereof, and shall make such recommendations as he may consider proper for rendering the Department more efficient. SEC. 13. For the purpose of putting in force the provisions of this ordinance, an election for Chief Engineer, Assistant Engineer, and Board of Delegates shall be held at Walla Walla, at the Court House on the first Monday of October, 1879, and Wm. Beader, member of Washington Company, John Gaston, member of Tiger Engine Company and Isaac Welch, member of Vigilant Hook and Ladder Company shall act as judges of said election. SEC. 14. That each of said companies file with the City Clerk a list of their members, and who have been such for two months or more prior to the making up of said lists. That said lists shall be verified by the Foreman of each company to the effect that each of the persons on said lists are members of their said company, and have been such for more than two months prior thereto, and that they are over the age of twenty-one years, and are the persons whose names appear on said lists shall vote at said election. SEC. 15. The election returns provided for by SECTION 13 of this ordinance shall be certified to by the judges and delivered to the Committee on Fire & Water of the Council who shall declare the result and issue certificates of election to the parties entitled thereto. SEC. 16. This ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Passed the Common Council Sept. 2, 1879. C. E. WHITNEY, City Clerk. Approved: Sept. 3, 1879. 




