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GOV. FERRY ARRANGING. The people of Yakima valley complain bitterly of the course of Gov. Ferry in failing to supply them with arms, and generally disregard their appeals at a time when they were surrounded by hostile Indians, and liable at any moment to have their wives and children butchered before their eyes. They represent that he has failed to take any interest in their welfare, and has been dilatory in furnishing them means for self-defense. Smarting under these wrongs, a number of citizens of Yakima valley have framed an indictment against the "pardon broker," and request us to publish the same. Here it is:

1. That Gov. Ferry has been applied to repeatedly by prominent men of the county, county officials and others, respecting Indian difficulties, and who, on such applications, set forth the existing facts in regard to the many outrages upon settlers, and the general feeling of insecurity resulting therefrom, and owing to the near presence of a large band of Indians, notoriously known to be renegades from different tribes, and having in their possession large quantities of stolen property—particularly horses—belonging to the settlers of Eastern Oregon and Washington. And that a number of these Indians were known to have been engaged in hostilities in Eastern Oregon, and among them the murderers of two settlers of Yakima county—S. D. Perkins and wife—as testified to by Indians themselves.

2. That each and every one of these applications up to the time of the finding of the bodies of Mr. Perkins and wife, and only then after he had referred the matter to prominent citizens of Oregon, received the slightest attention at his hands.

3. That he was applied to for arms, but made no answer until a late period of the excitement, when he furnished 100 guns; that he gave as a reason therefor, that the county had already received its full quota, but that at the same time he could furnish the city of Seattle 200 stand and 1000 rounds, when they had no more use for them than they the city of Washington has, as far as Indian troubles are concerned.

4. That he had sufficient time to accompany Gov. Chadwick, of Oregon, to different places in Umatilla county, and could spend nearly a week in Walla Walla, and yet could not find time to visit the people of Yakima county, and endeavor to learn the true situation of matters in that county respecting Indian difficulties, and learn whether or not he was justified in treating communications of the people in the manner he had done.

FOLLY.—A few mischief makers are again meddling with the fire department and endeavoring to effect the removal of the chief engineer. This experiment was tried several years back, and at the burning of the Oriental hotel, which soon followed the town narrowly escaped destruction. Owners of property will protest against a repetition of this folly. The town mainly made up of wooden houses—many of them little better than tinder boxes—we cannot afford to take unnecessary risks.

HOUSES in this city are scarce and even the most indifferent tumble-down buildings readily command tenants.

Mrs. MAY FORD is about to take the place of the junior clerk at the post-office, a position for which she is well qualified.

PRACTICE WITH SMALL ARMS.—The numerous long-range shooting matches with rifles held in the last few years, have awakened an interest on the subject among the officers of the regular army. In order to encourage the holding of a grand military interest match, Judge Hilton, of New York, has presented a trophy as a first prize, valued at \$1000. Arrangements are now being made for matches between teams from the regular army and the national guard of the several states. General Hancock says, in a letter published a few days ago: "I regard the proposed match as specially valuable in directing towards practice with Creedmoor rifles and at extremely long range, as well as in instituting an annual competition between the regular army and the national guard of the different states which cannot but prove beneficial to all."

THE CONGRESSIONAL LABOR COMMITTEE.—A commission to inquire into the condition of labor in the country was created at the last session of congress, and whatever of benefit or usefulness there might have been in such a body was at once frustrated by the appointment of congressman Hewitt of New York as chairman. After his fatal blundering in the electoral commission business, by which Tilden and the democracy were finally robbed of the presidency, speaker Randall ought to have refrained from appointing him to any position in which ordinary sagacity or statesmanship is required. The labor inquiry commission was well-intended and, with a proper man at the head of it, a great deal of good would have come from the investigation. But under Hewitt, it is little better than a costly humbug and sorry farce. It is too much to expect any benefit from it as it stands.

GERMAN ESPIONAGE.—Since the attempted assassination of the Emperor William, the German authorities are little inclined to claim to have even the slightest expression susceptible of communistic interpretation to pass unheeded or unpunished, and they carry their espionage to a ridiculous yet very harsh excess. For instance, the extradition of two men from the Canton Bale in Geneva, Switzerland, has been demanded, because one was overheard, by a German officer sojourning there, to remark to the other, "Ach Gott! it is time all old fellows were got rid of." The two were themselves old soldiers, who had served in the Prussian army against France, and earnestly protested that the objectionable words had no such significance as that attributed to them. The Geneva authorities have declined to surrender the men on Bismarck's demand, and at last accounts the matter was still undecided.

THE LABOR COMMITTEE.—If all the testimony taken before the labor committee is published, the volume which contains it will be no more than a waste of paper. That which will constitute its chief feature is the wide difference of opinion between the witnesses as to what has caused the business depression, and the remedies that should be applied for its removal. Some of the opinions contain matter for reflection, but the majority are utterly trivial. The suggestions as to a restoration of prosperous times are generally biased by the business in which the witness happens to be engaged, so that it is "the wish that is father to the thought."
